## THE BIBLE

THE Bible is the most wonderful Book in the world. No book is so loved and so hated. Millions of copies of the Bible, or portions of it, are printed and distributed every year; and it has been translated into hundreds of different languages. The Bible is a miracle. In a sense it is not one book at all, but a library of a number of different books written by different people at different times and in different styles. But although there are many writers, there is but one Author, and He is GOD.

For the Bible is the Word of God. It was not dictated by God, but written by men inspired by His Spirit to tell us His mind, His will, and His love. The Bible has always had the power to convince the best people in the world that it comes from God. And to-day it speaks to our hearts with the voice of God. As a native said to a missionary, "The One who wrote that Book made my heart."

The Lord Jesus, you may remember, often mentioned His Bible, that is our Old Testament. As a boy He had learnt many passages by heart, and He always referred to it as the Word of God.

And after He had returned to heaven He continued to teach His apostles by His Spirit from the unseen world, as He had promised He would do. And this further teaching we have in the Acts, the Epistles, and the Apocalypse.

Of course the Bible contains things hard to be understood, for it is GOD'S Book. And God could not make known

what He wanted people to learn about Himself, all at once. You would not teach a little child of five higher mathematics. And so God gave the teaching about His character and purposes, as people were able to understand.

Then, who has not been charmed by the beautiful stories of Joseph and Ruth, and thrilled by the exciting accounts of David and Daniel? The Book of the Acts is the travel book of the New Testament and is full of the adventures of the early Christians, especially of that Great-Heart the Apostle Paul.

But the most wonderful stories are the stories of Jesus found in the Gospels. There are no other stories like them anywhere, because there was never anyone like the One about whom they were written. Sit down with your New Testament with the idea of getting close to Jesus, observing His actions and listening to His words. And try to catch the meaning and lesson for our own day and for your own life.

For the great central subject of the Bible concerns YOU. It tells about God, and how to know Him, and how to get your sins forgiven, and how to live the victorious and useful life.

If you don't find the Bible a bit interesting, why is it? The reason is simply this: you haven't got the key to the Book. The key to the Book is Christ Himself, living by His Spirit in the heart. I have seen extracts from letters written by boys in which they said they got in real touch with their Bibles as soon as they got in real touch with Jesus. And Miss Havergal, who wrote many beautiful hymns, said, after she as a schoolgirl had yielded her heart to Christ: "For the first time my Bible was PRECIOUS to me." That's just it; those who love God love His Word. By receiving Jesus we find God to be our Father, and the Holy Spirit our Teacher. E. ADAMS.



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# LEADING THEM HOME

A MOTHER was sorrowing bitterly over the death of her son, whom the Lord Jesus had taken home to be with Him. Seeing her great distress of mind, and desirous of comforting her, a servant of the Lord used a simple illustration, which showed her that she need not mourn for her boy as if he were lost, but that she could have hope of seeing him again in heaven. The illustration he used was this. When a shepherd wishes to lead a mother sheep into an enclosure or place of safety he does not seize hold of it roughly and compel it to go in; he simply catches its lamb into his arms and carries it in, and the mother sheep follows. The Lord Jesus often takes little ones to be with Him in heaven, so that they may always be safe with Him there. He also speaks to their sorrowing parents, through the death of their little ones, that they may be comforted and follow them there through faith in Him. Many parents have been led to trust the Lord Jesus as their Saviour in this way.

But, boys and girls, you can also speak to the other members of your family in life. You can let your light shine in the home, and your parents, as well as your brothers and sisters, will see it, and may be led to trust the Lord Jesus as their Saviour. What a joy it would be to the Lord Jesus in heaven and to you on earth if your light was used to lead others to Him! It says

in the Bible that Andrew led Peter to the Lord Jesus (John i. 40-42). So you can lead others to Him by letting your light shine. Our great concern for others, whether it be in our life or death, should be to lead them to the Lord Jesus, so that they may be saved, and have hope of eternal life.

