

THE MONTHS OF THE YEAR

THE FIRST MONTH

God wants you to be happy, and He wants you to start a new year now with Him. Long ago God said to His people, "This month shall be unto you the beginning of months: it shall be the first month of the year to you" (Exodus xii. 2). Why were they to have a new year's day in the middle of the year? Because they were to get a new history, a new life altogether, and instead of being poor slaves, scolded and whipped and ill-treated, they were to be God's people, to love and serve Him, and to be His peculiar treasure. Now if you want a happy new year, you must get it as they got it. You have been Satan's slaves, and have sinned against God all your life, and you will have to meet Him about those sins, unless you have the same new beginning that Israel had.

The first thing they were to do was to "take to themselves a lamb." The Lord Jesus is the Lamb of God, holy, spotless, pure and gentle. God offers Him to you as a Saviour; will you take Him as God's gift? It is no good for you simply to know that Jesus is the Saviour; you must accept Him as your Saviour; "take to yourselves a lamb." And then after four days the lamb had to die. "The whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall kill it in the evening." So the people took their lamb, and killed it, and then sprinkled its blood on the lintels and side posts of their doors. God was coming through the land that night; death must come into every house; the lamb must die, or the firstborn: and as the clock struck twelve, "there

was not a house where there was not one dead." A dead lamb roasted with fire was on the table or a dead firstborn lay in the house.

But it was the blood on the door that kept the destroyer out. "When I see the blood I will pass over you," God said. It was not enough that the blood was shed and the lamb killed; the blood had to be sprinkled too. They had to take the blood and use it as God told them. Now you know that Jesus has died; you know His precious blood has been shed; you know it cleanses from all sin; but have you taken shelter under it? Have you said "it was shed for me? I am the sinner for whom Jesus died." If you trust the blood of Jesus to day you will have a happy new year, and a happy eternity too, when the years are all gone, but you will never be happy till you do.

"CANNOT wait, mother, because Jesus wants me, but you and Granny will be sure to come soon, won't you?" This is what Tommy said only a few weeks ago; and now he has gone to be with the Saviour Whom he learnt to know and love in the Sunday School. Even his mother cannot wish Tommy back again, because he was so often weary and in pain; and now he is where "there is no more pain, neither sorrow nor crying."

This little boy had been in ill health for some time, but he used to come very often to the Gospel preaching and his bright, happy face was quite a pleasure to see. I missed him for a few weeks, and on enquiring was

told that he had been very ill and was then in the hospital; and I heard that he would like me to go and see him.

I went very soon and found him looking very ill indeed. At first I hardly recognised him, but as soon as he saw me his bright smile came, and then I knew him at once. He was too ill for me to stay long, but I asked him if he knew that Jesus was with him in the Infirmary. "Oh, yes," he said, "He was with me the first night I was here." I asked him if that was because he was very lonely, "No, but they thought I was dying then. And He is with me every day when I have to bear the pain; I have to bear such a lot of pain; and when the doctors come, and the nurse, He is with me all the time." His voice was so weak I could only just hear the dear little fellow, but it was good to hear such a bright testimony to the Lord's presence. I left him with the text, "Lo I am with you alway," and promised to go again soon. He was on the "danger" list and his friends could visit him at any time.

I could not go again until three days later, and then, when I went straight to the ward, I found the bed empty. I was afraid I was too late to see him again on earth; but the nurse told me that he had been taken home. He wanted to go home, and as he could not get really well they let him go.

On Sunday I went to see him at home and found him very happy with his mother to wait upon him. I had taken him a big text which he asked us to put on the wall where he could see it as he lay propped up in bed: "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee." He had on another wall his favourite hymn, "We're marching to Immanuel's land," which his teacher had

given him. His grandmother told me that he said he did not want to see anybody unless they could sing to him, or pray with him.

Just a week after he left the Infirmary the Lord took him Home to be with Himself. He had said to his mother that he hoped the Lord would take him when he was asleep, and so it was. In the night he had asked his mother to sing his favourite hymn, and said to her, "I don't mind going, mother, but I don't like to leave you. You will come too, won't you? I shall be looking out for you and granny." His mother told him she would soon come. Then early in the morning he fell asleep and woke in the glory. "Absent from the body present with the Lord."

This is a true story, boys and girls. If you take the Lord Jesus as your Saviour He will be with you all the time as He was with Tommy Walker, and you will find always that what the Bible says is quite true, "He is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother."

A LADDER TO HEAVEN

Abraham left his country at God's command and came to the land of Canaan, another traveller was journeying one day on the same road, but in the opposite direction. Abraham's grandson was on his way from Beersheba, in the south of Palestine, to Haran, on the other side of the great river Euphrates.

Sixty years before this time, Abraham's servant Eleazar had gone to Mesopotamia and had brought back Rebekah to be the wife of his master's son, and now Jacob, the son of Isaac and Rebekah, was going to see his uncle Laban the Syrian, his mother's brother.

It was a long way from Beersheba to Haran; more than four hundred miles. There was no going by train in those days, and Jacob was not even riding on a camel; he was going on foot, and he was alone. Why was he going? Partly through his own fault. He had joined with his mother in deceiving his aged father; and his brother Esau was so angry at what Jacob had done that he threatened to kill him.

So "Jacob fled into the country of Syria" (Hosea xii. 12). His father and mother told him to go to Padenaram (which was one of the names given to the country beyond the Euphrates), to his uncle Laban, and Jacob obeyed them and set out on his journey.

But God was leading him, though as yet he did not know it. For although God had not spoken to Jacob, as he did to Abram, and told him to go on this journey, yet in obeying his father and mother he was going where God meant him to go. As he went on his journey, he came to a place where his grandfather long years before had built an altar to the Lord

(Genesis xii. 8). At this place Jacob stayed all night, for when he got there the sun had set and it was almost dark. There was no house or tent where he could sleep, so he put some of the stones of the place and put them for his pillows, and there he lay down to sleep.

As he slept he dreamed, and in his dream he saw a ladder; the foot of it rested on the earth, and the top reached to heaven, and the angels of God were going up and down it. But it was not they who spoke to

Jacob; more wonderful still, the Lord Himself stood there and spoke to him. No doubt Jacob had been told how God had talked with his father and his

grandfather; but now he heard the Lord's voice for himself.

What did God say to Jacob? First he told him Who He was: "I am the Lord God of Abraham thy father, and of Isaac," and then He made him seven promises.

1. The land whereon thou liest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed.

2. Thy seed shall be as the dust of the earth.

3. Thou shalt spread abroad to the west, and to the east, and to the north, and to the south.

4. In thee and in thy seed shall all the families of the earth be blessed.

5. And behold, I am with thee, and will keep thee in all places whither thou goest.

6. And will bring thee again to this land.

7. For I will not leave thee, until I have done that which I have spoken to thee of.

The first four of these promises God had made before to Abraham and to Isaac; but the other three were specially for Jacob at this time. For he was leaving his native land, and in fear of his life. He did not know what was before him, nor that he would not pass that way again till after twenty years; but God knew, and He promised to take care of him and to be with him all the time, wherever he should be.

When Jacob awoke from his sleep, he said, "Surely the Lord is in this place, and I knew it not." He did not know as we know now that the Lord is "not far from every one of us": that He "is nigh to all that call upon him"; for he had no Bible as we have. But he knew the Lord was there. "He was afraid, and said, How dreadful is this place! this is none other but the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven."

Then he took the stone that he had put for his pillow, and set it up for a memorial, so that he should know the place when he should come back to it in years to come (Gen. xxxv. 6, 7). And he called the name of the place Bethel, which means the House of God.

I have told you this story of Jacob and how God spoke to him at Bethel so that you may think about it. Perhaps you have a father and a grandfather who know and love the Lord; but have you ever heard His voice? He does not speak to us now from the top of a shining ladder, up which the angels come and go, but through His dear Son and by His holy word, the Bible. The ladder Jacob saw was set up from earth to heaven. The Lord Jesus came down from heaven to earth, to make a way by which we could draw near to God. Jacob could not go up to heaven by that ladder he saw; but every one of us may come to God by the Lord Jesus Christ, Who is Himself the Way. No one can come to the Father except by Him, but those who do come to Him He will never turn away (John vi. 37); for He is able to save to the uttermost all that come unto God by Him.

And just as the Lord said to Jacob at Bethel, "I will not leave thee," so now He says to all who are His and have heard His voice (John x. 27), "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee" (Hebrews xiii. 5).

AFTER TWENTY YEARS

WENTY years after that night when Jacob slept at Bethel with a stone for his pillow, when God spoke to him in a dream, he was on his way back to the land of Canaan. God had guided him all the way to Haran, where his Uncle Laban lived, and he had been there ever since.

After he left Bethel he had travelled on day after day till he crossed the great river Euphrates, and came into the land of the people of the East. In a little while he came to a place where there was a well in a field, and beside it three flocks of sheep were lying, for out of that well they drew water for the sheep to drink. Jacob spoke to the men who took care of the sheep, and asked them where they came from; they told him "from Haran." Then he knew that God had guided him, for it was to Haran, that he wanted to go. He asked the men if they knew Laban, and they said "Yes, we know him"; they told him too "His daughter Rachel will soon be here, for she is coming with the sheep," and while he was talking with them, Rachel came.

When Jacob saw Rachel coming, and knew that she was his cousin, he went and rolled away the stone that covered the top of the well, and drew water for her sheep until they had had enough. Then he told Rachel who he was, and she ran and told her father. When Laban heard that his sister's son had come, he ran to meet him, and embraced him, and kissed him, as even men do in those countries; then he took him to his house, and Jacob told him all that had happened. This was twenty years before the time of which I am now telling you.

While Jacob was in Haran he had married, and now he had eleven sons; the eldest was called Reuben, and the youngest was Joseph. Afterwards he had another son also, whose name was Benjamin, so he had twelve sons altogether. He had grown rich, too, in cattle and sheep and goats, camels and asses, for God had blessed him and made him rich; and he had servants to help take care of them all. He had been Laban's servant and looked after his cattle and sheep all the time that he had been in Haran, and the first time that he wanted to go away back to his own country, Laban persuaded him to stay, for he said, "I have learned by experience that God hath blessed me for thy sake."

