A THOUGHTFUL, SYMPATHISING LITTLE MAID

Leprosy is a striking type of sin; and what earthly king can cure that, and what amount of silver and gold could procure redemption from its cruel power? Elisha, the man of God, was the only one in that day, who, as God's prophet, had the mind of God; and, in this interesting narrative, he shines out as a beautiful type of our Lord Jesus Christ. And it was so, when Elisha, the man of God, had heard that the King of Israel had rent his clothes, that he sent to the King, saying, "Wherefore hast thou rent thy clothes? Let him come now to me, and he shall know that there is a prophet in Israel."

How all-important are those words, "Let him come now to me," and how they breathe the spirit of Jesus, the true Elisha, who never turned any away that came to Him, and who not only healed the blind, the halt, the deaf, and the dumb, but (needless to say) also cleansed many lepers, yea, all who came to Him! "So Naaman came, with his horses and with his chariot, and stood at the door of the house of Elisha. And Elisha sent a messenger unto him, saying, Go and wash in Jordan seven times, and thy flesh shall come again to thee, and thou shalt be clean. But Naaman was wroth, and went away and said, Behold, I thought he will surely come out to me, and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, and strike his hand over the place and recover the leper."

Alas! dear children, how proud we all are by nature, preferring our own thoughts to God's Word, and our

"Behold, I thought," says Naaman, "he will surely come to me," evidently expecting the prophet to make a great fuss over him, although he was only a leper; but God's Word, through His servant's lips, was simply to wash seven times in Jordan, that wonderful river whose waters had more than five centuries before, rolled back when Israel entered the promised land, and not long before Naaman's visit had twice been parted when smitten by Elijah's mantle, and Elijah and Elisha had each passed over on dry land. But this did not suit Naaman's proud thoughts, and so, turning away in a rage, he said to his servants, "Are not Abana and Pharpar, rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? May I not wash in them and be clean?"



His life in England was spent on a farm with his parents, but they died and left him without a home, so he decided to cross the water and make a home in that far country.

The first letter received from him written on board was a sad one. He felt it was not well with his soul,

BIBLE SEARCHING QUESTIONS FOR JANUARY

Our readers are asked to notice that the questions this month begin a new series, in which the Junior and Senior questions appear in one list, those for Juniors only being marked by a star (*). The Juniors should send their answers as usual before January 20th, addressed "Questions," c/o Mr. F. E. Race, 3 and 4, London House Yard, Paternoster Row, London, E.C. Answers to be as far as possible in the words of the Bible, and chapter and verse to be given. Initials of those answering correctly will be published in March, if the Lord will. At the end of six months, books will be given to those who have answered most correctly and carefully during that time.

Those under 12 do the four questions marked *; over 12 and under 16 do the four marked ones and two others; the seniors do the four questions not marked, and any others also if they wish.

Questions for Juniors and Seniors

- 1* What are we told in the first ten words of the Bible as to when and by whom the world was made?
- 2* Find and write a verse from Nehemiah which tells who made the heavens and the earth and all things that are therein. (Nehemiah ix.)
- 3. Quote two verses from the book of Acts (chapters xiv. xvii.) which tell us the same thing; and give references to at least four other similar ones in the Psalms or elsewhere.
- 4. Quote at least three verses from which we learn that the heaven and earth were made by the word of God.
- 5. What do we read in the Psalms, the book of Proverbs, and Jeremiah, about the wisdom and power by which the heavens and the earth were made?
 - 6* Find and complete the following:—
 - (a) "God that made the world" (Acts xvii.)
 - (b) "By the word of the Lord were the heavens made" (Psalm xxxiii.)
 - (c) "The Lord by wisdom hath founded the earth" (Proverbs iii.)
 - (d) "Behold, I create new heavens and a new earth" (Isaiah lxvi.)
- 7. What does Peter say in his Second Epistle about new heavens and a new earth? And what does he say that those should do who look for such things? Give references to two other places where we read of new heavens and a new earth.
- 8* What shall never enter the holy city which shall be in that new earth? And who shall enter it?

12 BIBLE SEARCHING QUESTIONS FOR JANUARY

The senior answers should be sent not later than January 25th, addressed "Q.F.S.," c/o Mr. Race as above. A reference Bible should be used, and chapter and verse should be given in every answer. In this division books will be awarded only at the end of he year.

Readers abroad may send their answers a fortnight after they receive the questions, and their initials will be given later.



They no doubt said to themselves, "That man is always speaking about a judgment of God which is coming, and he is preparing that big ship to save his family. We see no sign of judgment. It is true we deserve punishment for our evil lives, but we are all alike. We are doing wrong, but everybody's doing it. Yes, they did wrong all together, but they died one by one.

Boys and girls may sin in a crowd, but they will be punished one by one. A boy who is very quiet when alone, often changes his behaviour when he gets among other boys. He feels bold to do wrong when there are other boys who are eager to applaud him. The presence of others makes him feel safe. He sometimes escapes punishment in the crowd because it may be difficult to find out the true offender and a mistake might be made. But God makes no mistakes. ABOUT THE BIBLE

WONDER if you have ever thought what a wonderful book the Bible is. Without it we should not know anything about God, or about heaven, and the way there; nor why the Lord Jesus came down here to be a man, and gave His life that He might be our Saviour. But in it God tells us everything we need to know about Himself and His Son, about the life to come, about the many mansions and how we may go to them, and how we may live now so as to please Him.

I want you to-day to ask yourself how much you have learnt from the Bible during the past year. Have you remembered, like Joshua, to read God's Book, to think about it, and to do what it says? (Joshua i. 8). Perhaps you have not done this as much as you might. But "the mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear Him," and He gives you now another opportunity to start afresh.

When you read the Bible, always remember that it is not just like any other book, but that in it God is speaking to you; and whenever you read it or hear it read, do not forget to "watch to see what He will say" (Habakkuk ii. 1). Remember that every part of God's Word is meant to teach us something (Romans xv. 4), but it is only by His help that we can really understand what we read, and learn what He has to teach us; and do not forget King David's prayer, "Open thou mine eyes, that I may behold wondrous things out of thy law" (Psalm cxix. 18).

