1. "VERILY, VERILY."

(John iii. 3.)

I WAS looking through the Gospel of John recently and was surprised to find how often these two words occurred. In fact, I counted twenty-five different occasions in which they were used. Strangely enough, I have not noticed that they occur in any of the other Gospels.

Another thing I noticed was that it was the Lord Jesus Christ who always used the words, and evidently the words He had to say must have been very important. I expect you know what these two words mean: they mean "Truly, truly."

Now, I am not going to tell you of every place where these words are mentioned, but only a few. If you like to search through the Gospel of John and write out every verse or sentence where they occur, I will send you a little book as a reward, but mind, you must find the twenty-five times they are mentioned, or more if you can, and you must not use a Concordance. That would hardly be fair, would it? When you have written out the texts on a sheet of paper, send it to me at the London address of the Depot, on the back page. You can have up to the end of March, 1934, to do this, but

remember that Jesus may come before that date. Would you be ready?

The first verse we are going to look at is found in John iii. 3. "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." These words were spoken to a man named Nicodemus, who was a very important man, a ruler of the Jews. He knew something about Jesus, but that is not enough, is it? We must know Him.

Now Nicodemus did not want to be seen coming to Jesus, so he stole up quietly one night. Then it was that the Lord uttered these words to him, and Nicodemus had to learn a lesson we must all learn if we are ever to see God's kingdom; and that is, we must be born again. We must have a new life, a new beginning altogether, and that can only come about by God's Holy Spirit working with us. because He cannot dwell in our hearts if they are sinful.

We were born in sin, and we must be born into God's family by believing on the Lord Jesus. May each one of my young readers learn this first important lesson.

THE FIRST HOME AND HOW IT WAS BROKEN UP.

To learn about the first builder named in the Bible we must take a look at the first home, which was a very happy one. It was a most lovely garden, full of flowers and luscious fruit trees; no thorns or thistles or ugly weeds spoiled it, and the sun always shone.

Again God spoke, and this time it was to Cain (Genesis iv. 6, 16), and as the result of what God said, he "went out from the presence of the Lord." Instead of confessing his sin and seeking forgiveness, he ran off to a far-off land to try and get away from the only Friend who could help him.

Here, we read, he builded a city, in which gathered crowds of men and women who, like himself, sought to find a place for themselves away from God and all the good things He would have given them, if they had only kept in the ways of righteousness. Cain chose his land and his companions. Was it not sad that he and they did not choose the best?

Scots. Here are four lines which describe how the ring of men round the Scottish monarch was maintained unbroken:—

SIN.

HAT an awful subject! Sin. We are sure that none of our unsaved readers like to think about sin. It is indeed a black subject, and we cannot paint it too black. The effects of sin are all around us. We have not got to look far to see what havoc it has wrought in the world. The cemeteries, the hospitals, the institutions for destitute and afflicted boys and girls, the doctors, the policemen, the sickness and sadness all speak loudly that sin abounds in the world. There would be none of these if there was no sin.

God made everything bright and beautiful. He put Adam and Eve into

the Garden of Eden with all things to enjoy, but this awful thing, SIN, came in and blighted the whole scene. The stream of evil has worked itself into the whole of human history, so that to-day we live in a world which is black with sin.

Further, every heart by nature is black. The reason why you do not like to think about sin is because you know that *you* are a sinner. You know the evil of your own heart only too well.

The middle letter of SIN is "I," and this may be spelt "SELF." Self is the centre of all sin. Satan loves nothing better than to get people occupied with themselves and so to forget God.

Some children look upon sin as a very little matter. They tell lies, do wrong things, are disobedient, and they think nothing at all about it. God, however, speaks in no uncertain language about sin. He *hates* it and declares plainly that no sin will ever enter heaven.

So sin is a very serious matter and we must sound the alarm to every boy and girl. Satan is busy to-day, and his great aim is so to get people under his influence that they become indifferent to the claims of God—indifferent to the love of God—indifferent to the pleadings of the Spirit. Sin at the beginning is very fascinating and has a drawing power, and, on this account, it is to be greatly feared. From small beginnings no one can tell the end of those who indulge in sin.

Many people when young say that they will go so far and stop, but how sadly we have seen this impossible. Cases without number there are of young people who have been pleaded with when children to come to Christ, but have turned away to see a bit of the world, and now their lives are blighted.

Sin will ruin for time and eternity and no one can afford to trifle with it. A truer word was never spoken than the record we have in God's word, "Be sure your sin will find you out." "The wages of sin is death"; and if you become the servant of sin you will truly find this to your sorrow.

These are serious days in which we live, and we cannot impress upon you too earnestly to beware of sin and flee from it as you would flee from fire. Before laying down our pen, we would remind you that although "the wages of sin is death," "the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." Which are you going in for, "wages" or "the gift"?



THE LIFE OF DAVID AND ITS LESSONS.

W E are going to look a little at the history of one of the best-known men in the Bible, and whose record is found mostly in the Old Testament. He began life as a little shepherd boy and grew up to be a king. I wonder if you know who it is? I am sure you do, and at once say "David."

Now, though David is so well known to all who read their Bibles, not many can tell where his name is first mentioned. Can you? Pause a little and think. It is in the book of Ruth, chapter iv., where we read first of his grandfather, then his father, then David himself. It is wonderful that he is mentioned here, really before he was born; and I think it is because he is a type of the Lord Jesus Christ. I might say that our thought in looking a little at David's history is to show how wonderfully he pictures the Lord Jesus Christ as the mighty Saviour of men, women and children.

The book of Judges makes very sad reading, and shows what awful sin there was amongst the children of Israel. In the book of Ruth we have a lovely picture of devotion, and a repentant woman coming to Jehovah to be forgiven. Now Ruth was the devoted mother from whom David descended, which seems to point that David would himself have a deep desire to please God in all that he did. For a New Testament example read 2 Timothy i. 5. I wonder who you like to please best? Have you a desire to be here pleasing to God? If you have, God will surely bless you. Sad to say, most people seek only to please themselves. I do hope every boy and girl who reads Our Children has a real desire to be here well pleasing to the Lord.