But at the end of twenty years God had spoken to him again in a dream, and told him to go back to his own country, and again He said, "I will be with thee." Jacob obeyed God's word at once. He had not always done what was quite right, even after God spoke to him at Bethel, but we must remember that he had no Bible, as we have, to tell him what he ought to do; and he was quite alone among people who did not worship the true God, so he had no one to remind him of what was right. But he was quite ready to do what God told him. He told his family what God had said, and he got ready camels on which they could ride; he took them all with him, and his cattle and sheep and all that he had, for he was not coming back again; and he started on his way to go back to his father Isaac in the land of Canaan. He remembered God's promises and he obeyed His word.

As soon as he came near to his own land, Jacob sent messengers before him to Esau his brother to tell him where he had been all this time, and that now he had flocks and herds of his own; he was not coming home to take Esau's share. The messengers came back and told him that Esau was coming to meet him with four hundred men. When Jacob heard this he was very much afraid, for he remembered how he had deceived his father long before, and how Esau was so angry that he threatened to kill him. But he remembered also that God had told him to come back, and that He had promised to be with him, so, in his fear and distress, he turned to the Lord and prayed for help and deliverance. He owned that he was unworthy of all the goodness that God had shewn to him, he prayed that God would deliver him and his family from Esau's anger, and he reminded Him of all His promises. God heard the prayer of His servant, as He always does hear those who turn to Him in their trouble; He has said "Before they call, I will answer; and while they are yet speaking, I will hear."

That night Jacob stayed in the place where he was, and got ready a present to send to Esau. He took goats and sheep, camels, cattle and asses, and sent them on in droves before him, with servants to look after them; and he sent a message to Esau, to tell him that they were all a present to him from his brother Jacob. The same night God appeared again to Jacob and blessed him, and changed his name to Israel, which means "a prince of God."

The next morning Jacob looked along the road, and saw Esau coming with his four hundred men. Then Jacob went on before his family, and bowed himself to the ground seven times, and came near his brother. And Esau ran to meet him, and embraced him, and fell on his neck, and kissed him. God had changed the heart of Esau, so that instead of hating his brother he loved him better than he had ever done. How glad

and thankful Jacob was! God had heard his prayer, and had delivered him from his brother's anger. He had brought him in safety back to his own land, as he had promised him at Bethel so many years before.

I have told you this story to remind you of two things: that God will always guide His people, and that He is able to hear their cry and protect and deliver them, whatever the danger may be. Jacob believed His word and obeyed His voice, and He was to Jacob a Guide and a Deliverer. So He will be to every one that trusts Him.

THE MONTHS OF THE YEAR

THE SECOND MONTH

came into the wilderness of Sin . . . on the fifteenth day of the second month after their departing out of the land of Egypt" (Exod. xvi. 1). A month had passed away since that wonderful night when God had seen the blood and passed by His people, and now instead of being poor slaves they were free; Pharoah the cruel king was drowned, and the deep waves of the Red Sea flowed between them and the place where they had been so cruelly treated. The sea had opened once to let them through; it would never open again to let them go back,

But the second month found them in the wilderness, and they wanted food; there was nothing to eat,—nothing but dry sand. "I will rain bread from heaven upon you," said God; and the next morning when they got up, they found all around them on the ground a small round white thing, like the hoar frost. Perhaps you will see the hoar frost when you get up to-morrow morning; if you do, think of the manna. "What is it?" they said, and they could not get an answer. "Manna" means "what is it?" "This is the bread the Lord hath given you," said Moses. So they went and gathered it up, and ate it. Yes, "man did eat angel's food"—and how delicious it was, "like wafers made with honey."

When the Lord Jesus was in this world he said, "I am the bread which came down from heaven" (John vi. 41). That pure, white, sweet, manna, which fell all round the people, so that all they had to do was to take it and eat it, was a lovely picture of Jesus. He came down from heaven, to where we poor sinners were, to give us life. Our bodies cannot live without bread; our souls have no life unless we take Jesus as our Saviour, and by faith feed on Him. But He not only came down from heaven to where we were, but He also said, "The bread which I will give is My flesh, which I will give for the life of the world" (John vi. 51). He gave His life, He died, that you might live. Take the manna, take it and feed on it, accept Jesus as your Saviour, and you will have everlasting life.

THE BIBLE IN STRANGE LANGUAGES

ARANGA is not found among the foreign languages usually taught in schools. It is spoken in Mashonaland, which is in South Africa. When the Bible Society first sent out the four Gospels, the book of Acts, and three Epistles in Karanga, some of the natives of Mashonaland were at work in Johannesburg, and one man came to the depôt every day for a whole mouth to enquire if the books had arrived. He was there to see the first case unpacked. Opening a copy he read a few sentences,



and exclaimed, "Yes, this is Karanga; this is my people's language." Then he hurried off to tell the news, and was soon back with a dozen companions, all eager to buy the new book.

Tagalog is the chief language of Central Luzon, in the Philippine Isles. A translation of the New Testament into Tagalog was finished in 1901, and the Old Testament in 1905, which completed the first Bible in any language of the Philippines. A poor Filipino woman in Cavite was so anxious to possess a Tagalog Testament that she gave a pet monkey in exchange, as she had no money.

Mongo is spoken by ten million Ba-Lolo people who live between the Equator and the Kongo. They pay for their Scriptures with "brass rods" as they call them—pieces of brass wire about ten and a-half inches long. Twenty of these rods is the price paid for each Gospel.

Nyoro is the language of King Dandi of Toro; when King Dandi wrote a letter of thanks to the Bible Society for a copy of a Ganda Bible sent to him, he added, "We beseech you to persevere in the translation of the Book into our language." In due time the Nyoro New Testament was finished, and despatched to the heart of Central Africa, where cowrie shells are used instead of money. But as the people do not all possess cowrie shells with which to purchase their books, they will bring in chickens, or grass-mats; and sometimes boys and women come in to dig and cultivate in payment for books.

These are just a few of the languages into which the Bible has been translated within recent years, and the work is still going on, for even yet there are many languages in India alone in which no part of the Scriptures has yet been sent out. Will not you pray for God's blessing on His servants who are busy in this work, and on the Colporteurs and Bible-women who carry the books to those who have no other means of obtaining them?

And will you not help to send to others the Book which can lead them to a knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ as their Saviour?

SOLD INTO EGYPT

IRJATH-ARBA, or Hebron, was quite in the south of the land of Canaan, more than 20 miles from Jerusalem. We read of it very early in the Bible, for it was to this place that Abraham went after Lot separated from him, and he lived there for many years.

Isaac also lived at Hebron (Genesis xxxv. 27), and Jacob went there to Isaac, his father, after he came back from Padan-aram.

It was at Hebron that Jacob was living at the time of which I am now going to tell you, when Joseph, the youngest but one of his twelve sons, was 17 years old. Now Jacob loved Joseph more than all his children, and to show his love he made him a coat of many colours. Because of this Joseph's brothers were jealous of him, and hated him, and could not speak peaceably to him. Yet it was not Joseph's fault that his father loved him best. About this time, too, Joseph had two remarkable dreams, and because of these dreams his brothers hated him yet more.

First he dreamed that they were all binding sheaves of corn in the harvest-field, when all at once his sheaf stood upright, and his brothers' sheaves stood round about and bowed down to his sheaf. In the second dream he dreamed that the sun and moon and eleven stars came and bowed to him. When his brothers heard it, they could not bear to think that even in a dream they should bow down to their younger brother. Yet it was God Who had sent these dreams; and in after years the meaning was made plain.

Soon after this Joseph's brothers went away to Shechem to feed their father's sheep. When they had been gone some time, Jacob told Joseph one day that

he was to go to his brothers and carry a message to them. Joseph was quite ready at once to do what his father told him, although it was a long way for a boy to go all by himself, 40 or 50 miles at least; and of course he would have to walk. He went out of the vale of Hebron, and started for Shechem.

But when he came to Shechem his brothers were not there. He was wandering in the fields looking for them when he met a man who told him they had gone to Dothan, about 15 miles further on. So he went after them and found them in Dothan; he would not go back without doing what his father had told him.

His brothers were not at all pleased when they saw Joseph coming, and even before he came near they made plans to kill him. They said to each other, "Here comes this dreamer. Let us kill him, and say that some wild beast has eaten him, then we shall see what will become of his dreams." One sin always leads to another; they began with jealousy and hatred, and now they were ready to do murder. But Reuben, the eldest brother persuaded the others instead of killing Joseph to throw him into a pit, and he meant, when they had gone away, to get him out again and send him back to his father. So when Joseph came, this was what they did; they stripped off his beautiful coat, and let him down into an empty pit near by. They would not even listen to the message which he brought. Poor Joseph! but God was with him, and took care of him even then. Whatever trouble we may be in, however discouraged we may be, let us never think that God forgets those who trust in Him. "The Lord will not forsake His people." "None of them that trust in Him shall be desolate."

Just then a party of merchants went by, their camels

loaded with all sorts of things which they were taking down to Egypt to sell. Judah, the second brother, said to the rest, "Let us sell Joseph to these Ishmaelites; then we shall get rid of him without killing him." So they took Joseph up out of the pit, and sold him to these men for twenty pieces of silver, and he was taken away to Egypt. His cruel brothers sold him for a slave. They only meant it wickedly, they "thought evil" against him, but "God meant it unto good." He had a great work for Joseph to do in Egypt; "to save much people alive."

Joseph went all the way from Hebron to Dothan to carry his father's message to his wicked brothers, and this was how they treated him. There was Another, Who came a much longer journey to bring God's message of love to sinful men. HE was hated and despised by those to whom He came; HE was sold for money, not to slavery, but to death. The Lord Jesus "came unto his own, and his own received him not."

When Jacob sent Joseph to his brothers, he did not know how badly they would treat him. But when the great God of heaven sent His Son down into this world, He knew all that men would do to Him. Yet He so loved the world that He sent His only Son to die. Joseph obeyed his father and went to his brothers not knowing what was before him; but the Lord Jesus came well knowing what He would suffer. Why did He come? Because of His great love, He came to die; He said Himself, "I am the Good Shepherd; the Good Shepherd giveth His life for the sheep."

"He came unto His own, and His own received Him not. But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name."

ANY years ago, England spent twenty millions of money to liberate the slaves; and, when once they were set free, those black men had no desire to return to their chains.