The people of Berea were praised because they "searched the Scriptures daily." Are you like them? Everyone who does that, with prayer that the Lord

will make His meaning plain, is quite sure of a blessing. The Lord Jesus tells us to do it. Let us remember how short our time is (Psalm lxxxix. 47), and pray that other prayer in Psalm xc. 12, "So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom." Let us come to the Lord Jesus as He tells us, and learn of Him (Matthew xi. 28, 29), that so we may follow His steps (1 Peter ii. 21); remembering always that it is God's Word alone that is able to make us wise unto salvation.



MY SIXTH BIRTHDAY

I did not pay a penny for it; I simply took it. And as I looked at the box, I remembered another present I had that day—my dear old dolls' house. But that was not bought for me; no, tenderer memories cling round that: it was made for me.

Ah, how well I recollect having been sent with a message to my father a few weeks before, and how I found him busy with a piece of wood which he was carving into the shape of chimney pots; and when he would not tell me what he was doing, I guessed he was making me a dolls' house! And he was so busy somewhere after that, but I was never sent to find him again till that birthday morning—and there in the dining room stood a lovely dolls' house.

I think I can see it now—with its glass windows and lace curtains, and little green door with a brass handle! Ah, it was a beauty, which you little girls would have delighted in, and it was all the dearer to me because of the love that made it, that spent all that time and trouble over it, to give me pleasure. And when little girl friends sometimes told me of theirs, and said they had bigger ones or thought them better than mine, I used to say "But my father made mine for me you know."

But those were not the only presents I had that morning. By-and-bye, the postman knocked—a loud double—and a brown paper parcel was put into my hands, with my name on it. Though I had not known the dolls' house was coming, Grandmamma knew it, and so—all the way from London to my home in Dorset-shire—she had *sent* me some furniture for it. Inside the parcel was a pretty little sofa covered with red silk, and also a piano. Yes, a real piano, a few inches long, with real notes, that actually played when you struck them.

Oh, you say, "What a happy birthday that must have been!" Perhaps so, but every birthday since then has been happier than that one. Before another year had gone round, I had another birthday—a new one. You know the Lord Jesus said "Ye must be born again," and ten months after that sixth birthday I was "born again." I got a new life, a new nature; I became a "new creature." I was not really happy on that sixth birthday, for I knew I was a sinner, and if I died I should have gone to hell; but God in His mercy showed me that He had a birthday gift for me, a gift which had been purchased for me, as my workbox was, only the price paid was not money, but blood, the

precious blood of Jesus; a gift too that had been made for me, that had required the work, the finished work of the Lord Jesus; a gift too that God sent to me, and all I had to do was to take it. The fear of the Lord tendeth to life; and he that hath it shall abide satisfied; he shall not be visited with evil (Prov. xix. 23).

My son, if thou wilt receive my words, and hide my commandments with thee; so that thou incline thine ear unto wisdom, and apply thine heart to understanding; yea, if thou criest after knowledge, and liftest up thy voice for understanding; if thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as for hid treasures;

Then shalt thou understand the fear of the Lord, and find the knowledge of God (Proverbs ii. 1—5).

had a king to reign over them, there was a woman named Hannah living at Ramah, who was very sad because she had no children. Her husband's name was Elkanah, and he tried to comfort her; but as year after year went by, and still she had neither son nor daughter, Hannah grieved more and more, for she did so badly want a little child of her own.

At last, one day when she had gone with her husband to Shiloh, where God's house was then, Hannah made up her mind that she would pray to God and ask Him to give her a son. This was her prayer, "O Lord of Hosts, if thou wilt indeed look on the affliction of thine handmaid, and remember me, and not forget thine handmaid, but wilt give unto thine handmaid a man child, then I will give him unto the Lord all the days of his life."

While Hannah was praying to the Lord, Eli the

high priest was watching her. Now Hannah spoke in her heart; only her lips moved, and her voice was not heard; and she was crying as she prayed. Because of this Eli thought she was not really praying but only making a mock, and so he rebuked her. But Hannah told him that she was only a very sorrowful woman, that she was not mocking at all, but pouring out her heart to the Lord and telling Him her trouble. Then Eli said to her, "Go in peace; and the God of Israel grant thee thy petition that thou hast asked of Him."

Then Hannah went away, and now she was not sad any more, but cheerful, for she had told her trouble to the Lord and asked Him to help her. He has told us to bring our troubles to Him, and those who do come to Him and tell Him their troubles will find that He can always comfort and help. "Call upon Me in the day of trouble," He says, "and I will deliver thee." Even children have troubles sometimes; and children too may bring their troubles to Him.

But may we come and ask Him anything we like? The Bible says "In everything by prayer and supplication—let your requests be made known to God." So you see we may tell Him of our wants whatever they are. But we must remember that He knows what is best for us far better than we do ourselves, and He may not give us always just what we ask for. A kind mother does not give her little child everything it cries for; the child might want what would do it harm. But His word says, "Let your requests be made known," and then "the peace of God shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus."

Hannah did get what she prayed for at this time. The next day she went away home to Ramah with her husband; and it came to pass after a time that the Lord did give her a little son. She called his name Samuel, which means "Asked of God," for she said, "Because I have asked him of the Lord." And she was very, very glad and happy.

The next time Elkanah went to Shiloh, Hannah did not go with him; she stayed at home to take care of baby Samuel. But later on, when Samuel was old enough, she took him with her, and "brought him unto the house of the Lord in Shiloh"; for she had not forgotten her promise. They brought the child to Eli,



and Hannah told Eli that she was the woman he had seen praying to the Lord. She said to him. "For this child I prayed; and the Lord hath given me my petition which I asked of him. Therefore also I have lent him to the Lord; as long as he liveth he shall be lent to the Lord." So Samuel became the Lord's servant while he was vet a little child. He stayed with Eli,

and helped Eli in God's service.

Every year his mother came to see him, and brought him a little coat to wear. How glad Samuel was to see her! And how happy she was now that she had a

"I AM THE WAY"

FEW years ago, while walking through a country village, I somewhat surprised a little girl, who was returning from school, by quietly asking her if she could kindly tell me the way to heaven. A strange look came over the child's face, as she slowly answered, "No."

"But, my dear child," said I, "don't you go to Sunday School?" to which she replied, "Yes, sometimes." "Well," I added, "don't they tell you the way to heaven at your Sunday School?"; but, apparently bewildered by such a remark, she looked at me with a vacant stare, suddenly turned, and then hurried away, evidently thinking I must be a strange man to have asked her such a question.