Let us think over the first mention of David, and remember he is spoken of at a time when we see the people doing what was right in their own eyes, and caring nothing at all for what was right in God's eyes. It seems as though God would say to us, "I have a man coming, who will seek to please Me when others are bent on pleasing themselves." We cannot close without thinking, too, of the One who could say, "I do always those things that please Him" (John vii. 29). May we all seek to please God more.

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A LITTLE GIRL'S PRAYER.

LADY told a friend of mine of a strange prayer she made when a little girl: "O God, make me a Christian but not yet, for I do like to laugh and be happy; but don't let me die suddenly as some children do, but make me good a fortnight before I die."

What a strange prayer! and yet it expresses what is in the mind of many. The devil had put into that little girl's mind that to be a Christian meant to be unhappy and miserable. Why, it is the Christian boy and girl that have the best right to laugh and be happy. Then the hammer speaks of making. The hammer and the sickle are the symbols of the present Russian Government, the sickle standing for agriculture and the hammer for industry. The "Knight of the hammer" is another name for a blacksmith.

In the Book of Proverbs, and many other places in the Bible, we are warned against laziness, and encouraged to be industrious. We may not realize it, but work is a great blessing, and those who have nothing to do but amuse themselves are generally unhappy people.

Many things in life we can never get unless we work for them; but we can never obtain salvation and the forgiveness of our sins by working for them. "It is not try but trust." The moment you receive the Lord Jesus He receives you, and gives you pardon, a new life and a new start. You then belong to Christ—you are Christ's one—you are a Christian. The more He controls you the more free and strong you will be, and the more keen to live the life that is really worth while. So He will make you what He desires you to be.

Fix it now, and say: "Lord Jesus, take me as I am, and make me the best that I can be."

" VERILY, VERILY"

(John v. 24, 25).

THERE we have one of the most beautiful verses of the Bible. Let us read it together. "Verily, verily, I say unto you. He that heareth My word, and believeth on Him that sent Me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life."

There are five things in this verse I want you to notice.

(1) Hearing; (2) Believing:

(3) Hath everlasting life; (4) Shall not come into condemnation; (5) Passed from death unto life.

How well I remember several of my friends and myself starting some weeknight meetings, and amongst those who came regularly was a bright young girl, full of fun, but the Gospel seemed to make no impression on her. One night, she came in her usual carefree manner, but on the meeting coming to a close she showed some anxiety about salvation.

We repeated this verse over to her several times, and as we knelt down she accepted Christ there and then as her Saviour. She had heard the words of Jesus; she believed them; and she possessed everlasting life.

Now, dear boys and girls, before you can believe anyone you must hear what they have to say. You have often heard the words of Jesus, have you not? has bid you come to Him and you have never heard of His turning any away. Having heard, believe on God, who says, "Look unto Me, and be ye saved" (Isaiah xlv. 22). On the authority of God's Word you then HAVE everlasting life, not feel that you have it. God never tells us to trust our feelings.

Moreover, we shall never come into condemnation or judgment, because we have passed from death unto life now. Once we were dead in trespasses and sins, but now we should live unto God if we have believed on His Son. of the poor blacks in Africa are hearing His voice, and instead of being dead in sin they are living unto Him who loved and died for them. See that they do not get into heaven whilst you are left outside. L. A. A.

ATONEMENT.

AST month we considered a little about sin. Sin is a terrible reality and, before we can get any blessing, we must take our place as sinners before

Now, this month, we have a wonderful picture of the way in which God puts sin away. In the sixteenth chapter Leviticus we read how God brought out a plan so that the barrier of sin might be removed in regard to the children of Israel. One day every year was to be set apart as a day of atonement. ment really means "a covering," and in former days it was pronounced "at-onement," which makes the meaning clear. Sin separates God and man, but through atonement the sinner is brought near to God and sin is for ever put away. day of atonement was a very solemn day—the one thought throughout the camp of Israel was SIN.

Two things are needful if God and man

are to be brought together:-

1. God's claims must be satisfied.

2. Man's guilt and need must be met.

Leviticus xvi. is very interesting and instructive, and I would advise you to read the whole chapter carefully, because therein you will find how God accomplishes these two things. You will read first how Aaron had to be clothed with the spotless, holy garments, to go into the holy place of the tabernacle. Nothing that is unclean can enter God's presence.

Then Aaron was to take two goats to the door of the tabernacle, there to present them before the Lord. these goats was to die as a sin offering and the other was to bear upon him all the sins of the people unto a land not

inhabited.

The first goat was to be put to death. God's claims demanded this. " The soul that sinneth, it shall die," is the judgment which hangs over the head of every unsaved soul. God, however, in His mercy provided the victim which died instead of the people. The blood of the goat was sprinkled by Aaron before the Lord, and the sin-offering was accepted. God's claims were met by the blood.

This all speaks to us of the wonderful sacrifice of the Lord Jesus Christ who

gave Himself, and who met the claims of God's throne by the shedding of His own blood.

After sprinkling the blood, Aaron came forth and, in sight of all the people, he confessed the sins of the whole congregation over the head of the second goat. It must have been a wonderful scene. The people look on in silence whilst the sins are told out, and each one knows that his burden is laid upon the goat. The animal is then led out by a man into the wilderness, far, far away, into a land of forgetfulness and there the man lets the goat go free. The sins gone never to be recalled.

The goat which was slain tells that God's claims have been satisfied—the scapegoat tells that the sinner's need has been met.

You may ask, "How can I get rid of my burden of sin to-day?" There is only one Person who can meet your need. When He died He became the Sinbearer. He has satisfied all the claims of God so that you need not carry the burden of sin any longer. Atonement is an accomplished fact, and all you need to do is to put your trust in the Lord Jesus Christ, who is able to remove all your sins and carry them away, never to be brought up against you again.



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"BEHOLD THE LAMB OF GOD."