# THE PRICE OF LIVING

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#### **CANDLES**

AS I was coming home in the train one day, I was reading a book, called Sermons in Candles, and it was so funny and wise. What the author did not know about candles was not worth knowing. I thought, as I read it, that it would be nice to write you a letter on candles (I will not call it a sermon). You have all seen candles many times, though we do not use them much nowadays. I was staying at a farm not long ago, where we all used Some are short, some are long, some are pretty colours, but all are made of the same thing, and for the same purpose—to give light. Now a candle is of no use until it is lighted, is it? and a candle cannot light itself, somebody else must do that for it.

"A candle that affords no light, What profits it by day or night?"

A very wise man once said (in fact, he was the wisest man that ever lived), "The Spirit of man is the candle of the Lord " (Proverbs xx. 27). How wonderful! God made Adam, the first man. with his candle (Spirit) all alight; but Adam let sin come in and put it out, so he became all dark inside, and as he was our great-great-great-great (if I put any more greats the Editor will be very cross with me, so you must imagine hundreds more) grandfather, we are all born dark inside too. Now, how can we get our candles lit again? Well, David jubilantly tells us in Psalm xviii. 28, "Thou wilt light my candle; the Lord my God will enlighten my darkness."

The Lord Jesus Christ was sent by God the Father to be "a light to lighten

the Gentiles." That refers to us. Once a candle has been lighted, it cannot put itself out, and when we have been lighted by the Lord Jesus Christ no one can put us out. A candle may be put out by a breath of wind, or by some one blowing at it, but the light lighted in us by the Lord Jesus can never be put out. The devil may puff and puff at it, but it remains.

Now a candle is of no use unless it shines, and gives light; that is the purpose for which it is made. When the Lord Jesus has lighted us inside, the brightness of that light will be reflected in our faces, and we shall glow with happiness. A heathen man once asked a missionary what it was he put in the faces of the converts (those who had given themselves to the Lord Jesus) to make them shine, because they looked so happy. "Nothing," said the missionary, "it is the light inside shining out."

"Jesus bids us shine with a clear, pure light, Like a little candle burning in the night. He looks down from Heaven to see us shine, You in your small corner and I in mine."

Can I hear someone say, "I am a candle that has never been lighted?" Well, just come now, and let a ray of light from the Saviour light you. The Lord Jesus is inviting you to come. There was a little girl who had heard over and over again how the Lord Jesus had come to die for her and save her, and yet she was not saved. One day she suddenly saw the reason why she was not saved—she had believed the Lord Jesus had died for ALL, but she had never realized that He had died for HER and would be HER SAVIOUR

-that made all the difference. Do come NOW to the Lord Jesus Christ and take Him as your own Saviour, and be lighted inside.

It caught me just about a quarter of an inch below my left eye. If it had hit me slightly higher up it might have blinded me or have been very serious. I can tell you I thanked God there and then that my sight had not been damaged, as I realized what a narrow escape I had had.

Yes, I feel quite sure "It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord." You just try it a little more. It makes you so grateful for the many mercies received that you sometimes forget the little troubles, and it makes you happy, too. Did you ever know a thankful person miserable? I have not come across one yet, and I do not think you will.

"Oh!" he said, "what's it like?"

"Well, it's bomb-proof and shell-proof, but it's not made of corrugated iron, like yours."

"Well, what's it made of?"

"It's made of feathers."
You should have seen his face!

"Feathers!" he exclaimed in amazement, "Whatever sort of shelter would feathers make then?"

"Now let me explain. I am a Christian, therefore I belong to the Lord Jesus, and it says in GOD'S Word, 'He shall cover thee with His FEATHERS, and under His wings shalt thou trust' (Psalm xci. 4). Wings are made of FEATHERS."

To my glad surprise my friend answered, "Oh, sir, I've got a shelter like that. I had one in the last war."

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# THE EXCELLENCIES OF THE BIBLE (1)

HAVE sometimes thought that a nation must be truly *Blessed* if it were governed by no other laws than those of that Blessed Book (Deuteronomy iv. 5, 6). It is so complete a system that nothing can be added to it (Deuteronomy iv. 2), nor taken from it (Revelation xxii. 19).