May I, however, ask you, dear reader, the same question? If you have any real desire at all to reach that glorious home, surely it must be of some importance for you to know the way to get there! Perhaps you have never given the question a serious thought, or maybe think that all children go there when they die.

If so, let me remind you of Christ's answer to Thomas, when he said, "Lord, we know not whither Thou goest; and how can we know the way?" Yet, only just before, when speaking of His Father's house, Jesus had told His disciples, "I go to prepare a place for you . . . that where I am, there ye may be also." In spite of this Thomas did not understand the Saviour's words till Jesus plainly said, "I am the Way," and hence there can be no other.

How truly did the prophet of old declare, "All we like sheep have gone astray, we have turned every one to his own way"; and, by nature, we all prefer our

own, foolishly thinking that, if we are only sincere in our belief, any way will do. Let Scripture answer, "There is a way that seemeth right unto a man; but the end thereof is the way of death"; and many who are now treading the "broad road which leadeth to destruction" fondly dream that, somehow or other, they will reach heaven at last.

"The way of the wicked, however, is an abomination unto the Lord," whatever that way may be. There is only one way to heaven, it is Jesus; one way to be saved, it is through Jesus; one way to have your sins forgiven, it is to trust the blood of Jesus; one way to be truly happy, it is to know Jesus; one way to be quite sure of heaven, it is to believe the words of Jesus, "Him that cometh unto Me, I will in no wise cast out."

Neither tears, prayers, good resolutions, nor anything you can feel, try, or do, is God's way. God's way is Jesus, and there is no other way, for "there is one God, and one Mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus." On earth, there are many ways and means of getting from one place to another, and vehicles of all sorts at your disposal; but, if it be heaven you wish to enter there is only one way, and Jesus says, "I am the Way." His cross, His death, His blood-shedding, His resurrection, are the one and only way to reach the golden shore; for "it is not by works of righteousness, which we have done, but according to His mercy, that He saves us."

Have you then, dear reader, taken that way, or are you still walking in your own way, and thus missing eternal joy and everlasting peace?

Many years ago, when walking from Pitlochrie to Aberfeldy, I lost my way on the Duke of Atholl's grounds, and, having no one to guide me, got rather

nervous, when, after wandering for many weary miles, I found myself entirely alone, far away from any house, and surrounded by dense masses of forest trees, with no sign whatever of any kind of path to help me. Many a time, during that long and anxious walk, extending over more than eight hours, did I lift my heart to God to shew me the right way, for, having to carry a heavy portmanteau, I had become very foot-sore and tired.

HEN King Charles the First was about to die, he turned to his attendant, Bishop Juxon, and uttered the one word "Remember." He did not say what the Bishop was to remember, but there is no doubt this last word had a very special meaning for both. Now if you will open your Bible and read the first verse of the last chaper in the book of Ecclesiastes, you will find the same word "remember," but this time very plainly telling Whom we are to remember and when we are to remember Him."

"Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth." It is most important for us to remember Him, because it is with Him we all have to do; and to Him we must all give an account, for before Him we shall all have to appear.

"Remember thy Creator" of course must mean, do not forget Him. Do not go on living your life as though you had forgotten Him. We are told a very great deal about Him in the Holy Scriptures which are the word of God. But there are two things specially plain in the Bible about God, and you will find them both in the first letter (or epistle as it is called), by St. John. Turn to it and find it for yourself. In the first chapter and verse five you will read that "God is light,"



and in chapter four and verse eight it says that "God is love."

Now one of the things which light does is to show clearly what is otherwise hidden by the darkness. If, for example, you were to go into a perfectly dark room, you would be quite unable to see whether it was spotlessly clean and prettily decorated, or dirty and ugly. But if a bright light is taken into the

room, you are at once able to see just what it is really like. Swiftly, silently, but very surely, the light falls upon it and although the light does not make the dirty room clean, nor the ugly room beautiful, it does certainly show the need for cleaning and beautifying.

When we remember our Creator then we find out how very unlike Him we are in thought, and word, and deed. He is holy, just and good; but we have all sinned, and come very far short indeed of the glory or character of God. Still more when I remember my Creator, I realise that I have sinned, and that I have come short of His glory. Swiftly, silently, and surely, God's light shows up my sinful state and my real character, that is a sinner ruined by my sin.

God, Who is my light, shows me my utter need; God, Who is love, provided me a ransom, a salvation, a Saviour. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only-begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

Remember, then, that God loves you, and that Jesus died on the Cross of Calvary so that you might not perish and thus be lost for ever.

King Charles' last word was undoubtedly a word of solemn import, and most probably Bishop Juxon faithfully carried out his royal master's request; but of much greater importance are the words "Remember now thy Creator." When is the best time to do this? Now, in the days of youth.

HEN the Lord Jesus came into this world as a little baby, people came from a long way off to see Him. The first who came to see Him were the shepherds, but they did not come

You know that when the shepherds came to see the Saviour He was in a stable, lying in a manger, because there was no room in the inn; but now He and His mother were in the house. When the wise men came into the house and saw the young child with Mary, His mother, they fell down and worshipped Him. How very glad they were to see Him! They opened their treasures, and gave Him the gifts they had brought, gold, and frankincense, and myrrh.

We, too, may come to the Saviour, like these men long ago; but what gifts can we bring Him? And how do we know the way? We have no bright Star to guide us; but God's word is a Lamp to our feet and a Light to our path, and that tells us just to come to Him, for He is Himself the Way. He is the Star too, the bright and morning Star. His word tells us what gifts we may bring Him; the very first is told in Proverbs xxiii. 26 "My son, give me thine heart." He wants our hearts. Have you given Him yours? first thing to do is to give Him your heart and your love, to be His altogether. Then we give Him other gifts, like the wise men; came themselves before they gave their gifts. can we give Him? Ask Him to shew you. The gold may stand for ourselves, and our love and all that we have; the frankincense, which was a sweet smelling spice used in God's temple, for our prayers and praises; and the myrrh, a bitter spice, stands for our sorrows. He wants our hearts: He wants our prayers and praise; He carries our sorrows and troubles. Bring them all to Him, just like the wise men:





A VOICE IN THE NIGHT

OT long ago you read in these pages part of the story of little Samuel, the child whose name meant "Asked of God," the little son God gave to Hannah, in answer to her prayer. You remember that as soon as he was old enough he was taken to God's house, at Shiloh, to be with Eli the priest, and there he learnt to help Eli in serving the Lord.