"BEHOLD the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world" (John i. 29). What precious words for the multitude to hear as they stood by the banks of Jordan that day, many years ago! John the Baptist, pointing to Jesus, commanded them to look at the Spotless Lamb. Just in that day, as in ours, the sin question was raised in the hearts of the people.

True, indeed, sin had to be removed from before God, but who was to stand in the sinner's place? No sinner could, and no one was capable but the Lamb of God's providing. The Lamb, however, must be slain, for without the shedding of blood there is no remission of sins. This is the first time the Lamb is mentioned in the New Testament.

The first time the word lamb is spoken of in the Old Testament is in Genesis xxii. when Abraham's faith was tried. God told Abraham to take his only son, Isaac, whom he loved, and to offer him up as a burnt offering to the Lord. Abraham obeyed God, taking Isaac his son up Mount Moriah. Isaac asked his father where the lamb was for the burnt offering, and Abraham said, "God will provide Himself a Lamb."

On they went, and Abraham laid Isaac on the altar and was about to slay him when God came in and withheld his hand. Abraham then saw a ram

caught in a thicket and offered it instead of his son.

Going back to our verse in John, we trace the Lamb of God from Jordan's banks up the hill called Calvary, where He offered Himself to God as the Sacrifice for sin. No hand intervened to stay the knife upon this spotless, holy, sinless Lamb, as there Jesus took upon Himself the sin of the whole world and became the sinner's substitute. What a perfect offering! and God was so pleased that He raised Him from the dead and set Him at His right hand in glory.

Dear young reader, does this mean anything to you that Jesus the Holy Lamb of God should die in your room and stead? Ponder over it, and see Jesus laying down His life on the Cross for you; then "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved."

Some years ago in the town of Archangel, there was a spire being built some hundred feet high, when one of the workmen slipped and began to fall.

At that moment there was passing the building a flock of sheep with many little lambs among them, and just as the workman was nearing the ground to be dashed to death, one of the little lambs came under him and was crushed to death. The man escaped being hurt, and after a little rest was able to resume work. He at once got permission to cut out from a large stone the statue of a lamb. After it was finished he placed it on the spire just at the place where he had fallen, and I believe it can be seen there to-day.

Now, my friend, it cost Jesus His life that He might have you for Himself. He died in your room and stead! Wont you come to him now? Trust this wonderful Saviour, that you may be able to say from your heart, "Thou art worthy... for Thou wast slain, and hast redeemed us to God by Thy blood" (Revelation y. 9).

"VERILY, VERILY"

(John viii. 34).

POW, dear young folks, we have a rather solemn verse this month. "Whosoever committeth [or practiseth] sin is the servant of sin." Nevertheless the words are just as much true as the others we have been considering, for they were uttered by Jesus Himself.

Does it ever occur to you, I wonder, that every time you commit sin it proves that sin has had the mastery over you? Satan is so pleased if he gets us to do what is wrong; and the temptations to sin now are so many that, unless we are constantly on the watch, we can soon fall into bad habits. The sad fact is that sin has such small beginnings, and it grows and grows on us as we practise it, until we thus become the servant of sin.

Some years ago, in the office where ${f I}$ worked, there was a boy who got amongst bad companions. One day, instead of posting a parcel, he hid it and kept the postage money. It was only about ninepence, but having once started on the downward path he found it easy to go on, but not quite so easy to stop. As the weeks went by, so he nearly always pocketed the postage money of the weekly parcel, and as the parcels were for abroad his sin was not found out for quite a long Then, all of a sudden, the sin he had practised was discovered. He refused to admit it and was dismissed from his situation. You see, the bad practice started with one small sin.

Always remember that no one can serve two masters. It must be that we either serve God or Satan. Whose servant would you rather be? I know what your answer is; but then if we do what we like and please ourselves we are in reality serving Satan; in other words,

as our text says, we are the servants of sin. We cannot get away from this fact, even if we would like to do so, because the words are those of the Lord Jesus, and so as to make us quite sure of their truth He said, "Verily, verily." Therefore believe His words and see that you are on the Lord's side, and serving Him as your Master.

By-the-by, I hope all our readers are making a very diligent search in order to find every verse in the Gospel of John where the words "Verily, verily" occur. You only have till the 31st of this month to complete your list and send it in.

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REDEMPTION.

STORY is told about a certain man who, walking the streets of London, saw a bird-hawker displaying a number of singing birds for sale in small cages. He approached the dealer and offered a sum of money for all the birds. This was readily accepted. What do you think this man did with so many birds? He had bought them and could have taken them home to be his own. Instead, however, he opened all the cages and allowed the birds to fly free.

This incident illustrates our present subject. Redemption means "to purchase or to rescue in order to set free." You have heard how the slaves in the West Indies were set free long ago! Boys and girls, as well as men and women, were stolen from their homes and sold to the traders who owned the plantations away in the West Indies.

The slaves were forced to work very hard and were often cruelly treated. Noble men in this country of England could not endure the thought of the awful trade going on, and for twenty-five years they appealed for the liberation of the slaves, until at last, nearly 100 years ago, the Government of Great Britain was induced to buy all the slaves. Millions of pounds were spent for this purpose and the slaves thus bought were all set free. It cost a very great sum of money, but what a change it must have produced in the lives of these people.

You, unsaved reader, are a slave to sin and to Satan; but in order to set you free, the Lord Jesus Christ has paid the redemption price. This was not paid in silver or gold, but by HIS OWN

PRECIOUS BLOOD.

There is a very important lesson to be learnt from Exodus, chapter xiii, verse 13. Look this verse up in your Bibles and you will there see two things—REDEMP-TION or DESTRUCTION. " Every firstling of an ass thou shalt redeem with a lamb; and if thou wilt not redeem it, then thou shalt break his neck."

The little ass would probably mean very much to the owner, because in those days there were no trains or motor-cars. The ass might prove to be a great help to his business when it became older and stronger. But it had to be redeemed with a lamb, and if the owner was too poor to get a lamb it would have to be destroyed. Of course, someone who was rich might have pity upon the poor man and provide a lamb for him. Then the lamb would die instead of the ass.