A STARLIT SKY, AND A STORMY SEA

(1) A STARLIT SKY

HAT wilt Thou give me, seeing I go childless?" was a question put by an aged patriarch to the One who made heaven and earth, and all things therein. "Look now toward heaven," was the divine reply; and as the eyes of the pilgrim gazed upward into that starlit sky of exquisite beauty; and beheld the work of God's fingers, those precious words rang in his ears, "So shall thy seed be." Abram had neither son nor heir when he asked that question, but was an old man of ninety-nine; yet the Scripture saith, "He staggered not at the promise of God through unbelief, but was strong in faith, giving glory to God; and so we read "Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness." More than this, God changed his name, saying, "Thy name shall no more be called Abram; but thy name shall be Abraham, for a father of many nations have I made thee." Thus, instead of merely one son, his family was to comprise countless millions; and from that day to this God has kept his faithful promise to the one who trusted Him that starlight night.

Have you, dear child, ever looked toward heaven, and longed to be there; and have you yet heard, and believed, the voice of Him who saves the lost and whose word is "Look unto Me, and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth, for I am God, and there is none else"? Even the vilest sinner may look, for Jesus "died for all"; and the very moment you look, you live; and, not only does God save you now, but you become His child, and He counts you righteous just as He did Abram. Look, and live!

(2) A STORMY SEA

A starlit sky, and a stormy sea! What a contrast they present! Paul, the Apostle, passed through many troubles and trials of various kinds that we know nothing of; but there was one special storm he passed through which he could never forget. He was at that time a prisoner, on his way to Rome; and the story of that awful storm is one of the most interesting in the Shortly after passing Crete, the ship was caught in a tempestuous wind, called "Euroclydon"; and was driven before it with terrific force, but this was only the beginning of worse trouble. exceedingly tossed with a tempest, the next day they lightened the ship; and the third day they cast out its tackling. Instead of a starlit sky, "neither sun nor stars appeared for many days." Darkness fell on that benighted ship, tossed to and fro on those mighty billows: "and all hope that we should be saved was taken away." But after long abstinence, Paul stood forth in the midst of those frightened mariners, and said, "Sirs, ye should have hearkened unto me, and not have loosed from Crete, and to have gained this harm and loss. And now I exhort you to be of good cheer, for there shall be no loss of any man's life among you, but of the ship. For there stood by me this night the angel of God, whose I am, and whom I serve, saying, "Fear not, Paul, thou must be brought before Cæsar; and lo! God hath given thee all them that sail with thee. Wherefore, sirs, be of good cheer, for I believe God that it shall be even as it was told me."

What a glorious sight, amidst the howling of the winds, the awful darkness, and the furious raging of the tempest, to find that there was one man, out of two

hundred and seventy-six, on board that doomed ship, who believed God! Those to whom Paul spoke had not believed his words, when he warned them of their danger, 'ere the ship had started on her disastrous voyage; but Paul himself believed God!

And so it came to pass that, though the ship was broken to pieces, they all escaped safe to land. Spiritual storms, and moral darkness are all around us to-day, dear children; and the evil world in which we live is, like that ship, doomed to destruction. Can you say, in truth of heart, like Paul, "I believe God"? When, in reality, you can say so, you will prove the sweetness of a Father's love, who will bring you safely home to glory through all the storms of life.

In the story just narrated, God, in His infinite mercy, permitted all the shipwrecked ones to reach the island called Melita safely, in answer to His own word to His believing servant; but for you, dear reader, there must be a personal, living, faith in God, or you will never reach the golden shores of heaven. Many to-day refuse the warning voice of God's faithful servants, and perish in their folly; but happy indeed are those who, like Abram and Paul, "believe God," under all circumstances.



THE MONTHS OF THE YEAR

THE FOURTH MONTH

"N the fourth month, in the ninth day of the month, the famine was sore in the city, so that there was no bread for the people of the land" (Jer. lii. 6).

Many years had passed away since the children of Israel had undertaken to do all that the Lord commanded them, but instead of doing it they had constantly disobeyed Him; and although He had brought them into the beautiful land which He had promised, and had kept His word, yet they had sinned against Him so much that He said He would send them away from it, and bring on them all the punishments that He had threatened.

And so one day, a big army of Chaldean soldiers came against the city; they pitched their tents all round it, and built forts too, so that they shut in all the people that were there, and shut out all the country people that were in the habit of bringing corn and vegetables and fruit and other things into the market. And so, as no more food could be brought into the city, the stores which they had were by-and-by used up, until at last, after the Chaldeans had been there nearly a year and a half, "there was no bread left."

All that time, while the people were getting poorer and poorer, and had less and less to eat, God sent message after message to them, by the prophet Jeremiah, telling them to go out and give themselves up to the Chaldean soldiers, and promising that all who did so should have their lives saved. But the people did not believe God: they knew that prisoners in war were often cruelly treated, and they could not trust God, when He told them that they could be saved in that way, and in that way only.

God has only one way of salvation now. You must come to Him by Jesus, and tell Him you are a lost sinner, and deserve to be punished for your sins; but you believe His word that though you are so bad, He loves you, and punished Jesus that He might not

punish you. But many boys and girls are like those people in Jerusalem. They are afraid to trust God's word and will not come just as they are to the Lord Jesus; they wait to make themselves better first, but they will find out their mistake when it is too late. "In the fourth month, in the ninth day of the month," all the bread was gone; they had nothing to eat; they were obliged to do something, they would try once more to get out. And so in the night they got out by the garden gate between two walls, and the king and his soldiers went a little way. But they had not gone far when the Chaldeans caught them, and killed the king's children and his princes, and put out his eyes and kept him in prison till he died. Oh, why had he not trusted God's word and gone to the Chaldeans instead of trying to run away from them? You cannot escape from God, you must have to do with Him, and He says to you, "Come now and let us reason together, saith the Lord; though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool."

I SAMUEL XVII. 37

I wonder when you have been reading about David did you notice verses 34-37 in chapter xvii. of the first Book of Samuel. Now here we find the secret of David's confidence: He had slain his lion and his bear

before he volunteered to meet Goliath! There were no big crowds to watch those fights! He was all alone with his sheep and he might have said, "No one will know and it can't matter much, its only one sheep." But it was David's work to take care of those sheep and take care of them he did, even at the risk of his own life; and so, while just bravely doing his duty, David proved how real a thing it is to have God's help, and it was knowing how to trust God, and how to fight God's enemies, in God's strength, that gave him the courage to be the champion of God's people, when the time came.

Dear boys and girls, if you want to do great things for our Lord Jesus, begin at once to do the little things well, however little and unnoticed they are. David had been anointed to be the future king of God's great people, but he was not too proud to go back and mind a few sheep in the fields. But see, he minds them as a brave king should; and so, with those of us who belong to God's Christ, there will be honours and glory when He has His glory; but now, to-day, let us be careful how we are "minding our sheep"—doing our every day duty! It does not seem very great or grand work, but the Master is great and glorious, and we love Him and He has given us the work to do, so we may do it for Him! Yes, everything—our lessons, that little job for mother, those errands for father-may all be done to please the Lord Jesus Christ. Does not that make the simplest work great? Then when the "lions and the bears" come prowling round to prevent us doing it well, we shall find how weak and helpless we are to kill them, and be ready for God to teach us what His promise means, "My strength is made perfect in weakness." Perhaps you wonder what sort of "lions

and bears "spoil your work? How about that laziness the other morning when you might have been up early to help mother? That bad temper that made the little ones cry and get cross too? And, remember, if we do not prove our weakness, and God's strength in these "little things," we shall never be ready to stand for God and His Christ as David was, when Goliath defied the armies of the Living God.

THE FIFTH MONTH

"ND Aaron the priest went up into Mount Hor at the commandment of the Lord, and died there, in the fortieth year after the children of Israel were come out of the land of Egypt, in the first day of the fifth month" (Numbers xxxiii. 38).

Ah! the fifth month was a sad time for Israel; during thirty days they were in grief and mourning, for death came in at the beginning,—the death of Aaron the high priest. It was He who, with Moses, had gone to Pharaoh when they were poor slaves in Egypt; it was he who had pleaded on their behalf; it

was he whom God had chosen to carry their names on his shoulders and on his heart before him always; the one who every year had confessed all their sins on the head of the scape-goat, and then had taken the blood that made atonement into the holy of holies, where God dwelt, and sprinkled that blood before and on His mercy seat. And now Aaron was dead! Do you wonder they wept and cried and wore mourning, when the one who had stood for them in the presence of God was gone for ever? It is true that just before Aaron died, his beautiful garments had been taken off and put on Eleazar his son, and he was now high priest; but still it was not quite the same; Aaron had known and loved and cared for them so long that they could not help missing him.

But, dear children, there is a High Priest now who can never die. "They truly were many priests, because they were not suffered to continue by reason of death, but this Man, because He continueth ever, hath an unchangeable priesthood, Wherefore He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them" (Hebrews vii. 23-25). His name is Jesus. He is the Holy One, and He carries all His people on His loving heart and on His strong shoulders. Acts vii. 9

brothers took him down into Egypt, and there they sold him to Potiphar, an officer of Pharaoh, king of Egypt, and captain of his guard. But though Joseph was a slave in Potiphar's house he did not forget that he was God's servant, and God did not forget him. "The Lord was with Joseph," and "the Lord made all that he did to prosper." Potiphar soon found out that his new servant was faithful, and did his work well; and after a time he raised Joseph to be his steward, or chief servant, and to have charge of all that was in his house.

But Joseph's troubles were not at an end. His master's wife spoke against him to her husband, and falsely accused him of great wickedness. Potiphar believed what his wife told him, and he was so angry that he put Joseph in prison, in the place where the king's prisoners were bound. But still the Lord was with him, even there in the prison. The keeper of the prison got to think just as highly of him as Potiphar had done, and he too left everything in Joseph's

charge; "because the Lord was with him, and that which he did the Lord made it to prosper."

Nearly eleven years had gone by since Joseph was brought to Egypt, when two of Pharaoh's servants, his butler and his baker, offended the king; he had them put in prison, in the place where Joseph was, and Joseph had to look after them. One night each of these men had a dream, and when Joseph came in to them in the morning he saw that they looked sad. He spoke kindly to them and asked them why they were sad; so they told him about the dreams, and how they wanted to know the meaning of them.

