Three Great Landmarks.

- (1) The Sheltering Blood.
- "When I see the BLOOD, I will pass over you" (Ex. 12: 13).
- "Christ our passover is sacrificed for us" (1 Cor. 5:7).
 - (2) Deliverance through the Red Sea.
- "Thus the Lord saved Israel that day out of the hand of the Egyptians" (Ex. 14: 30).
- "Who gave Himself for our sins, that He might deliver us from this present evil world" (Gal. 1:4).
 - (3) Entrance into the Inheritance through Jordan.
 - "All the Israelites passed over on dry ground" (Joshua 3: 17).
- "God hath... made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus" (Eph. 2:6).

Mark how each landmark is based upon Christ alone. It is the blood that shelters the guilty sinner, who believes, in the place exposed to judgment. It is not his worthiness, nor his good works, nor his promises; nothing but the *blood* that gives safety.

The death of our Lord and His resurrection has opened a plain way for His people to leave this evil world, and the prince of darkness which controls the unsaved, and to walk in the liberty which the Holy Spirit gives.

That same death has opened the way into our inheritance. All who are in Christ, are in Him in the heavenlies; they have entered into their portion, and it is now theirs to make use of the boundless portion which is thus freely given them.

How sweet and blessed is the thought—not merely is every blessing secured to us, but all is enjoyed in holy relationship as the Bride of Christ.

"Restore Such an One."

HE Apostle's authority was given him for edification, not destruction (2 Cor. 13: 10); and this explains the great patience exercised toward the assembly at Corinth. He would lead them to judge themselves, to purge out the evil, from their hearts, or outwardly from their midst, rather than himself denounce and crush them with the manifest power of Christ. Such a course had been necessary at the beginning, when the Church was established, and the awful judgment fell on Ananias and Sapphira (Acts 5). But this was not to be the normal way; the Spirit was to act upon the conscience of the saints, and evil was to be judged and purged out.

This is the object of all discipline—the maintenance of the Lord's honor and the recovery of the wandering saint. Let us never forget this: a skilful surgeon prefers to heal a wounded limb, rather than amputate it. It is not so much to accuse one, as to lead him to accuse and judge himself. Of course truth may demand a public charge of sin against a wrongdoer; but we speak rather of that gracious action known as washing one another's feet. We have not succeeded in this unless the brother has been led to judge himself. We may well suspect that activity which is satisfied with reproving, accusing and publicly exposing failure in others. This is often met by self-vindication, recrimination, and lasting bitterness. But how sweet is that tender, melting spirit which provokes no resentment, but leads to true contrition. Such action is Christ-like, consistent with the greatest firmness, but it shows itself in results; saints are restored.

How much is the soft answer needed in the house, between brothers and sisters, and others too. What need there is here to consider one another and to forbear. Shall the sharp word of the wearied mother, overburdened perhaps with too much toil, be taken up, or shall a soft answer soothe and relieve the strain?

The Expulsive Power of Communion.

HEN Abraham returned from his victory over the kings (Gen. 14) he was met by two men—the king of Sodom, and Melchizedek, king of Salem. The latter brought out bread and wine, suggesting our Lord's person and work, and pronouncing blessing upon Abraham led out his praises to the most High God, possessor of heaven and earth. Abraham is thus set in communion with God. As a result, when the king of Sodom approaches him offering to share the results of his victory, Abraham, in the consciousness of this relationship, can refuse all. He will not take a shoe latchet from the king of Sodom, even though he himself had snatched it all from the victorious kings.

If we too are in communion with the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the offers of the world will have no charm for us.

Corner Chambers.

(Ezek. 46: 19-24.)

HERE was a distinct purpose in these courts or chambers, separate from the main court. Here the offerings were to be prepared, boiled or roasted, and not in the more public place. How needed are these corner places still. Truth is learned—some special portion of God's word is opened up to us. Our temptation is to speak of it in public ministry before we have thoroughly made it our own in secret. Let us make use of the corner chambers, taking our precious things there, and in prayer and meditation prepare them for profitable use, as the Lord may lead, in public ministry or private conversation. How much barren, empty conversation, or worse, would be avoided were these chambers more constantly used.

From the above table we see that Noah's father (Lamech) was for 65 years contemporaneous with Adam, from whom he could, and no doubt did, learn the whole history of Eden, of the Fall, of God's ways, and of approach to Him through sacrifice. But, notwith-standing all this knowledge, common surely to all then living, ungodliness and evil had markedly developed, as we learn from the prophecy of Enoch (see Jude 14, 15)—Enoch himself walking with God, apart from the ungodly (Gen. 5: 22-24).