So it is with every one of us. We are all condemned to die because of our sins and, as we are too poor to meet the claims of God ourselves, God Himself has provided a Lamb for our redemption. The Lord Jesus Christ died so that we might go free.

May none who read these lines turn their backs upon God's way of salvation, but accept the Lamb of God as their

Saviour.

A BIBLE HERO.

MOST of us have our heroes and heroines. They may be people that we know, or those of whom we hear at school; perhaps some of whom we read in our books of history; or, it may be, some missionaries of whose experience we learn from the beautiful prize books we receive at the Sunday School. We are all agreed, however, that the most wonderful persons are those of whom we read in the Bible. One of these is Daniel, and we feel quite sure we all claim him as our hero.

When quite young, Daniel, who had been born and brought up among God's people, and who himself was a lover of God, was carried away with them into a foreign country, and found himself amongst people who did not know anything about his God, but who just did what they pleased. Let us notice a few

things about Daniel.

First. As we have remarked, he loved God. He decided that though he was in a strange land, he was going to show his colours, and be true to God. He got the chance of getting a good position, but it seemed as if in order to get it, he must do something that he felt was wrong, and he made up his mind that he would not do it. He did not do it, and he got the position. When we are tempted at school to hide our colours, and to do something that we know those who love God should not do, let us remember Daniel and read the first chapter of the book that bears his name.

Second. He loved good companions. Some time after Daniel got the position, the king had a dream one night. Next morning he was very miserable, and the strange thing was he could not remember the dream. He called for his wise men and commanded them to tell him his dream, and then say what it meant, but

not one of them could do it. The king was angry and said they must all be slain. Daniel heard about it, and told the executioner to give him time, and he would tell the king his dream. Then he got hold of his three companions, and told them to pray to God. God answered their prayer, revealed the dream to Daniel, and he told the king all about it. That is one benefit of having good companions. Sometimes boys and girls want to chum up with us at school. They do not love God, they laugh at those who desire to follow the Lord Jesus, and they try to make us do naughty things.

Now read the second chapter, and, like Daniel, choose good companions.

Third. Daniel loved prayer. We have just had an example of that; now we shall have another. Because Daniel loved God, and because the king promoted him, some men did not like him, and they said they must get rid of him, so they made a plot. They went to the king and asked him to make a rule that if any one prayed to any person except himself for thirty days, he should be put into a den of lions. When the king had signed the rule, they said, " Now we have got Daniel." Though he knew all about it, Daniel, just as usual, opened his windows toward Jerusalem, kneeled upon his knees, and, three times a day, prayed to God. His enemies went and told the king, who was very sorry, but he had to carry out his own rule. Daniel was cast into a den of lions, and there he spent a night.

The king was wretched, he could not sleep. Early next morning he went to the den, called to Daniel and asked him if his God had been able to deliver him, and how glad he was when he heard Daniel's voice and knew that he was safe. So angry was the king with the wicked men, that he ordered them to be put in the lions' den, and they were all

slain. What a lesson this is for us. Let us read chapter vi., and be encouraged to *Pray!* and *PRAY!!!*

Fourth. Daniel loved good books. There are such a lot of books printed to-day that are not good. Some look very nice, but they tempt us to doubt God's Word, and to think that it does not mean what father and mother and Sunday School teacher have told us that it does mean. Some books fill our minds with evil thoughts and evil desires.

Thank God for all the good books.

The best book to read is the Bible. It is full of the most interesting stories, and every story is perfectly true. Then there are so many fine books that tell us about men and women who lived for the glory of God, and who died a cruel death rather than deny the precious name of Jesus. Chapter ix. and verse 2 tells us what Daniel understood from books. Now we must finish, or our kind Editor will be saying "Stop!" Let us

open our Bibles, read about Daniel, and then sing:—


"Dare to be a Daniel!

THE LIFE OF DAVID AND ITS LESSONS.

II.

POW, boys and girls, I want you to open your Bibles and read 1 Samuel xvi. down to verse 13, as this is the scripture we are going to look at this time. In February we noticed the first mention of David in the Bible, and saw how God brought in his name at a time when Israel was very disobedient. Now in 1 Samuel xvi. we read how David was chosen of God to be the king who would rule

in His way, and not like king Saul, who ruled to please himself.

If you read chapter xv., you will see that Saul, who was then king, was sent by God to destroy the Amalekites, but he disobeyed and did what he thought right, with the result that Samuel the prophet told him that God would take the kingdom from him and give it to another (verse 28). How sad to read of this king who disobeyed the word of God; but let me ask, have you always obeved the voice of God? As you read this, does your heart tell you that you do not obey His voice? Listen to what Samuel says in verse 22. He tells us that to obey God's voice is better than anything else we can do. The Apostle Paul tells us that obedience for us must begin by having faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour (Romans i. 5). Let me ask you then, each one, have you believed the Gospel; saved?

Now, as we turn to our chapter we read in verse 1 that God tells Samuel to take a horn of oil and go to the house of Jesse at Bethlehem and anoint the king whom He had provided for Himself.

David was the youngest of Jesse's eight sons, and when Samuel arrived they all seemed to be at home except David, who was in the field looking after the sheep. Ah! what a difference. David the *youngest* looking after the sheep, and the seven all at home. How like the One who at twelve years of age could say He must be about His Father's business (Luke ii. 49).

First, then, these seven pass before Samuel, who thought that the oldest and tallest would be God's choice; but God says it is the *heart* that counts, not the size. How often we think, like Samuel. Perhaps you think you are too young or too small to do anything for God; do you? Well, look at 2 Kings

v. verses 2 and 3, and also John vi.

verses 9-11.

God refused the seven brothers in turn, and then Jesse sent for David,

turn, and then Jesse sent for David, his eighth son. Now eight in scripture means something new and different, and would teach us here that David was quite different from his brothers. How this reminds us of the Lord Jesus who was altogether different from every other man. Even His enemies had to say, "Never man spake like this Man" (John vii. 46). Now when David entered God says, "This is he" (verse 2); so Samuel arises and anoints him king in the presence of all his brethren.