Now Joseph knew that nothing was hidden from God, and that He could give him wisdom to understand these dreams. So he said, "Do not interpretations belong to God? Tell me them, I pray you." And when he had heard the dreams, he was able to tell their meaning. Within three days the chief butler was to be set free, and go back to serve Pharaoh again; but the baker was to be hanged. Just as Joseph told them, so it came to pass. On the third day, which was Pharaoh's birthday, he made a feast to all his servants; then he remembered these two who were in prison, and it happened to them as their dreams had foretold.

Joseph had asked the butler to remember him when he was set free, and to speak for him to the king. You would think that the man would be sure to remember Joseph after all his kindness, and what he had done; but he did not. He forgot all about him for two whole years; and so for two years more Joseph was left in prison.

At last the time drew near when Joseph was to begin to do the special work for which God had let him be brought to Egypt. He did not know it, but God had been preparing him all this time, first in Potiphar's house, and then in the prison. Since he had come to Egypt Joseph had learnt many things: above all he had learnt to know God as he had not known him before, and when the time came he was ready.

Two years after the butler was taken back into the king's favour, and thirteen years after Joseph came to Egypt, Pharaoh had a dream. He woke up, and went



to sleep again, and then he had another dream. not the same as the first, but something like it. God sent those dreams to Pharaoh. When the morning came he sent for all his wise men and told them thedreams; but not one of them could tell the meaning. Then

the chief butler remembered Joseph. The time had come for which Joseph had waited. Men had not helped him. Potiphar treated him unjustly, the keeper of the prison could not set him free, the butler forgot him. But God remembered him, and now God's time of deliverance had come; Joseph was not only to be brought out of prison, but to come before the king.

The chief butler spoke to Pharaoh and said, "I do remember my faults this day," and then he told him about Joseph. He told him of the dreams which they had had, and that there was a young man in the prison, an Hebrew servant to the captain of the guard, who had interpreted their dreams; and as he had said so it came to pass. Then Pharaoh sent for Joseph, and they brought him hastily out of the dungeon; his prison clothes were changed, and he came before the king. His trials were over; now God was going to raise him up to be next to the king. "Many are the afflictions of the righteous; but the Lord delivereth him out of them all." He makes all things work together for good to them that love God."

God had been with Joseph when he was a slave, and when he was in prison, and still He was with him now. So when the king told his dream, Joseph was able to do for him what he had done before for the butler and baker, and tell him the meaning. He said also to the king, "God hath shewed Pharaoh what He is about to do." Pharaoh believed what Joseph said, and raised him to great honour. He gave him his own ring, and a gold chain, and royal robes to wear; he made him to ride in the second chariot which he had, and they cried before him, "Bow the knee." The man who had been a poor slave was now the greatest in all the land, next to the king himself. God had raised him up so that through him "much people" should be saved from death.

This story makes us think of that Other Who was falsely accused and condemned. He "took upon him the form of a servant"; He went about doing good; and always His Father was with Him in all that He did (John viii. 29). He was killed and laid in the

grave; but God raised him from the dead, and set Him at His own right hand in heaven. Now God has "highly exalted Him, and given Him a name that is above every name; that at the name of Jesus every knee shall bow." Now, because of His death on the Cross, He is able to save to the uttermost everyone that comes to Him, every one that bows at His feet.

ASHAMED OF CHRIST?

OW is it that anyone can be ashamed of Christ? Yet He said, "Whosoever shall be ashamed of Me and My words, of him shall the Son of Man be ashamed." People were ashamed of Him, or He would never have given this warning.

There are such people to-day. There are boys and girls who would have been Christians long ago but for their being ashamed of Christ. What is the reason for this shame? Why is it that there is an idea at the bottom of the minds of some young people that becoming a Christian has in it something weak, something mean, something to be ashamed of?

Some boys have got some wrong ideas of Christ from pictures of Him. It is to be feared that some pictures have done more harm than good by creating a kind of impression in the minds of boys that there was something weak or unmanly about Jesus Christ. But the Bible records show how false such ideas are. What did Christ say or do that you should feel ashamed of? He never spoke a word that He wished He had left unsaid. He never did an action that He wished to undo or do better. His life was one of perfect courage and self-sacrifice.

Moreover, He fought such a fight as had never been

fought before; fought for something that was very precious—for our souls' salvation; fought singlehanded against all the hosts of evil spirits while the angels looked on in wonder: fought single-handed against all the hosts of men, when His disciples forsook Him and fled. Against His single will Satan brought all the forces at his command. Storms of temptation swept over Him in the Garden, but He would not yield; all the torments which cruelty could think of crushed every nerve in His body; every insult that cowardice could invent; every injustice, every treachery, the betrayal by one friend, the desertion by all—blow after blow fell on His heart till they broke it, but He would never give in. See Him on the Cross, His body bruised by the awful scourging, and bleeding from many a wound, and His heart broken by sorrow and wounded love. And above all this there was the terrible burden of the sins which He was bearing in the place of sinners, so that He was forced to cry, "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" He did not yield for a moment, or lose for a moment His trust in God, His Father. And so He died, "the Just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God." And we know how the great victory was won; how on the third day He rose from the grave the Conqueror of Satan and death, and then went back to heaven where the Victor's crown was placed upon His brow.

Ashamed of Him! Ought you not rather to be proud of Him, and in gratitude hasten to enlist in the

army of the mighty Conqueror of our enemies?

And now, if you are ashamed of Christ, what is the reason. The reason for the shame is in YOURSELF. Your sin makes you feel ashamed. Tell Him that you are a sinner and all unworthy of His love and favour,

and then trust Him for your soul's salvation, and He will forgive you and cleanse you and give you the honour of fighting under His banner against the forces of evil.

Don't you think it mean to refuse allegiance to Christ now, when you intend to turn to Him in the hour of need? He who endured the Cross, despising the shame, speaks to you, and says, "Whosoever shall be ashamed of Me and My words, of him shall the Son of Man be ashamed." 

THE CORONATION

HIS month you will all be interested in the coming coronation of King George the Fifth, and will join in the universal prayer of "God save the King."

There is a good deal said in the Bible about crowns and crowning, and much of the ceremony with which King George will be crowned is founded on scenes which are described in the Old Testament.

The King will be anointed with oil in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, and will be invested with the ensigns of his kingly state. He will receive the sword of justice as an emblem of the righteous way in which he is to rule, and the royal robe will be put upon him with the prayer that the Lord his God may endue him with knowledge and wisdom, and clothe him with the robe of righteousness and with the garments of salvation.

Then the orb with the cross is given into his hand with these words: "When you see this orb thus set under the cross, remember that the whole world is subject to the power and empire of Christ our Redeemer."

Next he receives the ring, and then the sceptre is placed in his hands, and the crown put on his head; at the sight of which the people cry "God save the King." Prayer is made that God will crown him with a crown of glory and righteousness and that he may obtain the crown of an everlasting kingdom.

Last of all the Holy Bible is delivered to the King with the words "Our gracious King: we present you with this Book, the most valuable thing that this world affords. Here is wisdom; this is the royal law; these are the lively Oracles of God."

Now for the object of this paper. Each of you also may receive a crown. The apostle Paul speaks of "a crown of righteousness," the apostle James calls it "a crown of life," and the apostle Peter "a crown of glory." In order that you might obtain these, the Lord Jesus was crowned with a crown of thorns, and robed in mockery with a purple robe. Then men took Him and with wicked hands nailed Him to the cross. But God raised Him from the dead. Now He is exalted to God's right hand and crowned with glory and honour. A name has been given to Him which is above every name "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow" (Phil. ii. 10).

"We see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels for the suffering of death, crowned with glory and honour; that He by the grace of God should taste death for every man." Heb. ii. 9.

Will you not bow the knee to Him now and own that He is your Lord and Saviour?

He has said, "Behold I come quickly: hold that fast which thou hast, that no man take thy CROWN." Rev. iii. 11.



NEXT TO THE KING

E was only a slave; he was in prison, too, and had been there a long time. But one day the king of the country, the greatest king in all the world at that time, sent for him in a great hurry, to come and tell the meaning of his dreams. Pharaoh sent for Joseph.

Was he afraid at being sent for like this by such a great king? No; for God was his Friend, and he

knew that God was with him, and would help him. If you have the Lord for your Friend, you need fear nothing. Pharaoh said to him, "I have heard of you, that when you hear a dream, you can tell the meaning of it"; and Joseph answered, "It is not in me; God shall give Pharaoh an answer of peace." He gave God the glory, and let Pharaoh know at once whose servant he was. (See Proverbs iii. 5 and 6).

Then the king told his dreams. In the first, he thought he was standing beside the Nile, the great river of Egypt, when he saw some cows come up out of the water and go into a field. First came seven fine fat cows, and then seven thin and miserable ones; and in his dream the thin cows ate up the fat ones, but yet were no fatter than before. In the second dream he saw seven ears of corn on a stalk, full and good, and seven thin and withered ears, spoilt by the east wind; and the bad ears ate up the good ears.

Joseph told Pharaoh that both these dreams meant the same thing; and he said, "God hath shewed Pharaoh what He is about to do." The seven fat cows, and the seven good ears, both meant seven years; and the seven thin cows and seven empty ears meant seven years of famine. This was the meaning:—God was going to send seven years of great plenty throughout all the land of Egypt, when all the crops should be good and everything grow abundantly; and after that should be seven years of famine, when everything would be scarce and nothing grow well. It was going to be such a bad famine that the seven years of plenty would be forgotten. And the reason the king's dream was double, was to shew that the thing was quite certain, and God would soon bring it to pass.

When Joseph had told Pharaoh the meaning of his

dreams he went on to advise him and tell him what he had better do to prepare for what was coming. He said, "Let Pharaoh choose a wise and sensible man, and let this man, with others to help him, store up food during the seven years of plenty, and keep it in a safe place. Then when the years of famine come there will be food for the people to eat."

Pharaoh listened to this advice and thought it very good. Then he said to his counsellors, "Can we find such a man as this, in whom the Spirit of God is?" He thought no one else could be so wise or sensible as Joseph, so he chose him to be the one to do this great work. Why did the greatest king in all the world, as the king of Egypt was in those days, listen to a poor slave brought out of prison, and do what he said? was God's doing. He spoke to Pharaoh through Joseph; He turned the king's heart to raise up Joseph to power, for He had brought Joseph to Egypt for this very thing. Pharaoh said to Joseph, "Forasmuch as God hath shewed thee all this, there is none so discreet and wise as thou art; . . . See, I have set thee over all the land of Egypt." And he said also, "Only in the throne will I be greater than thou."