It contains EVERYTHING needful to be known and done (Acts. xvi. 30, 31). It affords a copy for a king (Deuteronomy xvii. 18), and a rule for a subject (1 Peter ii. 13, 14). It gives instruction and counsel to a senate (Psalm cv. 22); authority and direction for a magistrate (Ezra vii. 25, 26). It contains a witness (Exodus xxiii. 1), requires an impartial verdict of a jury (Leviticus xix. 15), and furnishes the judge with his sentence (Deuteronomy xvi. 19, 20).

It defends the rights of ALL (Exodus xxii.), and reveals vengeance to every defrauder (1 Thessalonians iv. 6), overreacher (Isaiah xlix. 26), or oppressor (Ecclesiastes v. 8). It prescribes and limits the sway of the sovereign (2 Samuel xxiii. 3), the rule of the ruler (Romans xiii. 3, 4), and the authority of the master (Ephesians vi. 9); commands the subject to honour (Romans xiii. 1), and the servant to obey (Colossians iii. 22), and promises the blessing and protection of its author to all who walk by its rules (Leviticus xxvi. 3–12; John xvi. 23).

It sets the husband as lord of the household (1 Peter iii. 5-7), and the wife as

mistress of the table (Proverbs xxxi. 15); tells *him* how to rule (Colossians iii. 19), and *her* how to manage (Proverbs xxxi.).

It entails honour to parents (Ephesians vi. 2), and enjoins obedience to children (Colossians iii. 20).

It gives directions for weddings (Luke xiv. 8); (John ii. 2), and for burials (Genesis xxiii. 8, 9); regulates feasts (Luke xiv. 10–15), and fasts (Isaiah lviii. 6, 7), mournings and rejoicings (Romans xii. 15); and orders labour for the day (Exodus xx. 9), and rest for the night (John ix. 4).

It promises food and raiment (Luke xii. 22), and limits the use of both (Romans xiii.; 1 Peter iii. 3). It points out a faithful and an eternal Guardian to the departing husband and father (Exodus xxii. 22–24); tells him with whom to leave his fatherless children (Psalm cxlvi. 9), and in whom his widow is to trust (Jeremiah xlix. 11), and promises a father to the former (Psalm lxviii. 5) and a husband to the latter (Isaiah liv. 5).

It teaches a man how to set his house in order (Isaiah xxxviii. 1), and how to make his will (Proverbs xiii. 22). It appoints a dowry for the wife (Genesis xxxiv. 12), entails the right of the firstborn (Genesis xlviii. 18), and shows how the younger branches shall be left (Genesis xlix. 13).

After the healing of the lame man and the preaching of Peter when 5000 people were converted, Peter and John were arrested and put into prison because they preached the resurrection of Jesus. The priests and Sadducees were bitter. Not the best of friends at any time, now they agree on one thing-hatred to the Name of Jesus. The priests had been amongst the chief accusers of the Lord Jesus Christ at His trial, and now His resurrection had condemned them as murderers of the innocent. The Sadducees taught that there was no resurrection, so now they were proved to be liars and false teachers. They arose, therefore, together to persecute the apostles.

the cross, but He was raised and now He lives in heaven. It is through His Name alone that we must be saved.

Peter and John were released by the council, and we read at the close of our chapter of a prayer meeting which the Christians had together. They suffered persecution but they took refuge in God. The power of evil was against the Lord Jesus Christ and His followers, but these men were not going to yield. They cried to God for power to testify, and we read that, so great was the power that came upon them, that the place where they were assembled was shaken.

They received power not only for testimony to the world but to live together in unity and love. Selfishness was banished and love prevailed. They preached the Word with great power, and great grace was upon them all. What a happy company of Christians!

Our first parents, from whom we have all descended, were evicted from their beautiful home in the Garden of Eden, and never again returned to it. This, however, was not a government measure for their protection, but was through their own sin and disobedience, the result being that we—their descendants—share in their homeless plight.

Do what we will we can never return to Paradise, but, oh, wonder of wonders, God has provided some "better thing for us!" He has opened to us a far better home—"eternal in the heavens." Would you like to go to heaven? It is a place where "God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away" (Revelation xxi. 4).