The "house of the Lord in Shiloh" (1 Samuel i. 24), was the same beautiful tabernacle which the children of Israel had made while they were in the wilderness of Sinai, after the pattern which God shewed to Moses (Exodus xxv. 9, 40). For the house that Solomon built for the Lord (Acts vii. 47), was not made till some time after this, and when David was king the ark of God still "dwelt in curtains" (2 Samuel vii. 2). When Solomon first was king the tabernacle was at Gibeon (2 Chron. i. 3), and the temple he built, that beautiful house of cedar wood, covered over with gold (2 Chron. vi.), was at Jerusalem. But Shiloh was the place which God chose at the first to set His name there (Jeremiah vii. 12; Deuteronomy xii. 11); the tabernacle had been put up there in Joshua's time, after the people had entered the land (Joshua xviii. 1), and it had been at Shiloh ever since.

What did Samuel do at Shiloh? Perhaps he helped Eli to look after the golden lamps, in the beautiful seven branched candlestick (or lamp stand), which stood in the outer part of the tabernacle—the Holy place; these lamps had to be trimmed every morning and lighted every evening (Exodus xxvii. 21; 2 Chron. xiii. 11). Into the inner part of the tabernacle, the Holy of Holies, he might not go; only the high priest might enter there, and that only on one day in the year, the great day of Atonement. (Hebrews ix. 7). For "the way into the Holiest was not yet made manifest" (Hebrews ix. 8), the Lord Jesus had not yet come down here to "bear our sins in His own body on the tree" (1 Peter ii. 24), and to open a way by which we may draw near to God. When He died upon the cross "the veil of the temple was rent in twain" (Mark xv. 38), that veil or curtain which shut off the Holy of Holies

from those outside; and now "by the blood of Jesus, by a new and living way" (Hebrews x. 19, 20), which He has made for us, we may "draw near with a true heart, in full assurance of faith" (verse 22).

Perhaps, too, Samuel helped to change the loaves every week on the golden table of Shewbread, which stood with the candlestick in the Holy place—twelve loaves, one for every tribe. These were to be changed every sabbath day. (Leviticus xxiv. 8). Only the priests might eat of this bread; but now, whosoever will may come to the One who said, "I am the bread of life; he that cometh to Me shall never hunger" (John vi. 35).

But, if Samuel, while he was only a boy, might not help to trim the golden lamps and change the loaves of Shewbread, if there was not much he might do, he would hear about all these things, and, no doubt he often asked Eli to explain to him what he did not understand. And he would hear God's law, and about all the wonderful things that God had done for His people in days gone by. For God's people were specially told to teach their children His commandments (Deut. vi. 7), and to answer the questions they asked. (Exodus xii. 26; Deut. xxxii. 7; Joshua iv. 6).

One part of Samuel's work was to open the doors of the house of the Lord (1 Samuel iii., 15); and always, of course, he was to do what Eli told him. All of us need to learn the lesson of obedience.

While Samuel was still a child at Shiloh, a wonderful thing happened. One night after he had gone to bed, and Eli too had gone to bed, while the lamp of God was still alight in the temple of the Lord, and all was dark outside, Samuel heard a voice call his name. He thought it was Eli calling; so he got up and ran to Eli,

saying, "Here I am, for you called me." But Eli had not called him; and he said, "I did not call you, lie down again." So Samuel went and lay down.

Then again the voice called, "Samuel." So he got up again, and went to Eli; but Eli answered him the same as before, "I called not, my son, lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and he did



not know it was the Lord who called him; but, when again the voice came calling for the third time, "Samuel," he did not get cross and impatient. Again he got up and went to Eli, saying, "Here I am, for you did call me." Then Eli knew that the Lord had called the child.

So he said to Samuel, "Go and lie down; and if the call comes again, say, Speak, Lord, for Thy servant heareth." And Samuel went and lay down in his place. Do you think that he was afraid, because God was speaking to him? There was no need, for "Whoso putteth his trust in the Lord shall be safe." (Proverbs xxix. 25). When again the Lord came and called as at other times, "Samuel, Samuel," he knew who was speaking, and what he must do. Now he did not go to Eli, but he answered for himself, "Speak, for Thy servant heareth." He was ready to listen to what the Lord had to say; and God talked with him in the night.

Have you heard the voice of the Lord speaking to you? He does not speak to us now aloud in the night, yet still He speaks, not only through His servants, but by His written word, the Bible, and with a still small voice in our hearts. Still, "He calleth His own sheep by name." Have you listened? Has He called you? "Come unto Me," He says, and He knows whether you have obeyed His voice: "The Lord knoweth them that are His." If you have not listened to Him before, will you listen now, and say to Him, "Speak, Lord, for Thy servant heareth"?

King David said, "I will hear what God the Lord will speak." The prophet Habakkuk said, "I will.... watch to see what He shall say." If you listen, and hear, and watch to see what He says, the Lord is able to make you, like Samuel, His faithful servant, and teach you day by day to do His will.

What Samuel did was to listen to the Lord's voice, to remember what He said, and to tell what the Lord told him. In this way he came to know the Lord, and to carry His message while he was still only a boy. The

Lord was with him as he grew to be a man; and all the people of Israel knew that Samuel was a faithful prophet of the Lord, truly making known His word and will. "For the Lord appeared again in Shiloh, and revealed Himself to Samuel in Shiloh, by the word of the Lord."



HILE walking out recently with a young cousin of mine, she said to me "Christians are always different from other people aren't they?" It brought to my mind a story which I heard a preacher tell long ago.

He had at one time, he said, a class of Sunday-school children, and missing, several weeks running, one little girl from among them, he looked up her address and went to inquire the reason of her absence. He found the house a large one, where several families lived, and not knowing on which floor the little girl lived he gave an ordinary rat-tat and waited. Presently the door was opened by a woman, and after one glance at her face, he asked "How do you do Mrs. —?" addressing her by the little girl's surname. "But how do you know I am Mrs. —?" inquired the woman, for the preacher was unknown to her. "By your likeness to your child," he promptly replied.