So Joseph was made next to the king. Was he very proud at being raised to such high honour, and because he had the king's own ring, and a gold chain, and royal robes to wear, and rode in the king's chariot? No, for he knew it was God's doing, and that he was there to carry out God's purposes. Still he was God's servant, though now he was a great ruler; and his work was to do God's will. He had been faithful in little things; now he was to be faithful in great things. Every one of us should remember that it is God who has put us where we are, and given us

our work to do, and that whatever it is, He wants us to do it for Him.

Joseph was now thirty years old. He went over all the land of Egypt to arrange what should be done about storing up the corn, and all through the years of plenty he gathered food together and stored it up in all cities. So much was collected and stored up that they left off counting how much.

Then the years of plenty came to an end, and the years of famine began. Now the people of Egypt were to find out what Joseph had done for them, and what he could do. The famine was in all lands, but in Egypt there was bread. When the people had eaten what they had, they came to Pharaoh for more; and he said to them, "Go to Joseph; whatsoever he saith unto you, do." No one else could do anything for them, not even the king; only Joseph could give them bread. Everyone who wanted that had to come to the man who had been a poor slave, and do what he told them; then they got it.

So now there is only One, much greater than Joseph, Who is able to give the Bread of Life to all that come to Him. No one else can give it to you; but He says, "I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; he that believeth on me shall never thirst." He says, "Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled." Just as long ago the Lord Jesus satisfied with bread the hungry multitudes that followed Him, so now He will give the living Bread to every one that asks. Go to Him, and "what he saith unto you, do." It is no use going to anyone else.



"It is the second year of Darius the King, in the sixth month, in the first day of the month, came the word of the Lord by Haggai the prophet unto Zerubbabel" (Haggai i. 1). "They came and did work in the house of the Lord of hosts their God in the four and twentieth day of the sixth month" (Haggai i. 14 to 15).



Building the Temple

When the Jews came back from Babylon, they began to build again the temple at Jerusalem, as Cyrus the King of Persia had told them. At first the Samaritans, who lived near, and who professed to worship the true God while serving idols too, wanted to help them, but the Jews refused their help. They were right, for God will not accept works from the hands of those whose hearts are not true to Him. You must come to Him as a lost sinner, and take His salvation before He will accept anything of

yours. And the Lord Jesus said, "No man can serve two masters;" you cannot serve Him and Satan; you cannot love God and love the world; you cannot please Him and please yourself.

Well, the Samaritans were very angry when they found that they were not wanted, so they wrote a letter full of lies to the King, telling him that the Jews were building the *city*, not the temple, and were going to rebel against him. The King was so alarmed that he ordered the builders to stop, and the Samaritans took care that they did so, for they would not allow them to go on.

A long time passed, and the Jews got careless and lazy. They forgot God and thought about themselves, and when they could not build His house, they built houses for themselves, and tried to make themselves happy not caring for His things. But there is no happiness apart from God, and He would not allow them to be comfortable, but sent all sorts of troubles on them, to make them remember Him, and at last a message by Haggai the prophet.

It was on the first day of the sixth month that the message came, "Consider your ways." He told them how forgetful they had been and why they had not prospered, and ordered them to begin to build again. And they obeyed. They confessed their sin; and before the month was over, "they came and did work in the house of the Lord of hosts, their God," and the work prospered. God would not allow their enemies to hinder them again.

His message this month to you is to consider your ways. Do they please Him? Oh! go to Him and confess your sin, and you will find from this day that He will bless you as He did them.

WHAT THE BIBLE TEACHES

ABOUT ETERNAL LIFE

HE wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord. Romans v. 23.

God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in His Son. 1 John v. 11.

God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. John iii. 16.

GENTLEMAN once bought a house in which he intended to live. He engaged servants to live in the house and to keep it in order. 

THE MONTHS OF THE YEAR

THE SEVENTH MONTH

HE ark rested in the seventh month, on the seventeenth day of the month, upon the mountains of Ararat" (Genesis viii. 4). "In the seventh month, in the first day of the month shall ye have a sabbath . . . ye shall do no servile work therein" (Leviticus xxiii. 24, 25). "Also on the tenth day of this seventh month there shall be a day of atonement . . . ye shall do no work in that same day" (Leviticus xxiii. 27). "Also in the fifteenth day of the seventh month . . . ye shall keep a feast unto the Lord seven days; on the first day shall be a sabbath, and on the eighth day shall be a sabbath" (Leviticus xxiii. 39). On the seventh day God rested from His work when he made the world; and the seventh month is also full of It was then the ark rested on the mountains of Ararat, after it had been tossed on the terrible waves of the flood for five months, and Noah and those with him again felt solid ground under their feet. The ark is a type of the Lord Jesus; on Him all the flood of God's judgment against sin has been poured out, but it is all over now; He is resting; He has taken His seat at God's right hand; and because He is there, those trusting in Him have rest too.

Afterwards the children of Israel had four solemn days during that month on which they had to rest. On the first day was the feast of trumpets. The beautiful silver trumpets were then blown over a special sacrifice (Numbers xxix. 1-6) that the people might be remembered before God (Numbers x. 10), but they had to sit still and do no servile work. Again on the tenth

day they were absolutely forbidden to do any work at all. It was the day of atonement, when the priest confessed all their sins over the head of the scape-goat, and sent him away into a land in which no one lived, where none could find him; and then killing the sinoffering he brought the blood into the most Holy Place and sprinkled it before God on and before the mercy seat. The blood at oned for their sin,—it spoke to God of the precious blood of Jesus that has fully put sin away; -but while their sin was being atoned for they could do nothing. You cannot do anything to put away your sin; the Lord Jesus has done it all; it is His work, not yours, that saves;—and His work is finished. Then on the fifteenth day of the month the feast of tabernacles began, and again they had a restday, as also a week afterwards on the eighth, the last, day of the feast. They then remembered all God's goodness to them and rejoiced in it, and rested.

"In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying, "If any man thirst, let him come unto Me and drink." So these feasts tell you that you cannot do anything to make God remember you; you cannot do anything to put away your sin; you cannot do anything to deserve His goodness; but you may believe His love and trust what He has done

and that will give you rest.

THE TEN BROTHERS

WAY in the land of Canaan there was famine too, as well as in Egypt, and there they had no corn stored up to feed them while the famine lasted. So after a time Jacob and his sons had no food to eat. But Jacob heard that there was corn in Egypt; and he said to his sons, "Go, get you down and buy food from thence, that we may live and not die."

So Joseph's ten brothers went down to Egypt to buy corn. Jacob had twelve sons, but Benjamin stayed with his father, and Joseph was gone. Jacob thought he was dead, and still mourned for him; for the brothers had never dared to tell their father what they had done. When they came back from Dothan without Joseph, they had brought with them the many-coloured coat, dipped in the blood of a kid, and had shewed it to Jacob to make him believe that Joseph had been killed by wild beasts. Thus they deceived their old father, and acted a lie, to hide their other wickedness. But the time was coming when their sin should be made known.

Now they were on their way to the land where Joseph had gone as a slave. Did they think of him, and wonder what had become of him? Did they mean to look out for him, in case they might perhaps see him? or did they try to forget all about him? We do not know; but we do know that they never could have expected to find him what he was—no longer a poor slave, but the greatest in all the land next to the king. They were going to Egypt for food; they never thought or cared that they might find there what they needed even more, and that was forgiveness for their sin. They never thought that in Egypt there was one who loved them, in spite of all they had done, and who had the power to do for them what they had no right to expect.

At last they came to Egypt. And when they went to the appointed place to buy, Joseph saw them, and he knew them, but they did not know him. For more than twenty years had gone by since they had parted; he had altered more than they, for he was younger. No doubt he was dressed in the Egyptian fashion, and looked like an Egyptian, and they could not recognize the young brother whom they had sold in this great and powerful man who was governor over all the land. Even his name was changed, for Pharaoh had called him Zaphnath-paaneal. They came, and they bowed themselves down before him with their faces to the earth. So the dreams came true, at which they had been so angry, when Joseph was a boy at home; and "Joseph remembered the dreams which he had dreamed of them."

He remembered, too, their anger and hatred and the way they had treated him, and he did not at once tell them who he was. For he wanted first to make them sorry for their sin, and to find out if they were jealous of the young brother who was left to them, and whether they cared more for their father's wishes than they used to do. So he made himself strange to them, he spoke roughly to them, and asked where they came from; he said they were spies.

They told him they had come from Canaan to buy food, that they were all the sons of one man, and that their youngest brother was left at home with their father. But Joseph pretended that he did not believe them, and that they were spies; and he put them in prison. He said that one of them should be sent to Canaan to fetch the other brother of whom they spoke, to see if they were telling the truth. They must have remembered then how they had deceived their father.

No doubt they were very much frightened at Joseph's treatment, for they knew this great man could do what he liked with them, and even kill them if he chose. If

they had known he was Joseph they might have thought that he would. But they little knew his heart. Joseph was not like they had been when he was in their power; he did not mean to revenge himself upon them, but that they might learn what it was like to be unjustly treated; and he wanted to bring their sin to remembrance. They were kept in prison three days.

And now that they were in trouble themselves they did remember their sin. They said one to another, "We are verily guilty concerning our brother, . . . when he besought us and we would not hear; therefore is this distress come upon us." They did not know that Joseph heard and understood what they said, but he did. "And he turned himself about from them, and wept." He wept for gladness, because they began to be sorry; so now, "there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth."

Then Joseph took Simeon and bound him before them; for he was to be left behind, while the rest were to go back to their father, taking food for their families; then they were to come again bringing Benjamin with them. Why did Joseph keep Simeon in prison? Chiefly, no doubt to make sure that they would come back again, and bring Benjamin; for then he would know what to do.

Then he commanded that their sacks should be filled with corn, and their money also put back into their sacks: and he gave them food to eat on the way. So they loaded their asses with corn, and started for home.

They had got what they came for, but they had not got what they might have had; for they did not know Joseph, and they had not his forgiveness. But when they went again to him, doing what he had told them,

then he made himself known to them, and they found out what he was able to do.