Seven generations of Cain are given us in Gen. 4: 16-24; the 6th (Lamech) a bigamist, and lawless man. As men multiplied the decendants of Seth mingled with those of Cain by intermarriage, obliterating the testimony for God upon the earth (see chap. 6: 1-8), and God swept mankind away from the earth, after 120 years of testimony through Noah (2 Pet. 2: 5).

Noah, of the family of Seth, "found grace in the eyes of the

Lord" (chap. 6: 8), was accounted "righteous before God," through faith, was saved with his family through the ark.

A new beginning is now made upon a renewed earth, and government established for the punishment of transgressors (chap. 9: 1-6)—which was not so before the Flood. As Adam soon fell from his God-given place in Eden, so Noah soon repeats the failure after the Flood—the head of the God-established government failed to govern himself (chap. 9: 20-25). Let us observe also that at the Fall man's life was limited to less than 1,000 years,—it is now cut down to half what it had been before the Flood: and this is again cut down one half after the dispersion at Babel, in the days of Peleg (chap. 10: 25), as the following table shows.

Again we have ten generations; the 10th, Abram (one of Terah's three sons) was born only 352 years after the Flood, as per above table. Shem, who lived 502 years after the Flood (chap. 11: 10, 11), must have outlived Abraham, who died being 175 years old.

^{*}Seventy years is given as Terah's age when sons were born to him (chap. 11: 26); but it is probable that Abram was not the first-born, though mentioned first as God's chosen one. His father died being 205 years old (chap. 11: 32), and Abram was 75 years old at that time (chap. 12: 4) therefore Terah must have been 130 years old when Abram was born.

How sad the reflection, that in the lifetime of Shem, his descendants had so departed from God as to sink into idolatry, as we learn from Josh. 24: 2! Have Israel and the Church done any better? See Exod. chap. 32; Acts 7: 41-43 and Acts 20: 29; 2 Tim. 1: 15; Jude 4, 12-15.

"A Top and Bottom, But no Middle."

SERVANT of the Lord was talking to an old woman who could not say that she was saved, although she knew she was a sinner, and believed in the Lord Jesus Christ. Having made sure that she realized herself to be a sinner, with no confidence in her own righteousness, he spoke to her much as follows:

"Well, Granny, I know that I have eternal life."

"Oh," she said, "I wouldn't dare to say that."

"But," he went on, "I have a plain scripture for it; a wonderful text, with a top and a bottom, but no middle. It is this: 'He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life,'—that is the top; 'and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abideth on him,'—that is the bottom; and you see there is no middle."

"Now let us try this verse with you. We will begin with the bottom—Do you refuse to believe on the Lord Jesus? Do you say to Him, I don't want You, I have no need of You."

"Oh," she interrupted—"I couldn't say that. What would a poor sinful creature like me do without the Saviour?"

"Well," you are clearly not in the bottom of the verse; there is no middle; and where must you be?"

Light shone into her heart, and peace and joy in believing were her happy portion.

Reader, are you in the top or the bottom of John 3:36?

Distinguish, but do not Separate.

E are naturally given to the use of reason apart from the Word of God in stating doctrines which are only known by revelation. The finite mind cannot grasp infinite truth in its entirety. In our efforts to "harmonize" the teachings of God's word we may unintentionally fall into erroneous statements, or give undue prominence to one line of truth or the other. We should ever approach truth reverently, and especially in seeking to know the divine mystery of the person of the Son of God, we should abhor all speculation, and confine ourselves closely to the clear declarations of Scripture.

All truth is related, and we cannot separate it into disconnected parts, as if there were no vital relationship between all. The neglect of this accounts for extreme and onesided views, for instance, of Divine sovereignty and human responsibility, and many other doctrines.

It is believed that the title to this little paper—"Distinguish, but do not separate," may be helpful in guarding against the danger of which we speak.

1. The Person of the Son of God.

"The Word was God" (John 1:1). This shows His absolute deity.

"The Man Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 2:5). This shows His perfect humanity.