He had told us this story to illustrate how Christians should be recognised by their likeness to Christ. It is well known that persons who are much together, especially if there is a tie of affection between them, grow like one another, they express themselves in the same way, they even think alike.

It is only by keeping very close to the Lord Jesus, seeking to do always the things that please Him, that we can shew the faintest reflection of His love and grace. Two cannot walk together except they be agreed, so if we would have Jesus constantly with us, we must let go all that is contrary to Him, all that is of ourselves.

It is with the humble and lowly that God has promised to dwell, and we shall have much to keep us humble if we are walking with Jesus. As we see more of His beauty, we shall realize more how poor and unworthy we are, and then our hearts will be filled with love and praise, that He could care for us in spite of all. "I S'POSE I WAS BORN BAD"

of less than a year old, even then it was difficult to keep her in my arms, such a restless little person was she, and a little later, she was most mischievous, and seemed unable to resist touching anything placed within her reach.

Once she turned the contents of a treacle tin on to the little table of her high chair, watching with delight the syrup falling in golden crystals. When she was six years old I went to her home, and remained for some months, and Kathleen became very dear to me in spite of her restless, and often, very tiresome ways.

While I could play with her or tell her stories, she would be happy enough. On one occasion she turned on the tap of a cask of expensive oil, and left it running and it was not discovered until a great deal was wasted. I am not sure if it was in connection with this or some other naughtiness that I exclaimed to her, "Oh Kathleen, why can't you try to be good?" and received a prompt reply in these words, "I have tried, and it's no good, I s'pose I was born bad."

At that time I had not myself realized that in the flesh dwells no good thing and until we do so, we cannot enjoy full salvation in Christ, but are always trying to do something in our own strength, especially if we desire, as I did, to please God. So instead of giving loving counsel to the little girl, directing her to that One who died to deliver us from the power of sin and Satan, I was surprised into silence at her reply. Now I know that her young lips unconsciously uttered a great truth. We are indeed "born bad," and all merely human

efforts to do well, are in vain—we must come to Christ as helpless sinners, "for He who knew no sin was made sin for us that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him."

A few years ago Kathleen was staying at my home, and I was glad to see she loved to hear the word of God, and would ask intelligent questions about passages







EBENEZER: THE STONE OF HELP

FTER the time when God first spoke to Samuel in the night, there was a battle between the Israelites and the Philistines; and because the Israelites found they were getting the worst of it, they sent to fetch the ark of the Lord to be with them. But this was a wrong thing to do; for unless God told them that the ark was to go before them (see Numbers iii. 31, iv. 15, x. 33; Joshua iii. 3, 6, 8, and iv. 16), it was not right to move it from its place. Instead of praying to the Lord to save them, they trusted in something they could see; but the ark of itself could not save them, and it was not a sign of God's presence when He had not said that it was to go with them. The people of Israel were defeated by their enemies, and thirty thousand of them were killed; the ark of God was taken by the Philistines, and Eli's two wicked sons, Hophni and Phineas, were killed.

Eli was a very old man now, 98 years old; he sat by the wayside to watch for news, for "his heart trembled for the ark of God"; he knew that the people should not have taken it. And when the messenger came running to tell what had happened, and Eli heard that his two sons were dead and the ark of God was taken, he fell backward from his seat and died.

The Philistines took the ark of God back with them to their country, but they could not keep it. God did not mean it to stay there; it brought troubles upon them; and after sending it about from one of their cities to another, at last they sent it back to the people of Israel. You may read in 1 Samuel vi. the wonderful story of how they sent it back in a cart without a

driver, and the cattle who drew it went the right way of their own accord, for God guided them.

The ark was taken to Kirjath-jearim, and there it stayed for 20 years. Then the people of Israel began to repent and to be sorry for all the wrong things they had been doing; and "all the house of Israel lamented after the Lord." By this time of course Samuel was a man, and he was God's servant and prophet; he spoke to the people and told them three things that they must do. He said "If ye do return unto the Lord with all your hearts, then but away the strange gods and Ashtaroth from among you" (for the people had turned away from serving the Lord, to worship the false gods of the people around, and to do as they did); that was the first thing—" and prepare your hearts unto the Lord"; that was the second—" and serve Him only"; that was the third—"and He will deliver you out of the hand of the Philistines." It was through their own fault and because of their sin that He had not done this already, for He had said long before, "If they shall confess their iniquity . . . then will I remember My covenant" (Leviticus xxvi. 40, 42).

Then the children of Israel did put away their false gods, and served the Lord Jehovah only. Samuel told them to gather all together at Mizpeh, and he would pray to the Lord for them. So they gathered together at Mizpeh, and made an offering to the Lord, and fasted, and confessed their sin, saying "We have sinned against the Lord." But when the Philistines heard that the people were gathered together at Mizpeh, they came up to fight against them; and when the children of Israel heard it, they were afraid. Perhaps they wondered why the Philistines should be allowed to come again just when they had turned to the Lord; but soon they

found that they had no need now to be afraid of their enemies. They said to Samuel, "Cease not to cry unto the Lord our God for us, that He will save us out of the hand of the Philistines." So Samuel did cry unto the Lord for Israel, and the Lord heard him, and answered their prayers. As Samuel was offering up the burnt offering, the Philistines drew near to battle: but the Lord thundered with a great thunder that day upon the Philistines, and they were so frightened that they were easily overcome by the Israelites, and fled before them.

So the Lord saved His people from their enemies when they cried to Him, and He always will. We need fear nothing if we have Him on our side. "I would seek unto God, and unto God would I commit my cause," said the patriarch Job long ago; and king Asa was told by the prophet, "If ye seek Him, He will be found of you" (2 Chronicles xv. 2). The Psalmist, too, was able to say "My help cometh from the Lord" (Psalm cxxi. 2). So it was then, and so it is now.

Then Samuel took a stone, and set it between Mizpeh and Shen, and called the name of it Ebenezer, which means "The stone of help"; that was to remind the people always how the Lord had helped them that day; for He said "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us."

And "the Lord God will help" His people always when they ask Him. But we must turn away from the things that displease Him; "Come unto Me," said the Lord Jesus (and that is to turn our backs on our own way) "And I will give you rest." We must "Prepare our hearts to seek the Lord." How? "Learn of Me," said the Lord Jesus; He will be our Teacher. And "Serve Him only." We must "Seek first the kingdom

of God" (Matthew vi. 33) and He will take care of all the rest.


thee with an everlasting love, therefore with loving kindness have I drawn thee."