We too need forgiveness for our sins and to know the One who is able to forgive; we need to own our wrong-doing and to ask for pardon. Joseph's brothers did not know that he knew all about them; sometimes we forget that God knows all about us, even



our thoughts. But though He knows, He wants us to come to Him and confess our sins, and then He will forgive them all because of what the Lord Jesus has done; then we shall come to know the One whom to know is life eternal (John xvii. 3).

pictures of what He was going to do, and now that Jesus Christ has accomplished His great work, we may look at these beautiful pictures in God's Book and learn from each some special little part of God's plan. Now, in the second chapter of Joshua, God tells us the history of Rahab, who hid the two Israelites; and this story shows us one picture of how God saves.

Rahab lived in Jericho, a city that was accursed to God (Joshua vi. 17), and she was herself a bad, wicked woman, and yet she and those in her house were saved alive and taken care of, when the rest of the people in the city were killed, and, even in the New Testament, the Spirit of God remembers her among the honourable people of faith (Heb. xi. 31). Now how was it that this woman, perhaps one of the worst in all that wicked city, was saved and blessed in this way? I think we get the answer in Joshua ii. 8-13; Rahab believed that the people of Israel (who, you must remember, at this time only looked like a poor set of runaway slaves, wandering in the wilderness) were really the people of the Lord who was "God in heaven above and in earth beneath," and so it is they whom she asks to save her and her friends. Everything depends on the one to whom we go for what we want. If Rahab had appealed to the king of Jericho he might have had no wish to help her, neither had he the power. But though Rahab had heard only a very little about God, just what was told about His doings for the Israelites, she believed in Him, so far as she

knew, and appealed straight to His people for help, and so she got more than she asked for, because she went to the right place.

Have you noticed that it was a scarlet cord that Rahab was to put in the window? All down the years of time God was looking forward to the great work which His Son was going to do—the work by which alone any could be saved, and so He tells us the cord was scarlet, that it may remind us of the precious blood of Christ that saves from all sin those who trust to it, just as Rahab and her friends trusted to the sign of the cord.

Now I want you to think of one or two things about this history, for always remember these stories in God's Book are doubly true: they are real accounts of actual people who lived and did just what the Bible says they did, and at the same time they are true pictures to show us what God would have us learn about Him, His Son and His mind, and about ourselves and our sins.

Now who were they that told the woman what should be used as a token? The two men of Israel.

Who is going to judge this world in which we live? God.

Who has made a way for any one in the world to be saved? God has.

How many will be saved? Just as many as trust to the way God gave, and to nothing else.

Many of you have Christian fathers and mothers who have told you of Jesus and His blood, but like those in Rahab's family you must come under the shelter yourself to be safe. Just come to God (don't be afraid, for no one loves you as He does), and ask Him to put you under the shelter of the blood of Jesus Christ, own to Him that you are so sinful that in no other way can you be safe, that you are too helpless even to come by yourself but that you want to be saved in the wonderful way that He has made. Perhaps you feel you don't understand much about it? Never mind, God does, and remember it is God that looks at "the token" as it were, and you may be sure that He knows and fully values the work that Jesus did on Calvary.

THE CORONATION

OCAL newspapers will be found to record proudly that His Majesty had generously honoured one of the citizens of their town with an invitation to attend his Coronation in the Abbey.

Perhaps in your dreams you have pictured yourself being invited. I wonder whether you went the length of picturing where you would be placed in that gorgeous assembly?

It will be seen from the pictures that only a particularly favoured few were near His Majesty by right of birth. One of the pictures interested me very much, for it indicated where the beloved Consort of our King, the gracious Queen Mary, and the Prince of Wales sat. They were very near indeed—Bishops, Dukes and hereditary officers of State had no place compared with theirs.

The memory of this scene of splendour is, however, destined to fade, "for the things which are seen are temporal" (for a time); but they have their value in carrying our thoughts to "the things which are not seen (which are) eternal" (2 Cor. iv. 18).

The Queen, the Prince, Bishops and Nobles alike had already acknowledged in their hearts their allegiance to King George or they would not have been there. Their public acknowledgment before the world and their being owned by the King followed this.

King David, in the wilderness of Judah, before he was crowned, looking beyond his own passing glory addresses God in Psalm xliii., telling of his thirst "To see Thy power and Thy glory so as I have seen Thee in the sanctuary."

God, in the sanctuary, had taken David into His

confidence, as He had done Abraham before, about the glorious future when great David's Greater Son should come to reign. This made David's own reign seem to him as nothing.

Have you ever been alone with God in secret? Perhaps the thought shocks you, and you have to admit that your sins have led you, instead, to hide yourself like Adam! But as to these God says: "Come now and let us reason together, though your sins be as scarlet they shall be as white as snow" (Isaiah i. 18).

God has removed the difficulty about our sins and would have us enter into His secret, and to own the Lord Jesus, as Peter did: "Thou art the Christ the Son

of the living God."

He is acknowleged in heaven "Head over all things," but as yet on earth only in the hearts of those who are in the secret. He is yet to be displayed in a brightness and acclaim of glory such as the eyes which have been dazzled with the splendour of the recent Coronation have not seen—their ears too, which have heard the rare music of this country's most gifted singers, have not heard anything to compare with what will be heralded in the Crowning Day that we await.

You have already been invited by God to come and reason with Him; and now for an assurance in accepting the remedy for your sins which He offers you—

"As many as received Him to them gave He power (right or privilege) to become sons of God, even to them that believe on His name" (John i. 12).

You will see, therefore, that you are not only included among those who are invited, but are put in a place of nearness also, for you may attend in the dignity of sonship, as well as in the relationship of a child.

Now comes the test of faith; what we have said

rests upon the word of God, but to many it appears as an idle tale. Abraham was not like these, for he believed God and knew for certain that whatever God had said would come to pass. You also must believe God and accept the promises which He has made in His word. Then you will enter into the blessings of which we have been speaking, and will have a place in that great Crowning Day which is coming by-and-by.

THE MONTHS OF THE YEAR

THE EIGHTH MONTH

"ND Jeroboam ordained a feast in the eighth month, . . . even in the month which he had devised of his own heart" (1 Kings xii. 32 to 33). It was God who appointed the feasts of Israel, and said when they were to be kept. It is the same to-day; if we want to come to God and worship Him, we must come in His way, and worship as He tells us, and not as we think best. The Lord Jesus says, "I am the Way" . . . "no man cometh unto the Father but by Me." "They that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth."

Jeroboam had been one of King Solomon's servants, and a very industrious one too. But when Solomon turned away from God and worshipped idols, God sent a prophet to Jeroboam to tell him that He was so angry with the King that He would take away ten of the tribes and give them to Jeroboam to reign over, leaving only two to Solomon's son. And then He promised Jeroboam that if he obeyed God he should always have them. Yet though Jeroboam had been an

industrious workman, and done his work well, he had no faith in God; he did not believe Him.

And when God's promise came true—as it always does—and Jeroboam was King, he was in great fear lest the people should kill him and go back to Solomon's son. He knew that God had said that the people were to go up to the Temple at Jerusalem three times a year to keep the feast, but he feared that if they did so, they would not return to him; so he set up two golden calves for them to worship, and arranged a great feast on the eighth month, not the seventh which God appointed. It was an imitation of God's worship, but it was really a sacrifice to demons, and God was very, very angry.

The day came, and King Jeroboam went to offer his sacrifice, but a message from God met him there; the altar broke in two, and the ashes of the offering were all scattered on the ground, while the King's arm was dried up so that he could not move it. And Jeroboam, who made Israel to sin, afterwards perished miserably.

So will everyone else who tries to worship God in any other way than by the Lord Jesus, or trusts to anything else than His death and precious Blood to cleanse them from their sins.

There used to be an old battered safe standing in

the Broadway, New York, on which was the notice: "It stood the test; the contents were all saved." It had been in one of the hottest fires New York ever saw, but the old safe had carried its treasure safely through it all. No life is so safe as that which is guided and controlled by Christ. No life, indeed, is safe at all unless it is thus guided and controlled. "He that believeth not is CONDEMNED ALREADY!"

So they took the present, and double money, and Benjamin, and went on their way; they came to Egypt, and stood before Joseph. When Joseph saw that Benjamin was with them, he spoke privately to his steward, the chief servant of his house, and said, "Bring these men home, and make ready, for they shall dine with me to-day." As soon as the morning was light, they started for home. Then Joseph sent his steward after them in haste to look for his cup; and it was found in Benjamin's sack. Now the man had said, "He with whom

it is found shall be my servant; and ye shall be blameless." But the brothers would not let Benjamin go back alone; they all went back with him.

Then Judah and the rest came to Joseph's house; for he was still there: and they fell before him on the ground. What did they feel like? They had not stolen the cup, but they knew they had done far worse in years gone by, when they had stolen their brother and sold him for a slave; and they thought that now God was going to punish them for their wickedness. When Joseph asked what they had done, Judah answered for them all, saying, "God hath found out the iniquity of thy servants."

But Joseph wanted still further to try them, so he said that Benjamin should stay and be his servant, and the rest might go. Then Judah came near to him and told him all about it, and how Jacob had feared to let him come; he told him what he had promised his father, and he begged that he might stay and be a slave instead of Benjamin; for he said, "How shall I go up to my father, and the lad be not with me?"

When Joseph heard Judah pleading like this for Benjamin, he was so glad and his heart was so full that he could not control himself any longer. He ordered everyone to go out of the room except his brothers, and then he made himself known to them. He said, "I am Joseph, doth my father yet live?" When his brothers heard that he was Joseph, they were so frightened that they could not answer him. But he said to them, "Come near unto me, I pray you." And they came near. Then he said again, "I am Joseph your brother, whom ye sold into Egypt." But he told them not to be angry with themselves, because they had sold him; for he said, "God did send me before you to preserve

life." He told them that the famine, which had already lasted two years, was going to last five years longer, he told them how God had raised him up so that lives might be saved, and he said, "So now it was not you that sent me hither, but God."

How wonderful it all was! They found that the great lord whom they had feared so much was their own brother; and in spite of all they had done, his heart was full of love to them. Now he knew that they were sorry, he was ready not only to forgive them, but to provide for them everything they needed. They were to go and tell their father, and bring him to Egypt, and there they should dwell under Joseph's care and know no want all through the time of famine. "He kissed his brethren—and after that his brethren talked with him." At last they knew Joseph, and were forgiven.