Innumerable errors have sprung up from ignoring one or the other of these immense truths. Unitarianism in all its forms, ancient and modern, comes from ignoring or denying the first great truth—the Godhead of our Holy Saviour. A real Man, who lived, loved, obeyed, suffered, died and rose again, is seated now in heaven, will come for His own, be united with His Church in heavenly glory, reign over the earth in relation with Israel during the Millennium, and finally having delivered up the kingdom to God, even the Father, will be eternally associated with Him in the bliss

of a ransomed universe. All this is connected with His incarnation, His humanity. Therefore, to deny His humanity would be to deny all possibility of each of these facts—we would have no atonement, no Saviour, no High Priest, no Lord, no Head of the Church.

All Christians are agreed therefore as to these two great and glorious facts. But in the well-meant effort to explain various acts in our Lord's life and work there has been the tendency to separate the two natures of our Lord. For instance, He was weary at the well of Sychar: here therefore He was Man. He told the woman all that ever she did: there He was God. Now while quite true that we can distinguish between the two natures, the moment we separate them we fall into error. This is the fatal poison in the so-called Kenosis theory, that our Lord absolutely emptied Himself of His Godhead in becoming Man. There have been many offshoots from this theory, but let us reject them one and all.

On the other hand, let us distinguish as carefully and minutely as possible between all the varied characteristics of our blessed Lord, and as we see Him: here the Babe in the manger; there the object of the Spirit's sealing; still further on, the anguished Sufferer in Gethsemane, and last in the awful darkness of Calvary, let us ever fall on our faces and with Thomas exclaim, "My LORD and My GOD."

2. The Various Elements in Atonement.

"Christ died for our sins" (1 Cor. 15: 3).

"He is the propitiation for our sins" (1 John 2: 2).

"Who His own self bare our sins in His own body on the tree" (1 Pet. 2:24).

"If Christ be not raised . . . ye are yet in your sins" (1 Cor. 15: 17).

Now each of these precious verses gives us a special view of the atoning work of our blessed Lord. The first declares the broad fact that He died for our sins; the second, that He is the propitiation, He is before God in all the value of His atoning work, so

that divine justice has been fully satisfied; the third shows Him as our own substitute; while the fourth declares the necessity of His resurrection, if His death were to be of any avail.

Now here is abundant room for discrimination; each verse—and many others—gives a certain aspect of our Lord's work, distinct from the others. But let us beware that we do not separate the various parts of that one work, but with grateful hearts adore the love that has provided such an offering that a holy God and a guilty, repentant sinner can meet in righteousness and blessing.

3. New Birth and Eternal Life.

"Ye must be born again" (John 3:7).

"He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life" (John 3: 36).

There are, no doubt, many aspects of eternal life—we can think of it in its eternal display, in its present possession, as indissolubly linked with and maintained by the Son of God, and as the vital principle of divine life in each subject of God's grace, in all dispensations. Now new birth is evidently the beginning of this life. We can, in a reverent way, distinguish this from its subsequent display and enjoyment. But let us beware of error in separating the beginning of life from its continuance and culmination.

4. The Work of the Spirit in us, and of Christ for us.

"Born of water and of the Spirit" (John 3: 5).

"Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners."

There is unquestionably a divine work of the Spirit of God in the soul of every subject of divine grace. The means He uses is the word of God: repentance, a new nature, as well as subsequent power in walk, with many other features, are the work of the Spirit in the heart. Equally clear is it that our Lord's work is the ground upon which all is wrought. We can distinguish here, but again must guard from separating. We cannot think of a soul wrought upon effectually by the Holy Spirit to be left without the value of the sheltering, cleansing blood of Christ.

And so we might go on to note distinguishing features in life and nature; repentance and faith; faith and sealing; priesthood and advocacy; standing and state; faith and works; and many other related truths, which must not be separated from each other. May the Lord give us rightly to divide the word of truth.

God's Great Secret.

(Eph. 3: 1-9).

T is a special honor when a friend confides some secret to us—some great happiness about to be his—some wide, far-reaching plan which he desires to carry out. But what shall we say when the infinite God confides His purposes and plans to us? And yet this is just what He has done—and more, we, sinners saved by grace, are not merely the confidants, but the participants in this wondrous secret. God is going to have a Bride for His Son, a human bride, formed from the sons of men, saved by grace, from Pentecost till the coming of the Lord. The Lord is the Second Man, and "it is not meet that Man should be alone." What dignity, holy intimacy, eternal bliss does all this suggest! No words can describe it. Let us ask ourselves, are we walking worthy of the vocation wherewith we are called? (Eph. 4: 1-4).

"What raiseth the wondrous thought?
Or who did it suggest?
That we, the Church, to glory brought
Should with the Son be blessed!"