HILE staying at the sea-side for a holiday, I attended, with my two children, Services for Children held on the sands. One day a gentleman was speaking to them on the text, "Now is the accepted time, behold, now is the day of salvation." In the course of his address he told the children this story, which he said was a true one, to illustrate his text. He said that he wanted to tell them the story of an alarum clock. Harry was a boy who had just left school and was about to enter his first situation. His father called him to him one day and said, 'My boy, I think that now you will be getting up early each morning, I had better buy you an alarum clock.' Harry was to learn to be an engineer, he would have to start work early in the morning. His father bought a clock and gave it to him saying, 'When you hear the alarum sounding get up at once, or else you will go to sleep again. Just think to yourself I must do it now.' His father impressed this lesson on him and Harry had these three words ringing in his ears 'Do it now, do it now.'



HOW THEY ASKED FOR A KING

tered the land of Canaan they had no earthly king, but God Himself was their King, and He gave them judges to rule over them (Acts xiii. 20). Samuel was the last of these judges; he was Judge over all Israel, from the time when the people gathered at Mizpeh and began again to serve the Lord.

When Samuel began to get old, he made his sons judges also, that they might help him; they were judges in Beersheba, quite in the south of the land, and Samuel dwelt in Ramah. But they were not good judges like their father. They cared for money, and took bribes; that is, when two people came to them for judgment, and one offered them a gift, they gave judgment for that one even if he were in the wrong. This was wicked and unjust; and God had said that His judges were to be "men of truth, hating covetousness" (Exodus xviii. 21), and were not to "respect persons, neither take a gift" (Deut. xvi. 19; see also 2 Chronicles xix. 5, 6, 7,) but they were to "judge righteously" (Deut. i. 16). You see what a bad thing it is to care too much for money, and what we can get for ourselves; "he that is greedy of gain troubleth his own house" (Proverbs xv. 27).

Then the elders of Israel gathered themselves together, and came to Samuel at Ramah. They said to him, "You are getting old, and your sons do not do as you do; now make us a king to judge us like other people." Samuel was displeased when he heard this, for he knew that God was their King (1 Samuel xii. 12), and that He was well able to raise them up good judges as He had done before; the people seemed to have forgotten this. But Samuel did not say much to them at once; first of all he prayed to the Lord to ask Him what he should do. God told him to listen to all that they had to say; He said, "They have not rejected thee, but they have rejected Me, that I should not reign over them." Samuel was to "hearken unto their voice"; but then he was to speak to them very solemnly, and tell them the kind of things an earthly king would do, and warn them that if they had one they would not like everything he did. Samuel did so.

But in spite of all that he could say the people would not change their minds; they still wanted to choose for themselves; they thought they knew better than God. It was perhaps not so wrong to ask if they might have a king, but very wrong to persist in their choice when God by His servant warned them against it. It is not always good to get the thing we ask for. God knows best, and we should leave the choice to Him. The people said, "Nay; but we will have a king to reign over us; that we also may be like all the nations." They wanted to be like other people, though they were the only people in the whole world then who had God for their King. There are people to-day who do not care to belong to the Lord, because they want to be "like other people." I hope you are not one of them.

Samuel listened to all that the people had to say, and then he went and told everything to the Lord. And the Lord said to Samuel, "Hearken unto their voice, and make them a king." They were to have what they wanted. God gave them a king. But though he did well for a while, very soon his heart was uplifted, and

he turned aside out of God's ways.

You may read in the ninth and tenth chapters of 1 Samuel about the way in which Saul was chosen, and how God brought him to Samuel without his knowing why; how some of them did not want him to be king, and in chapter xi. how God gave them deliverance from their enemies through Saul. At last the time came when Samuel called them all together to Gilgal, and there they made Saul king (1 Samuel xi. 14, 15).

Then Samuel spoke again to all the people and reminded them of all that God had done for them in the past. He said, "Now therefore behold the king whom ye have chosen, and whom ye have desired! and, behold, the Lord hath set a king over you." But he told them again that they had been very wrong to ask for a king when the Lord was their King. He asked for a sign from the Lord, and the Lord sent a sign which all the people could see, so that they feared greatly. (1 Samuel xii. 17, 18.) They said to Samuel, "Pray for thy servants unto the Lord thy God, that we die not."

Then Samuel said to them, "Fear not; you have done wrong; yet turn not aside from following the Lord, but serve him with all your heart." He said, "For the Lord will not forsake his people for his great name's sake." They were still God's people, though they had done wrong. And he said, "God forbid that I should sin against the Lord in ceasing to pray for you: but I will teach you the good and the right way; only fear the Lord and serve him in truth with all your heart: for consider how great things he hath done for you."

Is the Lord your King? or do you want to choose for

yourself and go your own way? can you say like the Psalmist "Thou art my King, O God"? and like the apostle Paul in his letter to Timothy "Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, - - - be honour and glory"? If you have come to the Saviour as He has told you, then consider how great things He has done for us; turn not aside from following Him, no matter what other people may say or do; learn of Him "the good and the right way" and serve Him in truth with all your heart.



SAILING

watch the sails go by, the fishing-boats, or yachts, or sailing-ships, you will soon notice that they do not all go the same way. Perhaps you may see two close together, as I did the other day, and then in a little while if you watch them you may see them separate and go off in different directions. The same wind blows them all along, and yet they go different ways. Why is it?

Not long ago I was taken out sailing on the sea in a small yacht. We started out from the little pier near which the boat is moored, and we came back to the same place. Yet the wind did not change; it was blowing all the time in the same direction. How was it done?

Here is a verse which explains it.

"One ship drives east,
One ship drives west,
By the self-same wind that blows;
It's the set of the sails,
And not the gales,
Which determines the way it goes."

That is what makes the difference. It all depends on the man who is sailing the ship, and where he wants to go. The boat I went out in was quite small, only big enough for three or four people, but there was a man in it who managed the sails, and held the tiller, and watched the boat's course, and altered the sails as they needed it so that we went in the right direction. There was one to help him who was all ready to do what he said, and at the word, "Let her come," the tiller was put down, the sails went across, and the course was changed so that we might go where he wanted. He

knew how to manage the wind, or rather, how to make the boat sail before or against the wind. The harbour where we were sailing is very shallow in parts; we had to keep to the proper channels, or we should have been on the mud-banks. Going out we had to tack backwards and forwards; but coming back we drove before the wind. The same wind sent us opposite ways.