Now as I close I want you to compare in your Bibles verse 12 with Matthew iii. verse 17. Also verse 13, with Hebrews i. verse 9, and you will see that David is a wonderful likeness of our Lord Jesus Christ. David means beloved, and this points us to the One of whom God speaks of as His beloved Son. Do you know Him?

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IV.

"VERILY, VERILY."

(John x. 7).

"YERILY, verily, I say unto you, I am the door of the sheep." Then in verse 9 we read that Jesus said, "I am the door; by Me if any man enter in, he shall be saved."

Now there are many boys and girls and grown-ups, too, who think there are many doors to safety, and that they can choose to be saved just in what way they like; but they are wrong, because Jesus is the door. This surely means that there is *only one* door.

We of course understand that Jesus does not mean a literal door, but He

uses the door as a figure; and just as we enter a room or house by the door, so we enter a place of safety by coming to Jesus, for we can only enter by Him.

If you were to read about the Tabernacle in the Old Testament you would find that there was only one entrance, and all who came to offer a sacrifice had to enter by that one entrance. No one was allowed to enter by any other means. So let us learn the lesson first of all, that Jesus is the door.

Then there is another very important thing our text tells us, and that is that any who enter shall be saved. It matters not what kind of people they are who come, all will be welcomed, which means that we are responsible to come, and must each see that we enter in.

You will also notice something else, and it is that all those who enter by that door *shall be saved*; not *may* be, nor *hope* to be, but shall be saved. When you meet anyone who says that they are hoping to be saved one day, just point them to this text.

Always remember then, firstly, JESUS is the door; secondly, that any may enter; and thirdly, that those who enter shall be saved, for Jesus said this was truly so.

SALVATION.

CALVATION is one of the grandest themes in the whole of God's Word. How good of God to plan means of salvation for lost and ruined sinners! It is most wonderful that He should stoop to look upon rebellious creatures. Our condition was hopeless. Like a man sinking in the water beyond the reach of help, we were surely in a serious condition but the arm of the Lord reached out to save us.

The way of salvation has been made very plain. Listen to the words of the Lord Jesus Christ Himself: "I am the door: by Me if any man enter in, he shall be saved" (John x. 9). This is simple indeed! Let us split these words into three parts. In the first part, "I am the door, by Me," we get

THE SOURCE OF SALVATION.

The Lord Jesus Christ is the speaker, and He is our only hope of salvation. The youngest amongst our readers understands what a door is. If you want to go into a room, you go in by the door. A door has two sides, and you cannot be on both sides at the same time. If you are on the inside, you are not on the outside. If you are outside, however, you can be on the inside in a moment simply by a step. The Lord Jesus Christ in this portion of scripture likens Himself to a door, and tells us plainly that it is through Him we get salvation and entrance into life eternal.

"One door, only one, Yet its sides are two; Inside and outside, On which side are you?

"I am on the inside, On which side are YOU?"

The second part of our verse reads, "If any man," and gives us

THE SCOPE OF SALVATION.

Salvation is not limited to a few people: it is not kept for a select class; it is available for all. As the sun shines in the heavens for everybody, so the gospel of salvation shines out to every soul. None are excluded here. No matter what your position be in this life, salvation is offered you. You are lost and you need a Saviour. The One you need is JESUS.

"Enter in . . . be saved," shows

THE SIMPLICITY OF SALVATION.

As we have said, it only requires a step to pass from the outside to the inside of a room. This is all that is needed to get salvation. It is the step of faith. Simple trust in the Lord Jesus Christ. Why trust to things which can never save you? It is a Person we are to trust. He gave His life for us on the cross and, because He died, we can live in Him.

We are told that "now is the day of salvation." Salvation is offered to all to-day, but it will not always be so. The gospel story now sounds all around us, but the day is coming when the door of mercy will be shut. When once the door is shut, it will never be opened. If you are then outside, you will be outside for ever. No salvation! For ever lost! Don't delay to take salvation whilst you have the opportunity.




Those, however, who have not trusted the Lord Jesus as their Saviour, and who have not had their sins washed away in

CROSSES AND THEIR MEANING.

A SHORT time ago I saw the large cross in white which appears on a slope some little distance from the main road not far from Maidstone, in Kent. Some idea of its size may be gained when I tell you that two haystacks lying quite near looked very small indeed.

Some of our young readers will have heard of the white horse cut out of the chalk some distance from Reading; and near Seaford, in Sussex, there is a giant, cut out in the same way on the hillside.

There are various forms of cross, the one referred to being the Latin cross. The cross is a very common emblem in lands where Christianity is known. We are all familiar with the cross at the top of a church; with the monument erected at the centre of a town, or at a spot noted for some event in history; with the

emblem which is so frequently seen in churchyards and cemeteries; with the decoration known as the Victoria Cross, which is awarded for conspicuous valour. The red cross is recognized the world over as standing for the care of the wounded; and we are all familiar with the word as describing trouble, and pain and affliction.

But to the believer in the Lord Jesus Christ, the cross always speaks, first and foremost. of the great sacrifice made by his Saviour, by which it was possible for his sins to be forgiven. The cross of Calvary means several wonderful things,

but it means chiefly that Christ died as Sin-Bearer. That is the central meaning of Calvary, and from that wonderful fact flow all the blessings that our souls enjoy and will enjoy for ever.

A little girl named Lilian was very ill. Partly that he might be near her, and partly to relieve his thoughts, her father busied himself about the house. The blinds in her room wanted mending, so he brought his tools and set to work. Presently the little one called him.

"Daddy, bring two of your sticks to me"; and of course he obeyed.

"Now, daddy, lay one across the other,

and put a nail—one nail—right through."

The result was a cross.

"Now, daddy, get your pencil—your big one that you mark your wood with—and write: 'Jesus died for daddy.'"

Tears were in his eyes; but he was an honest man, and would not deceive her.

"Lily, I can't write that; I'd have to be a Christian if I did."