Just as Joseph's brothers were afraid because they did not know him, so there are some now who do not know the Lord Jesus, and His great love, and how ready he is to forgive. But if you will only come to Him as He has told you in His word and confess your sins, He will forgive you as He has promised. Then, when you know Him, you will find there is nothing to fear: His heart is full of love to everyone of us and "He is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think," and He will take care of you always.

"When I was dressed to go to ride yesterday, and the carriage came, and there was no room for me, I went into the house, and aunty told you I behaved very good about it. She said I didn't cry, or anything; but, mother, I thought wicked things, and I ran upstairs, and lay down, and kicked and kicked and kicked, I was so, so mad. father, after he was made known to his brothers. "Thus saith thy son Joseph, God hath made me lord of all Egypt: come down unto me, tarry not." And Jacob was not to come alone: he was to bring with him all his children and grand-children, and all that he had. Then he would be near to Joseph, and Joseph would care for him and for them through the five years of famine yet to come. How glad he would be to hear such good news!

But this was not all. The king of Egypt, the great Pharaoh himself, sent an invitation too; for he heard that Joseph's brothers had come; and it pleased Pharaoh well. This was his message, "Come unto me: and I will give you the good of the land of Egypt." Perhaps you may have heard that the invitation of a king is a command: no one may refuse such an invitation. So Pharaoh said also, "Now thou art commanded, this do ye—and come." The great God of heaven, the King of all the earth (Psalm xlvii. 7), has sent an invitation to everyone who reads these words, and His invitation is a command too. It is the same command as Pharaoh's to Jacob—"Come."

If you read through the 45th chapter of Genesis you will find that word repeated several times over. First Joseph says to his brothers, "Come near unto me, I pray you." They came near, and were forgiven; they knew his love, and then they were sent with the invitation to others. Then (v. 9) Joseph gives the message which they are to carry, "Come down unto

me, tarry not"; then Pharaoh says, "Come unto me" (v. 18), and yet again, "Come" (v. 19). So also through the Bible you will find God's invitation repeated again and again. Look for it in Isaiah i. 18, Matthew xi. 28, John vi. 35, 37, and vii. 37, as well as in other places which you can find for yourself.

When Pharaoh and Joseph sent that invitation to Jacob and his family, there was to be no delay. They were to come at once. "Tarry not," says Joseph; and again, "Ye shall haste and bring my father down" (v. 13), and so of God's invitation we read, "Behold now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians vi. 2).

In Genesis xlv. we read that they were *all* to come, "children and children's children, and all that thou hast" (v. 10); the brothers were to bring their father, their wives, and their little ones (v. 19). And so we read (John iii. 16) how God gave His Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. "Whosoever will may come" the hymn reminds us; and whosoever, as a little boy once explained, means" you, me, or anybody else."

There was nothing to hinder Jacob and his family from coming, nothing they need mind leaving. "Regard not your stuff," said Pharaoh, "for the good of all the land of Egypt is yours." That means, "Don't trouble about anything you have to leave behind; you will find here everything you can possibly want." So no one will ever regret anything they may give up to obey the Lord's command and come to Him. "Rather seek ye," said the Lord Jesus, "the kingdom of God, and all these things shall be added unto you" (Luke xii. 31). "My God shall supply all your need accord-

ing to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (Philippians iv. 19).

They had no trouble about the journey; everything was provided for them. Waggons to ride in were sent from Egypt (v. 19); food for them to eat on the way (v. 23); they were given clothes to wear (v. 22), and the promise of all they should need when they arrived (verses 11, 18 and 20). All they had to do was to come. And so will the Lord provide for those who come to Him; "they that seek the Lord shall not want any good thing"; "there is no want to them that fear Him."

"And the children of Israel did so" (v. 21); they obeyed the king's command. They went up out of Egypt; they came into the land of Canaan to Jacob their father; and they told him all. At first Jacob could not believe them; it seemed too good to be true. But when he saw the waggons that Joseph had sent, his spirit revived, and he said, "It is enough . . go." And so they came; Jacob and his sons, and his sons' sons, his daughters and his sons' daughters, not one was left behind. There were nearly seventy of them, not counting the sons' wives, but there was not one too many, for the king's invitation said all. came into Egypt, as the king had commanded. you obeyed God's command and come to Him? Perhaps you think it is too good to be true that you may come; but God's Holy Word tells you to come, and all you have to do is to obey.

What a welcome they had, when they got to Egypt! Jacob sent Judah on before him to tell Joseph they were coming, and Joseph made ready his chariot, and came all the way to Goshen, on the borders of Egypt,

to meet his father, and presented himself to him. What a happy meeting! Jacob had never thought to

see his dear son again, or to know such happiness; so those who obey the Lord's command and do what He tells them will find a happiness they never knew before. And what a welcome He gives! You will find a little picture of that welcome in the story of the prodigal son in Luke xv., "When he was yet a great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion him, and ran and



fell on his neck and kissed him." Don't you want to come?

THE TENTH MONTH

"O Esther was taken unto King Ahasuerus into his house royal in the tenth month, which is the month Tebeth, in the seventh year of his reign" (Esther ii. 16).

A little captive orphan girl, without father or mother,

and far, far away from her own dear land! Such was poor little Esther in her girlhood. But God cared for her; He loveth the fatherless; and she might truly have said, "When my father and mother forsake me then the Lord will take me up." And this is how He took her up. Her grown up cousin Mordecai, who was one of the servants in the royal palace took

her as his own daughter, and educated her as such. A pretty, happy, graceful girl Esther grew; but one thing more than any other made her beautiful,—she was obedient. Whatever her kind cousin wished, she did at

once, and that is why the little maiden's life was so happy. God commands "children obey your parents;" and He gives a special promise to those who honour their father and mother (Ephesians vi. 2, 3).

While Esther was spending her happy childhood with the dear cousin whom God had given to take her father's place, sad things were happening in the palace. The queen had flatly refused to do what the king bade her; and in consequence of her disobedience he refused to allow her to be queen any more, and he said he would take another wife better than she. So all the suitable women that could be found were taken to the royal city to be trained in courtly ways, that the king might choose from them the one he liked best. And among others Esther was taken there. What a change from her quiet home life! But Esther never forgot the lessons of her childhood, and she continued to do what her cousin had taught her, and what he wished her to do, just as she used when he was with her.

Every day her cousin called to enquire for her, though he was not allowed to see her. At last the day came for Esther to go to the king; and every girl on that occasion was allowed to wear or take whatever she liked; but Esther wanted nothing, she wore simply the clothes they gave her; she asked for no ornaments, and she needed none, for she had "the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit which is in the sight of God of great price." And yet how lovely she looked! All who saw her admired her; and when the king saw her he loved her, and he declared that she should be his queen. And so the crown and the throne that were lost by disobedience, were given to the obedient one; and the once little captive orphan became the bride of the greatest king then in the world.

The Lord Jesus was always obedient when He was here. As a Child He was "subject to His mother and Joseph;" and He was always doing the things that pleased His Father. "He became obedient unto death even the death of the cross." There He was punished instead of you and me, the disobedient ones. And so He became the "Author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey Him."

THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL IN SINAI

They first came to the wilderness of Sinai in the third month after they left the land of Egypt (Exodus xix. 1). They had passed through Succoth (xii. 37), Etham (xiii. 20) and encamped before Pihahiroth (xiv. 2), then they went through the Red Sea on dry land (verses 22-29) into the wilderness of Shur (xv. 22), came to Marah (xv. 23) where the bitter water was made sweet, then to Elim (xv. 27), to the wilderness of Sin (xvi.) where manna was first given, through Dophkah and Alush (Numbers xxxiii. 13) to Rephidim (Exodus xvii. 1), where God gave them water from the rock, and from Rephidim they came to Sinai.

The tabernacle was finished and set up nine months later, in the first day of the first month of the second year after they left Egypt (Exodus xl. 17). On the first day of the second month of that year God told Moses to number all the people (Numbers i. 1); and on the twentieth day of the same month (x. 12) they journeyed out of the wilderness of Sinai, where they had been for nearly eleven months.

When they left Sinai they marched as they had been encamped, in the order God commanded, with the Levites and the tabernacle in the midst (Numbers ii. 17). The tribes marched in threes, first Judah, Isaachar and Zebulon, followed by the Gershonites and the Merarites with the tabernacle, which they set up before the

Kohathites came (Numbers x. 14-17 and 21); then came the tribes of Reuben, Simeon and Gad (verses 18-20), and next the Kohathites bearing the holy things (iv. 4-15, vii. 9); then the tribes of Ephraim, Manasseh and Benjamin (verses 22-24), and last came Dan, Asher and Naphtali (verses 25-27). Before all the host went the ark of the covenant of the Lord "to search out a resting-place for them" (v. 33).

In this way did God make His own people to go forth like sheep, and guided them in the wilderness like a flock (Psalm lxxviii. 52). He led them like a flock by the hand of Moses and Aaron (Psalm lxxvii. 20). And so now when the Good Shepherd putteth forth His own sheep, He goeth before them, and the sheep follow Him, for they know His voice.



it indirectly caused the death of an old lady in one of the London streets a few years ago. She had left her home only an hour before to do some shopping, and was just about to cross the road, when suddenly a violent gust of wind caught up a sheet of brown paper and flung it with great force into the face of a horse that was standing near the pavement. The frightened animal reared on its haunches; and, swerving round, came into sharp contact with the lady, who was immediately knocked down, and so seriously injured that a short time afterwards she died in one of the hospitals.

Little thought had she, when leaving her home that morning, that so harmless a thing as a piece of paper would cause her death; but the lesson we all have to learn from such a sad event is whether or not we are ready to meet God, should death so suddenly overtake us.