We are like little boats, sailing on the sea of life. Which way are you going, your own way, or God's way? Which way do you want to go? Do you let the wind blow you about just as it likes, or have you made up your mind which way you want to go? The wind may be contrary; you may find it hard work to go in the right direction; but it cannot carry you far wrong if you know how to manage "the set of the sails," or if you have a Captain that you obey. "Set your heart and your soul to seek the Lord."

The man who managed the boat I went out in was called Will. Have you ever thought that it is your will which decides which way you go, and whether you go in the right way, God's way, or your own? Perhaps you say you want to go God's way, but you don't know how. There is One ready to help you, to hold your tiller, to be your Captain and Sailing-master. Any ship would soon be in difficulties without a captain or someone who knew how to sail and to steer. He knows the way to sail your boat, and to keep in the channel, and off the rocks and mud-banks. He is able to teach you just what to do, and to guide you all the time. Do you know Who He is? He could say "I delight to do thy will, O my God."

The man in whose boat I went out did not always know how to sail her, but somebody taught him. Now he can hold the helm, and haul the main-sheet—that is

the rope that belongs to the mainsail—and say when the jib-sheet is to be let go, and put her about, and all the rest of it. How did he learn? By doing what he was told by somebody who did know. There was a small boy aboard the day I went out, and he could do things to help, but always he would say, "Dad, shall I do this?" The way for him to help was to do what the captain told him.

So it is with us all. The Lord Jesus Christ is the One Who is ready to be our Captain and Sailing-master and Guide. He knows just what we ought to do to go the right way, and He will teach us if we ask Him—if we want to go the right way—and He is able to bring us safe at last to the haven where we want to go. We can say "Teach me thy way, O Lord"; "teach me to do thy will"; and we know that He will do it, for He is able. We don't know the way, but He knows.

Sometimes quite big ships have to have a pilot on board, when they are going through a channel which the captain does not know. We always want a Pilot, for we cannot go right of ourselves, we do not know the dangers around, nor the rocks ahead. But He is ready, and He is able, to be our Pilot, to steer clear of all the dangers, and to bring us safe into port.

"I will instruct thee and teach thee in the way that thou shalt go; I will guide thee with mine eye."

"So He bringeth them to the haven where they would be."

and even dearer comes to my mind, that of "Home." What pleasant pictures this word calls up to the minds of most of us, what tender memories, and what heart-felt thanks! and what is it makes home a happy place, full of tender associations, but the people who live there? It is true that some who live alone find pleasure in their dwelling-place, but if they are unselfish they are glad to share it sometimes with others.

I hardly like to apply that dear name to a place where I spent some months of my childhood, I think my feet used to lag behind as I neared its doors, for I knew that no pleasant welcome awaited me, but sour looks and often harsh words. We cannot help doubting, as we see some poor children in the streets, whether home is a pleasant place to them, but we can have no doubt whatever that the Home of which the Saviour spoke is full of joy and peace and love. The happiest on earth must be those where the love of God is in the hearts of the occupants, giving them tender consideration one for another. What then can exceed the happiness of God's House where sin cannot enter, where every heart is overflowing with love? Earthly homes are often made sweet by contrast—how pleasant to the worker to find rest and quiet there, after the day of toil—how good it is to come from the drenching rain or the bitter cold into the light and warmth and to see the comfortable meal prepared! But heaven is unchangeably and eternally beautiful. We are not sorry to leave our earthly homes for a time for change and holiday, but once we enter heaven, we shall go no more out, and certain it is that we shall never want to.



ANOTHER KING CHOSEN



And the Lord said, Arise, anoint him: for this is he. Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him [David] in the midst of his brethren.

1 Sam. xvi. 12, 13.

ANOTHER KING CHOSEN

oT long ago you read in these pages of the time when the people of Israel asked for a king, and how Saul became the first king of Israel. King Saul was a tall, fine-looking man, and the people were very pleased to have such a king. When he stood for the first time among the people as their chosen king, we are told that "he was higher than any of the people from his shoulders and upward." All the people shouted, and said "God save the king"; and when they made Saul king before the Lord in Gilgal, all the men of Israel rejoiced greatly. But Saul's heart was not stedfast in the ways of the Lord, and after a few years he turned aside from following Him faithfully.

When he had been king for about two years, the Philistines came again to fight with Israel. Saul called the people together at Gilgal, for Samuel had told him to do this, and had told him, "Seven days shalt thou tarry, till I come to thee, and shew thee what thou shalt do." Because Samuel did not come quite as soon as he expected, to make known to him what he should do, Saul got tired of waiting, and thought he could settle things all by himself. So when Samuel did come he had to tell him, "Thou hast done foolishly: thou hast not kept the commandment of the Lord, which he commanded thee." And he told him that now his kingdom should not continue, but God had sought out a man after His own heart to be captain over His people, because Saul had not kept to what God had said.

But Saul was not at once turned out of his kingdom, and if he had truly repented and walked in God's ways all might have been well. For God has said that if people turn from their evil and obey His voice; then He

will not do what He purposed to do to them because of their evil doings. (See Jeremiah xxvi. 3, 13). Instead of this, again a time came when Saul disobeyed God's command, and the Lord said to Samuel, "It repenteth me that I have set up Saul to be king; for he is turned back from following me, and hath not performed my commandments." Samuel was very grieved at this; and he cried unto the Lord all night for Saul. In the morning he got up early and went to meet Saul; and Samuel had to tell him that what he had done was not pleasing to the Lord, because he had not been obedient. "To obey is better than sacrifice," he told him; and what pleases the Lord is that His people should obey His voice. It is no use to think we can do anything for Him, or give anything to Him, unless we do what He has said.

So, because Saul had rejected the word of the Lord, the Lord rejected him from being king over Israel, and another was chosen in his place. Though Saul was allowed to be king while he lived, his son was not to reign after him; and because he had not cared to follow the Lord and to do His commandments, the Lord left off helping him. It is a very sad story.