If you would, kneel down at once before God. Tell Him, your heart's desire. Ask Him, for Christ's sake, to blot out your sins through His precious blood, which He shed for you upon the cross, and He will surely do so. Thus you will become fit for that bright home, and when you get there you will see Jesus for yourself. It is written: "And they shall see His face; and His Name shall be in their foreheads."

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# THE EXCELLENCES OF THE BIBLE (2)

IT is the Best book (Proverbs xxx. 5). It contains the choicest Matter (Psalm xii. 6), gives the best Instruction (Psalm xix. 7-11), and affords the greatest Pleasure and Satisfaction that ever was revealed (Jeremiah xv. 16). It contains the best Laws (Psalm exix. 72) and profoundest mysteries that ever were penned (Romans xi. 33).

It reveals the Only Living and True God (Exodus xxxiv 6, 7), and shows the way to Him (John xiv. 6); it sets aside all other gods (Acts iv. 12), and describes the Vanity of them (Isaiah xliv. 9-20; Psalm cxv. 4-8), and of all that trust in them (Psalm xcvii. 7).

In short, it is the Book of Law, to show right (Psalm xix. 8; exix. 128), and wrong (1 Corinthians i. 19-27).

The Book of Wisdom, that condemns all folly (Ecclesiastes vii. 25), and makes

the foolish wise (Psalm xix. 7; 1 Corinthians i. 27).

The Book of Truth (John xvii. 17), that detects all lies (1 John ii. 4, 22), and confutes all errors (Galatians i. 8).

And the Book of Life (Revelation xx. 12), that giveth life (John v. 24), and shows the Way from everlasting death (1 Thessalonians i. 10).

It is the most compendious book in all the world (Hebrews iv. 12), the most authentic (2 Peter i. 21), and the most entertaining history that ever was published (Psalm ev.). It contains the most ancient Antiquities (Genesis xi. 4), strange Events (Psalm lxxviii.), wonderful Occurrences (Acts v. 15; xix. 12), heroic Deeds (1 Samuel xvii. 49), and unparalleled Wars (Judges vii. 19, 20).

It will instruct the most accomplished Mechanic (1 Kings vi. 7), and exercise the nicest Critic (Matthew vii. 4). It is an unequalled Narrative (John xxi. 25); a book of Lives (Hebrews xi.); and a book of Voyages (Jonah i; Acts xxvii).

It is the best Covenant that ever was made (Jeremiah xxxii. 40), the best Deed that ever was sealed (Isaiah viii. 16), the best Evidence that ever was produced (John v. 39), and the best Will that ever was made (John xiv. 27).

To understand it is to be wise indeed (Proverbs ii. 6, 7), to be ignorant of it is to be destitute of wisdom (1 Corinthians ii. 14).

DEAR YOUNG FRIENDS.

Wherever we see God working, we are sure that Satan will do his best to hinder the work. The happy fellowship of the Christians in Acts iv. is followed in our chapter this month by the word "but." Satan filled the heart of Ananias, so much so, that, with his wife, he committed this grave offence of lying to God. Judgment followed speedily as a warning to those who would link themselves to the company of Christians, not because of faith, but because of greed.

Lying is a very serious matter. God does not always make such outstanding examples of liars but His eyes see and He hears in heaven. God is longsuffering and gracious, and He would not have His children discouraged. On this account, however, may we Christians not treat sin, in any form, lightly. It is good to have a tender conscience and the heart fortified against the inroads of Satan.

. The early Church was assailed by Satan not only from within, as in the case of Ananias, but also from without. And if God gave a great example of judgment so He followed this by wonderful cases of healing and deliverance. People came from the cities round about to Jerusalem bringing sick folks to the apostles and every one was healed. Men and women also were converted.

The influence of the Church extended, and the High Priest was displeased. He ordered the arrest of the apostles and they were put into the common prison. But that night a wonderful thing happened. The angel of the Lord opened the prison doors and brought the apostles out and bid them go into the Temple and preach the Word.