The little one pleaded, but it was of no avail. He felt he could not write what he did not believe. But then, he thought, it might be true, even if he did not believe it. The Bible said, "Jesus died." Then He died for somebody. Was there any particular somebody for whom Jesus did not die? No. Why, then, should he exclude himself? Had he not as much right to say Jesus died for him as anybody upon the earth?

After the child was buried he took up the rough cross he had made, and there was the place where she had asked him

to write. Should he do it? He feared to die, for his conscience told him, "After death the judgment." But if Jesus died for him as his Sin-Bearer, death would only be going into the presence of his Saviour.

He loved the child, and one morning was found at her grave with the cross. Do you see those words along the straight piece of wood? He has written it—" Jesus died for daddy." Now he believes it, and knows the joy of sins forgiven.

Do you believe that Jesus died for you? Then write it, and thank Him for it.

"VERILY, VERILY"

(JOHN xii. 24).

"YERILY, verily, I say unto you, Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit."

Do I hear one of our young friends saying, "Whatever does this verse mean?" Well, now, let us see. First of all you will notice the importance that is attached to the statement by these words that are so often used by Jesus, "Verily, verily."

Now, unless the little wheat seedlings fall into the ground, then there could be no wheat crop later on. The seed must be hidden away in the ground and then, one day, a little green shoot will appear, later on a beautiful ear of corn; and it all came from that one seed in the ground.

The words that Jesus uttered really referred to Himself. If Jesus had not died upon the cross He would have gone back to heaven alone; and there could have been no hope for you or me ever getting there. But He "died for us" (1 Thessalonians v. 10), and in dying and being raised up again He has made the way open for us to go to heaven and live with Him. Jesus said, "I go to prepare a place for you" (John xiv. 2).

Do you love Him, dear boys and girls, for all that He has done for you? The sight of that cross has melted many hearts since Jesus died. Have you ever thanked Him? Or are you like the nine lepers who were so forgetful? Remember that if He had not died you would have had no possible opportunity of ever entering heaven. But now there will be many, so many, with Him one day. Some will be there perhaps we never expected, and some perhaps whom we expected, will be missing. Will you be there?

REPENTANCE.

A LL boys and girls like to read, I am sure, the lives of great men and great women. Many people have been used of God in remarkable ways, and the records of their lives, whilst giving interesting reading, are often the means of confirming our faith and increasing our courage. Men have stood alone for God in the darkest days and their testimony has been wonderfully blest.

One such was John the Baptist. The days in which he lived were dark indeed. There was very little light shining for God. The world had turned against God, although He in grace had lingered long. Messengers had been sent one after the other to plead with men, but all were rejected. Now, God was going to send His Son to do what all the others could not to—to make atonement for sin.

John came as the forerunner of Jesus. He was a man of the hills—clothed with camel's hair. Locusts and wild honey were his food, and the desert his home. He was a strange missionary, but he had his heart thrilled with a definite message. He cried aloud as the people pressed out of the cities and villages to hear him:

"REPENT YE."

His message was with power because the people answered confessing their sins.

The Lord Jesus Christ Himself came along, and you know the story well of how He was baptized of John in Jordan, and the voice came from heaven, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." John disappears, and it is recorded that, "From that time Jesus began to preach, and to say,

" REPENT."

Later, when the Pharisees complained that Jesus mixed with the publicans and sinners, He said that He came not to call the righteous but sinners to repentance. In the fifteenth chapter of Luke's Gospel, we read that there is joy in heaven over one sinner that repenteth. Further, in Peter's second Epistle, it is stated that God is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance.

What meaneth this message? What

is repentance?

A good illustration of repentance we get in the story of the Prodigal Son. The boy left his home, his father, and his friends. He had plenty of money, and off he went to enjoy himself. His money was wasted and soon his last penny was spent and he began to be in want. He was in a very sad condition: nobody would give him anything.

There came a day, however, in the history of that boy when he began to think over his position. Here he was starving, in rags, without a friend to help, and a picture appeared before his mind. He thought of his father's house and the abundance of food for the household and the servants. When he left home he had thought that he was doing the right thing, but now he discovers that he had done the wrong thing. goodness of his father's heart appealed to him—will he take me in? There was no doubt about it. "I have sinned and am not worthy to be a son, but I will arise and go to my father," said he. This is true repentance. Off he went, and what a welcome he got!

Dear boys and girls, you are travelling a road. No doubt you think it a good road, but stay a moment, ponder your footsteps. Listen to the words of a wise man, "There is a way that *seemeth* right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death" (Proverbs xvi. 25).

Turn then from the path you are travelling and turn to the Saviour. Acknowledge that you are a sinner, and you will discover that there is goodness in the heart of God for you. c. s. R.





"VERILY, VERILY"

(John xiii. 16)

"YERILY, verily, I say unto you, the servant is not greater than his lord; neither He that is sent greater than He that sent Him."

This verse, I think, is meant for those who have trusted the Lord Jesus Christ. They can then be His servants and serve Him.

- 1. Now, if we are servants of Christ we must not say what we are going to do. We must do, and only do the things that our Master commands us. We must not do less than we are told, neither must we exceed our instructions. We should just obey our Master and remember that "His commandments are not grievous" (1 John v. 3). - 2. THE LIFE OF DAVID AND ITS LESSONS.

OW, boys and girls, I want you to open your Bibles at 1 Samuel open vour Bibles at 1 Samuel xvii.. where we read of David in his first public battle and victory. The first thing I want you to notice is that we have two different companies of people and two different leaders. The Philistines would speak of the people in the world, and Goliath, as Satan their leader. On the other hand, the Israelites set forth the people of God, and David, their leader, the Lord Jesus Christ. Now. each of us is in one company or the other. I leave you to say what company you are in. If the Lord is your Saviour you are one of the people of God; but if you have not yet trusted Him you are still in the world with

Satan as your leader. Have you ever thought of this?

As we read of this giant Goliath (he was nearly ten feet in height) we might wonder wherever a man is to be found who will be able to conquer him, for at his challenge all the host of Israel fled from him (verse 24). Now, after telling us about his great height and armour in the first eleven verses, we next read of David, and again find him minding sheep. I am sure if we had started to look for a man to fight Goliath we would have looked amongst all the mighty warriors of Israel, and not for a shepherd lad.