It was only a scrap of paper, dirty and torn; and a lad, who was grooming his master's horses, saw it lying on the floor of the stable. It had perhaps been lying there unnoticed for many a day; but it proved to be the turning-point for blessing in that lad's history. It was but the relic of an old almanack, that had been torn up and thrown away; but curiosity led that boy to pick it up, and his eyes at once rested upon one solitary verse of Scripture, which was all that that scrap of paper contained; but it did its work that day in the lad's soul. Only two or three years before the lad had left the Sunday School, where he had many times

resisted the pleadings of God's Holy Spirit, and the loving beseechings of his kind teacher to come to Christ. All entreaty, however, had proved to be in vain; and the boy was one of the worst scholars in that school. On the day he left, however, the address had been a solemn one, and the last message that rang in his ears were the warning words of Solomon, "He that being often reproved hardeneth his neck shall suddenly be destroyed, and that without remedy." Quite carelessly had the stable-lad picked up that scrap of paper, but when his eyes beheld the solemn words just quoted, his thoughts were quickly carried back to that closing address which he had heard in the old Sunday School. In a moment the sins of his youth passed rapidly before him, and he became so anxious about his soul that he could not rest. God's Spirit had begun the work, and the truth conveyed through that scrap of paper brought light from heaven into his dark heart; and God's grace, ere long, brought peace and joy to his anxious soul.

Yet another scrap of paper, and very dirty: but may the words it bore prove God's message of love to your soul, dear reader. It was found between the finger and thumb of a poor, dear, half-paralysed boy, whose dead hand was hanging out of the window of a wretched tenement in one of the slums of London. Divine love had drawn the little sufferer to the feet of Jesus, to find in Him a precious Saviour, who had laid down His life for the children. Having proved for himself that "the blood of Jesus Christ, God's Son, cleanseth from all sin," his one desire was now to serve the One "who came to seek and to save that which was lost;" but what could a poor penniless boy do to please Him?

An earnest request to his mother to supply him with a pencil, and any bits of paper she could find upon the floor, had been responded to; and for many a day the little sufferer had spent his time in writing texts of Scripture upon them, and dropping them out of the open window, near which he lay, in the hope that some passer-by might pick them up. The conscious joy of sins forgiven was not enough for one who had tasted the love of Christ; but his young heart seemed bent on serving Christ; and who shall tell how many passersby may have been brought to God through picking up those silent messages from His holy Word? The day on which he died, the undropped text which was found in the dead boy's hand was one that has converted many a precious soul; for thus the golden record runs, "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." 

HEN Joseph had met his father and his brothers in Goshen, and had welcomed them there, he said to his brothers, "I will go and tell Pharaoh that you have come." He was not ashamed of his brothers, though they were only shepherds, and the Egyptians despised shepherds; while he was the greatest in all the land next to the king. He went and told Pharaoh that they had all come; and more than that, he brought them to the king.

Which of them did he take? Benjamin, who had never been unkind to him? Judah, who had offered to be a slave instead of Benjamin when the cup was found? We do not know; perhaps he took Judah and Benjamin, but he took others too; for there were five who went with him to the king, so he must have taken some of the brothers who had treated him so badly. They were all forgiven.

They could not have gone to the king by themselves, for ordinary people may not go into a king's presence just as they like, and they were not even Egyptians, they were strangers. They could not go without Joseph; but Joseph could bring them, and he did. So we cannot come to God, except by the Lord Jesus; He said Himself, "No man cometh unto the Father but by Me." But He can bring us to God.

Many years ago I remember hearing the story of a little Scotch boy in whose home there was trouble. Queen Victoria was then reigning in this land, and the little boy had heard that she was good and kind. He thought that if he went and told her all about it, she would help them. So he started off to the place where she was, though there were many miles to go, and he had to walk, for he had no money. But alas! when he

got there he found that the sentry at the gate would not let him pass. He could not go in to see the Queen.

The poor little boy was so disappointed that he sat down by the wayside and began to cry. While he was crying a bigger boy came along, and asked him what was the matter. "Oh!" said he, "I want to see the Queen, and yon mon winna let me gang." "Why do you want to see the Queen?" asked his new friend; and he told him. "Come with me," said the big boy, "I'll take you to the Queen." The little boy was afraid that he would be stopped too, but he went with him; and when they came to the gate, all the soldier did was to salute and let them pass. For the big boy was the Prince of Wales, the Queen's eldest son; no one might stop him from going to his own mother. He took the poor boy in to see the Queen, and the Queen kindly listened to his tale and did what he asked.

Joseph could take his brothers into the king's presence; the Prince of Wales could take that poor boy in to see the Queen; but the Lord Jesus, God's own Son, can do far more for us. He is able to save to the uttermost all those who come unto God by Him; and He will never turn anyone away, for He has said, "Him that cometh to Me I will in no wise cast out."

Pharaoh talked with Joseph's brothers and asked them what was their work; he said that they should dwell in the land of Goshen, where there was good pasture for their flocks; and he told Joseph that if there were any of them good at their work they should look after his cattle, and be servants of the king. So they dwelt in the land where the king had said, and prospered therein; and Joseph gave them food all through the years of famine. They had everything the king had promised before they came.



GOD, THE CHILDREN'S TEACHER

N Psalm lxxi. verse 17 David says, "O God, Thou hast taught me from my youth." David was a very great man, and at the time when he used these words he wore a crown and ruled a kingdom, But he needed to be taught; and he tells us that he had been to school, and that the wisdom which he had was given to him by the Teacher Who taught in that school.

David did well in life, because he had been well taught in his youth. One of the saddest things which it is possible for a man or woman to have to say is, "It might have been so different with me." Yes, many a boy and girl when they grow up are forced to cry, "It might have been, it *might* have been; and it is my fault that it is not. I did not pay heed to that which I was taught."

No doubt David had other teachers; but all the teachers he had would have been of little use to him if he had not also been taught by God. Your teachers can get at your ear, but God gets at the heart, and that is where we most need to be taught. Suppose my watch got out of order, so that it would not go, and I could not get it open, all I could do in polishing up the gold outside or cleaning the glass would not make it go. I must take it to some watchmaker who could get at the inside, and who could get at the mainspring, or clean out the wheels. Now, God can get at the heart, which is like the inside of the watch. That is why we need God to be our Teacher.

Have you ever thought how very kind it is of the great God to become the Teacher of children? He

made the blue sky, the sun and the moon, and all those bright stars which we see at night, and piled up the big mountains, and He is so great that all the things in this world are just like nothing when compared to Him; and yet He stoops to teach boys and girls!

God teaches us to value our souls. How many boys and girls pay a great deal of attention to their bodies, what they shall eat and drink, what they shall wear, and what they shall play at, and yet forget all about their souls, their real self. And God teaches us to see our sin, so that we may be led to feel our need of the Saviour. And God teaches us to see where the remedy for our sin lies, even in the Lord Jesus Christ. So that those who have been truly taught by God come to the Lord Jesus and commit their souls to Him to save them from their sins.

But it is terribly sad to think how many dear boys and girls refuse to be taught. They will not learn to value their souls; they refuse to take the place of the lost sinner; and they do not come to the Lord Jesus for pardon. And later on, when it is too late, when death has carried them away, they will be forced to cry that awful cry, "It might have been so different, had I but been willing to be taught by God."

Will you not enter God's school without delay? God is the Teacher you must have if you are to live so as to please Him in this world and live with Him in heaven in the next. He is a most wise, patient, and loving Teacher. He is the very One you need. God's school is open to all. Where is the scholar? The scholar, where is he? The scholar, where is she? May you answer like young Samuel, "Here am I."

ALL HIS LIFE LONG

EVENTEEN years after Jacob and his sons had come to the land of Egypt at the king's invitation, the time drew near that he should die. Jacob had not lived to so great an age as his father Isaac and his grandfather Abraham, but still he was an old man, much older than anyone you have ever known, for "the whole age of Jacob was an hundred-and-forty-seven years."

In his long life Jacob had known many troubles, and he had travelled far; but everywhere and in everything the Lord had been with him, as He had promised him at Bethel. God had been with him, and had kept him in the way that he went, and had given him bread to eat, and raiment to put on, and had brought him again to his father's house in peace (see Genesis xxviii. 20, 21). All through the years since then He had been with him too, and now that the time had come for Jacob to die, he was not afraid, for he knew that God was with him still.

During those last quiet years of his life when he was living in the land of Goshen with his dear son Joseph near by, and Joseph's children to come and visit him, He had time to look back over the years that were past and remember all that God had done for him. He remembered how God had first appeared to him at Bethel, more than seventy years before, when he was journeying alone and in fear of his life; that was the time when he saw the ladder set up from earth to heaven. He remembered how God brought him back to Canaan twenty years after, with flocks, and herds, and servants and children; how He had delivered him from

Esau's anger; how He had taken care of Joseph in Dothan, and in Potiphar's house, and in the prison, and had given him favour with the king, and raised him up to be a blessing to others; and last of all how He brought Jacob himself and his sons to Egypt, there again to meet with Joseph. Jacob thought of all these things, and his heart was full of thankfulness to God.

When he was lying ill, Joseph and his two sons, Manasseh and Ephraim, came to see him. These sons of Joseph had been born before the years of famine came, more than 19 years before, so they were now almost men; although to Jacob in his old age they were only boys. When Jacob heard that they had come, his thoughts went back again to Bethel, and what had happened there so long ago, and then again he told how God had appeared to him there and of the promises He had made. He knew how many of those promises had already come true; he believed that God would fulfil also the promise that the land of Canaan should belong to his children, and he said that Ephraim and Manasseh should be as his own sons, and have each a special share in the inheritance. That is why, among the twelve tribes, there were two called Ephraim and Manasseh, instead of only one called Joseph.

Then he told Joseph to bring them near, that he might bless them, for his eyes were dim with age, and he could not see. Jacob kissed them and embraced them, and he said to Joseph, "I had not thought to see thy face, and God hath shewed me also thy sons." Then Joseph took his sons and put Ephraim on Jacob's left hand, and Manasseh on his right hand, and Jacob stretched out his hands, and laid them on their heads, saying, "God, before whom my fathers Abraham and Isaac did walk, the God which

fed me all my life long unto this day, the Angel which redeemed me from all evil, bless the lads." So we read in Hebrews, "By faith Jacob, when he was dying,

blessed both the sons of Joseph."

Jacob blessed Joseph also, and then he called for all his sons to be gathered together and he blessed them every one; but Joseph's blessing was the best of all. He blessed them as he had been blessed himself, because he knew that God had been with him and had taken care of him, and he believed that God would do the same for them.

You would be surprised to find how many times in the Bible we read of "the God of Jacob." The same God who cared for Jacob and blessed him all his life long is able to do just the same for you. "The mighty God of Jacob" will never fail anyone that trusts Him. Whatever our troubles or difficulties may be, still "the Lord of Hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge." (Psalm xlvi. 7, 11). And "Happy is he that hath the God of Jacob for his help." Have you?