The next morning saw the High Priest and the council gathered together but no prisoners. Where were the prisoners? So quietly had they been slipped away that the guard stood over an empty cell! Whilst the council was hearing the story of how the prison doors had been securely locked and the guard placed there but, upon re-opening the doors, no prisoners were to be seen, someone came and told that the apostles were in the Temple publicly speaking to the people. An escort was at once sent out and the apostles were brought in before the council.

The charge against them was: (1) You disobeyed our command; (2) You have filled Jerusalem with your doctrine; (3) You reckon us as murderers.

The apostles in their reply were fearless and very decided. "We ought to obey God rather than men. The God of our fathers raised up Jesus, whom ye slew and hanged on a tree. Him hath God exalted with His right hand to be a Prince and a Saviour, for to give repentance to Israel, and forgiveness of sins."

What a glorious Gospel! When the angry priests heard it, they were cut to the heart and they sought to slay the apostles. Doctor Gamaliel, however, intervened and procured their release. I wonder what effect this Gospel has upon you! Do you know the Lord Jesus Christ as your Saviour?

Of course, this is why you go there and feel you have a right to share in all the comforts. So it is, then, with the "House of God." Are you in the family of God? If so, you have a place in His House. All the blessings of that House are yours. Scripture tells us that everyone who receives the Lord Jesus as Saviour is born of God (John i. 12). DEAR CHILDREN,

We now arrive at the story of Stephen, a great man of God and a prominent leader in the Church. There is not a great deal written about Stephen, but sufficient to show that he was a mighty man, a man of character, ability, and courage, who stood valiantly for God in the midst of terrible opposition, and gave his life for God and all that he held to be according to the will of God. It is said of him that he was full of five things—the Holy Ghost, wisdom, faith, grace, and power. Such power was upon him that he did great wonders and miracles amongst the people.

This man was too much for Satan, who raised up certain people to try to catch him in his words and to get him to say something which was not true. But "they were not able to resist the wisdom and the spirit by which he spake"; so they hired a set of liars who would say anything for a little gain. These men stirred up the people with their lies, saying that Stephen had spoken blasphemous words

against Moses and against God.

So we find Stephen before the council with the charge that he said that Jesus of Nazareth would destroy the temple and change the customs of the people. This is a similar charge to that which the leaders laid against the Lord Jesus Christ Himself in Mark xiv. 58.

Stephen appeared to be in no way downhearted. His face shone with a heavenly glory and all that sat in the council saw his face as

it had been the face of an angel.

Gladly he spoke for himself. He recounted the history of the nation of Israel. He told of the promises of blessing made to Abraham. He spoke of Joseph and Moses, leaders of the people, of the way in which God wrought for Israel, and of the way the people treated the messengers of God. The servants of God had been refused time and again. The people turned to idolatry and would not obey God. Such was the heart of man although surrounded with privileges and revelations.

Then the cutting and true application of the discourse, "As your fathers did, so do ye." Outwardly they were respectable and very religious, but inwardly they were no better than the heathen. They rejected the law, they killed the prophets, they killed the Son of God, and they resisted the Holy Ghost.

At such condemnation they rose in fury and cast Stephen out of the city, stoning him to death. With a prayer upon his lips for his murderers, the faithful witness passed into his rest. This is the first recorded Christian death—the first of the mighty army of martyrs which still treads its way onward to the glory.

THESE words appear on one of the walls of a house in Broadstairs, Kent, where Charles Dickens lived for some time.

You may remember that this sentence is found in the sixteenth chapter of the Book of Genesis, and was first spoken by Hagar after the angel of the Lord had appeared to her and given her God's message. She realized that God knew all about her needs and trouble, and she never forgot what God had said to her.

God knows that you need food, clothes, shelter, knowledge and education. But He knows, too, that your greatest need is the forgiveness of your sins, for, as we sing sometimes:

"How many children say,
'I'd like to go to heaven,'
Yet never think that they
Must have their sins forgiven."

God sees that chief need of yours. If you do not see it, ask Him to show it to you. Pray each

day, "Lord, show me myself."