Yet this is just how God works. In the forty days that Goliath was boasting to Israel, David was being prepared in secret by God to overthrow him. Forty in Scripture means a time of testing, and in this we are reminded of the long time during which God tested man, only to prove that man was powerless against Satan and unable to overcome him. Then it was that the Lord Jesus came forth from His Father to deal with the foe.

We read also (verse 17) that David brought a host of good things with him for his brethren. How like the Lord Jesus coming into this world to bless man, with His hands full of the good things of heaven. Have you tasted these good things yet? I have. Let me tell you the first good thing He gives us— THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS. a precious portion this is! Surely He has much more for us, like David with his corn, ten loaves and ten cheeses, but we must partake of the first before we can taste the rest. "O taste and see that the Lord is good " (Psalm xxxiv. 8).

The last point I want to notice this time is, that David came right down in the valley to where his brethren were. He could have sent the keeper but did not. He came himself so that he might

talk to them, and I feel sure he would tell them of his father and all about his father's house. Here again is a wonderful picture of the Son of God becoming a man, that He might talk to men and tell them Himself all about the Father and the Father's house. No servant could have done this. I could not end this little paper on a better subject. than the wonderful love of the Lord Jesus that brought Him into this world, to tell us all about the love of His God and Father. The eve is fixed upon the goal.

Dear reader, have you ever stood at the parting of the ways? Have you heard the Lord saying, "This is the way, walk ye in it?" Earthly prosperity and worldly fame may lead you along the broad road. Good companionship and pleasure you may have, too. These things will be your ruin if you do not turn from the path you are travelling. If your life is to be a truly happy one, you must forsake the broad road and enter the highway to glory with the Lord Jesus Christ as your Saviour.

THE UNKNOWN KING.

OST of you know the story of Alfred and the cakes. You remember how that great and good man in his fight against the Danes was sometimes beaten in battle, and had to go into hiding and travel about the country dressed like a poor man. At one time as he was going about in this way he went into a herdsman's cottage, and the good wife set him the task of looking after some cakes which were baking. In those days people had no ovens as we have in our homes, but all the baking had to be done by placing the bread on a stone hearth before an open fire, and the cakes had to be watched and turned about to ensure them being baked all through.

Well, Alfred had his mind full of plans for beating the Danes and driving them out of England, and so forgot all about the cakes. The result was that the cakes were burnt, and the herdsman's wife was very angry and even boxed Alfred's ears and called him a lazy fellow, ready enough to eat the cakes, but too idle to look after them. Just then the herdsman came home and saw who the visitor really was. Greatly alarmed at the treatment his wife had dealt to him, he told her, "It is our noble lord, the King." Of course the woman was very sorry because she had been so rude to one who was really seeking to save her from their enemies, and quickly sought the King's pardon, which he freely gave.

The Bible tells us of the Lord Jesus who is the Great King. After He was born, you remember, the wise men came from the East and asked the first question in the New Testament, "Where is He that is born King of the Jews?" (Matthew ii. 2). Now the strange thing was, nobody knew anything about Him. He was born a poor Baby whom nobody wanted to find room for in their homes.

Let me tell you what Scripture says about this. You can turn to the place and find it if you will. It is in John's Gospel, chapter i, and verse 10. It says, "He was in the world, and the world was made by Him, and the world knew Him not." Just think over this verse a moment. It tells us that the beautiful fields and hedges, the sun and stars and all we see and enjoy, He made them.

How great He is! and yet, when He came here, because He was a poor child, nobody knew who He really was. When He went to Jerusalem before He died, He rode into the city in a procession, and we read, "When He was come into Jerusalem, all the city was moved, saying, 'Who is this?'" (Matthew xxi. 10). They did not know the King in His own Royal City. But you and I know He is "God over all," who came from heaven to save us.

Now, will you look at another verse in John? Chapter i. again, verse 11. It says something more surprising than verse 10. "He came into His own"—that means His own country, "and His own received Him not"—that means His own people would not open the door to let Him in, but shut Him out of their homes and hearts. Now look at these two verses in John i. again. Verse 10 tells us the world did not know Him, and verse 11 tells us that His own people did not want Him, so they put him to death on the cross.

You say, "How wicked," and yet we may be treating the Lord Jesus just in the same way as others did. He says, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock: if any man hear My voice, and open the door, I will come in to him" (Rev. iii. 20). If He stood in our street and knocked at our house door, we would run to open for Him, would we not? But there is a door some of us keep locked against Him: it is the door of our hearts.

DO you ever think of Him, and does

your heart fill with love to Him? Somebody thought about this and wrote a hymn. Here is the first verse and the chorus:—

"Thou didst leave Thy throne and Thy kingly crown,

When Thou camest to earth for me; But in Bethlehem's home there was found no room

For Thy holy nativity.

'Oh, come to my heart, Lord Jesus! There is room in my heart for Thee.'"

It is the grandest thing in the world when a boy or a girl is able to sing these lines from the bottom of the heart.

To go back to Alfred. Some time after what took place at the cowherd's house, he met his enemies in battle and beat them, and was owned as King of England. Everybody gladly bowed to him; and so, too, a day is coming soon, when the Lord Jesus is coming back to this world, not as a babe whom no one wants, but as a glorious King to reign over the earth. "And daily shall He be praised." What a glad time that will be, but if we want to share in that happy time we must learn to trust and serve Him now.

WITNESSING FOR JESUS.

N a dark dungeon many hundred years ago stood a noble Roman boy, waiting for to-morrow.

The golden light of the setting sun shone brightly on his prison frock, making it almost as gay as the beautiful dress he wore before he came into this sad place. His face looked peaceful and happy, although he knew that to-morrow he would be taken into the theatre, and there, before hundreds of his old friends and acquaintances, be torn in pieces by wild and hungry beasts.