Samuel grieved and mourned for Saul; but at last the Lord told him not to mourn any longer, for He had chosen another to be king. He told him to take a horn of oil, and go to a man named Jesse, who lived at Bethlehem; "for," He said, "I have provided me a king among his sons." Jesse had a great many sons, and when Samuel came they were all at home except one. Jesse made seven of his sons to pass before the prophet, and when Samuel saw the eldest, he said to himself, "Surely the Lord's annointed is before him." But the Lord told him this was not the one; "Look not on his

countenance," He said, "or on the height of his stature; . . . for the Lord seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart."

Then the second son came, but he was not the one; and then another, and another, till all the seven had passed by; but Samuel said to Jesse, "The Lord hath not chosen these." And he asked him if these were all his sons. Jesse told him there was one more, the youngest, and he was keeping the sheep. Samuel said, "Send and fetch him." He was only a youth—a stripling he is called in one place—but when he came, the Lord said "Arise, anoint him; for this is he." The One who knows the hearts of all the children of men knew which of those eight brothers to choose, not the eldest, or the tallest, or the best looking, but the one whose heart was right in His sight. This was David, the Shepherd-King, to whom the Lord said long after, "I took thee from the sheep-cote, from following the sheep, to be ruler over my people, over Israel." It is David of whom we read in the Bible so many beautiful stories: how he loved Jonathan, Saul's son; how he killed the lion and the bear that came and tried to steal his sheep; how he fought againt Goliath, the giant, and killed him with a sling and a stone. In all these things David was a type or picture of the Lord Jesus, the Good Shepherd, Who always takes care of His sheep: Who loves us more than David loved Jonathan, and Who overcame for us a greater enemy than Goliath.

It was not that David never did anything wrong; he was only a man; he was a sinner like all of us, and some of his sins were great sins. But when God sent His servant to rebuke him, David repented and humbled himself before God, and God pardoned his sins,

though he had to bear the consequence of them in this life. You may read in Psalm 32 and Psalm 51 of his sorrow and repentance when he sinned against God, and how God forgave him. Many other psalms he wrote as well as these two, in which he tells of God's goodness to him. Just in the same way God will forgive us if we repent of our sins and come to Him for forgiveness, as David did, not justifying himself, as Saul did, but owning and confessing his fault. "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins," because of the One who did more than David, the Good Shepherd who gave His life for His sheep; and "the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin."

THE TWO FRIENDS

AM going to tell you about two little girls who were great friends. Their names were Kweihsiang and Anloh. Kwei-hsiang, or "Precious Fragrance," was four years old, the daughter of one of our eservants. From the time she was a tiny baby she



had come with her parents to the "Jesus Hall," as our place is called, and although so small, she had learned to love Jesus and to pray to Him in her childish way. But how much that little heart had already understood of CHRIST'S love, we did not know, and only found it out later.

Anloh, or "Peaceful

Joy," was the daughter of our matron in the Girls' School. The grand-daughter had been the first one to teach her to pray to GoD, and to sing:

> "JESUS loves me, this I know, For the Bible tells me so, Little ones to Him belong, They are weak, but He is strong. Yes, Jesus loves me," etc.

Later on the child was living with her mother in the school, where she daily heard about the Good Shepherd and His love for little children, and quietly the good

seed had dropped into that little heart and taken root, and one day GoD gave us the joy of seeing the fruit.

In the summer of 1907 a smallpox epidemic was raging in the city, and these two girls contracted the disease. Anloh was taken back to her home, where she could be isolated, and there her mother nursed her night and day, whilst Kwei-hsiang was lying very ill in her home, anxiously watched by her mother. Day by day the dreadful disease grew worse, and at last the poor parents saw that there was no hope of keeping their little

daughters, but that GoD wanted these two small flowers for His garden above. They were sorry to let them go, and prayed earnestly that GoD would not take them, but let them stay on here for a while longer, and yet they wanted Him to do the best for them and for their little ones.

And God did answer their prayers. He could not let the two sweet flowers grow up in this wilderness of sin and sorrow, as He wanted them in Heaven,

but He made it easy for their parents to let them go, and comforted them so much, that I think they would not have called their children back, even if they had had the power to do so.

And now I will tell you how He did it. One day little Anloh said to her mother: "Please mother, will you wash me and dress me in all my new pretty clothes, for I am going to the LORD JESUS in Heaven, He is coming for me, and therefore I must be clean!" Her mother did as she wished, and Anloh was pleased and satisfied. A little later she said: "I want Kwei-hsiang to come too. We two must go together to the LORD JESUS!"

At the same time little Kwei-hsiang was telling her parents that she had to leave them. Once she said: "I am going to Heaven, I want my pretty clothes, and then my nice cup, which I got at the 'Jesus Hall,' I must have that with me, and then father, mother, and I will all go to Heaven." But a little later she added, "No, I must go first, and father and mother will come afterwards!" The parents wondered where her words came from. They said that it could not have been the child herself speaking, but God's Spirit through her, to comfort their hearts; for she was their only child, and the separation was hard.

The afternoon wore on, the day would soon draw to a close, and at the same time the earthly lives of those little ones were fading, and there was quiet sorrow in the two homes, only about two minutes' walk apart. Anloh called out several times: "Kwei-hsiang, Kwei-hsiang, we must go now!" A little later she cried again: "Well, if you do not come now, I must go on without you, I cannot wait any longer!" and then the sweet little girl drew her last breath and went to the bosom of the children's Saviour and Friend.

Less than an hour later Kwei-hsiang joined her in that happy home, where they will never know the sin and sorrow so many of us must pass through here. In life they had been friends and daily playmates, and in death they were not separated. Together they went to the LORD JESUS to live in His Paradise, and there they are waiting for us. Shall you meet them there? Do you love their Saviour?

They rest together in the little cemetery outside the city of Yüshan. All our school-children went with us to the grave, and there we sang of the beautiful land, where our little friends had gone, and we prayed that

each of our boys and girls might soon learn to love the LORD JESUS, so as to be prepared for His home.

Contrary to Chinese custom, we put a stone on each little grave, as we thought it might be a comfort to the parents. On Anloh's stone we wrote, "Suffer little children to come unto Me!" And on Kwei-hsiang's we carved the beautiful words: "He shall gather the lambs with His arm, and carry them in His bosom!"