And God sees our troubles. It is a great comfort to know that, especially if we love the Lord. A poor idiot boy used to be jeered at and badly treated by boys and older persons, too, and, being quite unable to defend himself, he used to say, "Ah, God looked at that." We read in Hebrews iv. 12, 13: "For the Word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit . . . and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in His sight: but all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of Him with whom we have to do."

But although He hates our sins, He loves our souls—that is, our truest life—and He wants to give us the best of blessings, the forgiveness of our sins. Do YOU want to receive that best of blessings? If so, confess your sinnership to Him and trust the Lord Jesus Christ as your Sayiour.

I can say He died for me, because He loved me. He loves you, too, and died for you, and all you have to do for salvation is to trust Him.

If ever there was cause to write, "Lest we forget," we have it here:—

"Lest I forget Gethsemane; Lest I forget Thine agony; Lest I forget Thy love for me, Lead me to Calvary!"

At school you get what is called "revision," in order that those who were absent may be taught the lesson, and lest you forget what you have already learned. Now I would like you to think of that when you go to Sunday School, or whenever you are reading the Bible, which is God's Word. If you are being told something you never knew before, listen with both your ears, for Jesus said when He was praying to God the Father, "Thy Word is truth" (John xvii. 17), therefore believe; and if you are being told something you have already learned, pay heed—lest you forget.

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DEAR BOYS AND GIRLS,

After the death of Stephen the persecution of the Christians became very acute. Saul of Tarsus was bitter against them and even went into their houses and took them off to prison. It must have been a terrible time. The Christian people were scattered abroad. They were driven from their houses and from their friends. But, wherever they went, they preached the Gospel. So, instead of the Gospel being stamped out, if prospered greatly. Satian always outwits himself.

The same story has continued through the ages. Christians have been persecuted, cruelly treated, put to death. Bibles have been burned, but in spite of all that Satan has done or can do, the preaching of the Gospel still continues, people are being saved, and the Bible increases in circulation and is being translated into more and more languages. Instances of this are provided by the recent returns from Poland, Hungary, and Germany, which show double the copies sold last year over those during 1938. Then as to translations, it is interesting to know that whilst in 1804 only seventy-one languages had any part of the Bible translated into them, to-day the languages number over a thousand.

At that time Philip, the evangelist, went down to Samaria to preach the Gospel. You will remember that, not very long before, the Lord Jesus Christ, Himself, passed through Samaria. He reached the heart of a woman of Samaria by Sychar's well who then brought others to the Saviour. After the Lord had stayed two days in the city, the people said to the woman, "We have heard Him ourselves, and know that this is indeed the Christ, the Saviour of the world." Se we are told that "Philip went down to the city of Samaria, and preached Christ unto them." Little wonder that "There was great joy in that city."

What a different state existed in Samaria to the persecution in Jerusalem! "The people with one accord gave heed unto those things which Philip spake" and "they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the Name of Jesus Christ."

The theme of the Gospel is Christ, and the result of receiving Christ is joy. It will be so with you as it was with the Samaritans. The first thing is a readiness to hear—
"Faith cometh by hearing." Then you must believe on the Lord Jesus Christ—this is faith.

We are impressed in this chapter eight of the Acts of the necessity for reality. Simon was a professor, but he did not possors salvation. His heart was not right in the sight of God. It is said of him that he "believed" and was "baptized." His life, however, did not correspond with what he professed. He was a sham; an evil man. Simon gives us a solemn lesson that it is easy to pass before our friends as a Christian

yet still be unsaved. God, however, judges the heart; and the thoughts of the heart are known to Ilim. If you are still unsaved, you may be saved to-day. God is so gracious and ready to bless. Look to Him in faith and He will fill your heart with the joy of salvation.

DEAR YOUNG FRIENDS.

Verse 31 of Psalm laviii, reads "Princes shall come out of Egypt: Ethiopia shall soon stretch out her hands unto God." It would appear that the story which we read in the latter part of Acts viii, is a fulfilment of this statement. Ethiopia, or Abyssinia, as we now call it, was an important country at that time. This "man of Ethiopia" was evidently an exalled official under Queen Candace, for he was a man of great authority and had charge of the treasury. But his wealth and his power did not sarisfy him-he craved for something more. How often we find this in the lives of men and women tc-day! People aspire to great wealth, and they seek to attain a place of power, but they find after all that this is not the way to peace and happiness.

The Ethiopian made a journey to Jerusalem, which was then the great religious centre. Look at your atlas and see what a great amount of travelling this involved. He went to Jerusalem thinking that there he would surely find something to satisfy his heart, but he was disappointed. We do not know what happened at Jerusalem. He may there have heard of the Christians, and the effort to suppress them, which was a matter of general interest at that time. Perhaps he got into contact with some Christian people, and this may be how he came to possess a copy of the Scriptures.

With an empty heart, he took the journey towards his home. As he went along in his chariot, he opened the sacred roll. Here was a black Gentile reading the Word of God! How many black people since that time have read the Bible and have found joy and satisfaction in the Saviour! The Word of God is not confined to any one class of people it is for all nations and for all men. All people are invited to the Saviour and all nations will be represented in heaven.

The portion of Scripture which the Ethiopian read was most wonderful. You may read the same portion to-day in Isaiah liii. There the Lord Jesus Christ is portrayed as the suffering and sorrowing One. He suffered as none other because He suffered on account of sin. He died that sincers might live. The story thrilled the black man. There was treasure here—far more valuable than all the great treasures of Ethiopia. As he pondered over the story and wondered who the suffering One could be, he saw someone running towards him. Who was it? It was Philip the evangelist, sent by God into the desert to tell a black man the way to be saved.

Thilip told out the message so dear to his heart. He told of Jesus, the Saviour. Little wonder that the heart of the Ethiopian was captivated. He believed the message and "went on his way rejoicing." There is no record of this joy ever ceasing. No, the joy was for ever. So it will be with you, dear boys and girls, if you put your trust in the Lord Jesus Christ. He will save you and give you a joy which will never cease.

Saul of Tarsus was the greatest persecutor of the Christians but he rose to be the most honoured of the Lord's saints. He was born just about the same time as the Lord Jesus Christ. We do not, however, hear anything about him until Stephen's martyrdom, when he shared in the guilt of that terrible murder.

Sail was very zealous against the Christians. So zealous was he that he obtained letters from the high priest giving him authority to put into prison any Christians that he found. Two months ago, we saw that the Christians were scattered abroad on account of the persecution in Jerusalem. Saul went in pursuit. To Damascus he would go, a distance of about 140 miles.

As he arrived near this city, "suddenly there shined round about him a light from heaven; And he fell to the earth, and heard a voice saying unto him, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me?" And he said, "Who art Thou, Lord?" and the Lord said, "I am Jesus whom thou persecutest."

There was a change in a moment. Saul had blasphemed this Name. He had treated Jesus as a deceiver, as One who had been crucified rightly because of His false claims. Now all was changed. Jesus, who had died for sinners and who had been raised again, spoke from heaven, so the claims He made were true.

Saul surrendered immediately. He could not resist the call, and was converted. He previously thought that he was right, and doing the right thing by persecuting the Christians, but his vision of Jesus completely changed all his ideas. Now, he who had been so bitter against the Name of Jesus began

at once to preach "Christ that He is the Son of God," and proved that Jesus is "very Christ."

This is the foundation of our Christian faith. If Jesus is not the Son of God, our faith is vain. Saul had seen His glory and heard His voice, and he had not the slightest doubt that Jesus, who spoke to him, was the Son of God.

Saul proved what a blessing it is to know the Lord Jesus Christ as Saviour. You, too, dear boys and girls, may surrender yourselves to Jesus. He speaks to you to-day through His word. The Name of Jesus is hated by the world, but it is the only hope for man. Jesus is the only Saviour, and, if men

would only turn to Him, what a different world this would be. Saul of Tarsus, the chief of sinners, has been saved, and it was he who wrote, "This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners." 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

DEAR YOUNG FRIENDS,

Chapter xii of the Acts gives us a very thrilling account of God's protecting care and how He is able to deliver His children. We are not all likely to be shut up in prison, but, being a Christian does not mean that we shall not have trials and sometimes be found in difficult circumstances, and perhaps in danger. Troubles come to all alike—saved and unsaved. Sorrow, sickness, disappointment, temptation, and many other things fall across our pathway. But the great thing to remember is that the Lord has all power, and no power here, chains nor bars, soldiers nor keepers, nor anything else can detain those whom the Lord sets at liberty. There is nothing in the world that is not under His sway. If only we believed this, what peace it would bring into our lives!

During a recent air-raid in the north-east of England, a gentleman was seeking to reassure some people who were in a café, when a little girl of six or seven caught his sleeve and said with a smile. "I'm not a bit afraid, 'cos Jesus will take

care of me." He picked her up in his arms and asked her to repent the brave words, and many people were cheered and comforted by the child's trust and courage.

The perils and difficulties may be very great, but the believer in Christ is able to repose in quietness and contidence because everything is under the control of Him who is our Lord and Redeemer. The soldiers in a camp sleep peaceably although hostile forces may be very near, because sentinels watch, God's angels are always near those who trust the Saviour. The angel of the Lord appeared to Peter, illuminating the dark prison and setting him free from his chains. Peter was escorted by the angel into the street, and he soon found his way to the prayer-meeting.

A special point in our chapter is the great power of prayer. We see that prayer opens prison gates and sets the prisoner free. We need prayer because not one of us can keep himself. It is a great comfort to know that someone is praying for us, and it is a great privilege to pray for others. But, when we pray, do we always believe that we shall get an answer? Of course, we may not get all we ask—it may not be good for us. What is good, the Lord will give.

Whilst prayer was made for Peter, the answer came. But when the answer did come they were surprised. They may have thought it useless to pmy for Peter's deliverance from prison. He was bound to the guard with chains. Perhaps they prayed that he might be kept happy and set free some day. God gives much more than we ask and according to His own riches. The prayer meeting that day would be turned into a praise meeting, no doubt.

What a wonderful Saviour is Jesus! He is able to deliver you, if still unsaved, from the power of Satan. He would release you from the bondage of sin and set you free if you would only let Him do so. Are you willing for this?



# **FOOLS**

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# "JESUS UNDER THE SKIN"

THESE were the words of an Eskimo grandmother said to be 95 years old, who one day, during a visit paid by Dr. Sheldon Jackson to the Arctic, came tugging at his coat sleeve. When asked what she wanted, she replied through the interpreter as follows:—

"Long time ago pedlar came, said he been preacher. Trader asked him preach to us that night, so he did. After he talk about God's Book, of which we never heard before, he went to living quarters and got basin of water, then pour water on my head and say: 'Now you all Christians.' I replied, 'But, O Missionary, O Missionary, me want "Jesus under the skin." " She was deeply interested, and it was not hard gently and tenderly to lead her to the Saviour of sinners. The change wrought in her was reflected in her happy face. When after prayer the doctor and his helpers arose from their knees, they found fourteen young couples kneeling in front of the school desks, all desirous of the same blessing. As a result three of the young husbands are now active in Christian work.

The expression of the Eskimo grandmother may be quaint, but her meaning is evident. She did not desire to be a mere nominal Christian, a professor and not a possessor. Job says: "If I wash myself with snow water, and make my hands never so clean; yet shalt Thou plunge me in the ditch, and mine own clothes shall abhor me" (Job ix. 30, 31).

You may be all that is good in your outward conduct, but remember, "Man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart" (1 Samuel xvi. 7).

Have you, dear reader, just the "form of godliness," with no living link with the Lord Jesus Christ? If so, your profession can avail nothing with the God who tries the heart. Will you not say like the Psalmist: "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me, and know my thoughts; and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting" (Psalm exxxix. 23, 24).

Baptism cannot save your soul. Jesus alone can meet your need. May He be your trust, your Saviour, Lord, and Friend that, like the Eskimo woman, the change may be seen in your walk and ways.