Would you, dear reader, have looked as happy, do you think? You who cry perhaps at the slightest hurt, complain when your Sunday dress is not so fine as you would like it to be, or when there is no cake for tea, should you have looked so happy with prison dress, prison fare, and the thoughts of *such* a death?

This Roman boy was so happy because he was a Christian, and going to suffer shame and death for Jesus' sake; and when next day, before many thousands of Roman people, he was torn in pieces by the lions, God gave him strength from heaven to bear the dreadful pain, and then took his happy soul to heaven to join the glorious and noble army of martyrs whose delight it is there to sing the praises of their Saviour who died for sinners on Calvary's Cross.

Christian reader, are you standing true for your Lord? Persecution to-day does not take the cruel form such as our Roman boy was called to suffer, but Satan is ever on the alert to keep young Christians from shining for Jesus. Paul wrote to a young believer—Timothy—of his day, and said: "Thou therefore, my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus. Thou therefore endure hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. Yea, and all that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution" (2 Timothy ii, 1, 3; 2 Timothy iii. 12).

Persecution for you may mean the cruel words, the laugh of scorn, the forsaking by dear friends, but *always* remember that the Lord Jesus Christ is at

"VERILY. VERILY"

(John x. 1).

"YERILY, verily, I say unto you, He that entereth not by the door into the sheepfold, but climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber."

In an earlier chat with our readers we referred to Jesus as being THE Door and the Good Shepherd. But in this verse we are told of some who enter "some other way," and such are described as thieves and robbers. Do you know why they are called such unpleasant names? Well, I think it is because they try to catch away the sheep from the Lord Jesus Christ: but that they can never do, for His sheep "shall never perish" (verse 28). They will also try to rob us of all joy and peace, and in this they may be very successful if we are not watchful.

These thieves and robbers that come in by some other way are like false teachers, and I am sorry to say that there are some going about amongst the sheep, and you will probably meet some of them before you grow very much Such persons will tell you that one way of getting to heaven is as good as another, and that if you are sincere you will be quite all right. Now, if I am in a ship which is rapidly sinking, it is no use thinking I shall be quite safe if I refuse to enter the lifeboat which has come to save me. My sincere belief is only madness, for I shall be drowned. Jesus said, "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life" (John xiv. 6); so just trust to Him.

You can also tell these whom the Lord Jesus calls thieves and robbers, because you will find that they only believe the parts of the Bible which they wish to believe. Now we cannot and

must not attempt to treat God's Word like that. So you see these persons would like to thieve and steal away parts of the Bible, if they could, and they will tell you that some portions are untrue; these are the thieves and robbers.

Remember, that "there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts iv. 12); and if you are not saved, "NOW is the day of Salvation" (2 Corinthians vi. 2).

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FORGIVENESS.

HEN the Lord Jesus Christ was on earth He always attracted great numbers of people. On one occasion, in Capernaum, He went into a house, and we read that there was no room to receive the people, not even near the door. We can well imagine the crowd—the house full and the roadway outside

thronged with people.

Four men carrying a person sick of the palsy came along to see Jesus, but they found it impossible to get near the house. These four men had great faith, for they said that if only they could get to the Lord Jesus Christ they felt sure that their friend would be cured. They did not allow difficulties to stand in their way, for we see them climbing to the top of those houses and breaking up the roof of the house where Jesus was. The sick man was let down into the presence of the Lord Jesus, and it is recorded that "When Jesus saw their faith, He said unto the sick of the palsy, Son, thy sins be forgiven thee" (Mark ii. 5). What a Great Blessing! They brought the man to have his body healed, but Jesus looked into his heart and saw there some terrible black sins. the forgiveness of which was of far more importance than the healing of his limbs.

Sin is the root of all the sickness and sorrow in the world, and it is this which we ought to be in earnest about. People are in earnest to get their bodies cured but they give little thought to the question of their sins. Perhaps the reader is weakly in body—perhaps you have some affliction. Is the Lord Jesus Christ indifferent to this? Oh no! He has a heart full of compassion and sympathy. The Forgiveness of Your Sins, however, is of greater importance than the healing of your body.

Had Jesus no power to cure this man? Some of the men who were there thought so—they raised the question, "Who can forgive sins but God only?" But JESUS WAS GOD, and He confounded them by bidding the sick man to arise and to take up his bed and walk. Immediately the man jumped up, picked up his bed and walked before them all. The man rejoiced in the healing of his body, and he was perfectly sure that his sins were gone because the Lord Jesus Christ had spoken the word of assurance.

The forgiveness of sins is a very real matter and one which concerns us all. If we do not know that our sins are forgiven we have no part in God's things. Paul, preaching at Antioch, spoke these remarkable words, "Be it known unto you therefore, men and brethren, that through this Man [the Lord Jesus Christ] is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins" (Acts xiii. 38). The Lord Jesus Christ has done the work by which it is possible for God to forgive in a righteous way. This gift of forgiveness is to be received from God Himself. He only can whisper pardon to you for you have sinned against *Him*. David said, "Against Thee, Thee only, have I sinned"; and again, "I acknowledged my sin unto Thee . . . and Thou forgavest the iniquity of my sin"



VIII.

"VERILY, VERILY"

(John xvi. 23).

"VERILY, verily, I say unto you, V Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in My name, He will give it you." I fancy someone says, " If that is true why do I not get everything I pray for?" One reason is that all we ask for is not good for us, and a kind father never gives his children all they ask.

Perhaps you do not like praying to God because you think that He is hard, and you are afraid of Him; although you do not mind praying to the Lord

Jesus, for He seems to be nearer to you. Now is that what you think? Do you remember that beautiful verse in John iii. 16, which says, "God so loved . . . "? No, God is not a hard God, for He is a God "ready to pardon" and to forgive.

But is the reason that you are afraid of Him because you do not know Him as your Father? You have never asked Him to forgive your sins. Firstly, then, you must know God as your Father if you expect to get your prayers answered, and, like Nicodemus, you need to be

born again.

Secondly, if we ask the Father for anything, we must ask it in the name of Jesus. Now this is very important, because it means that we cannot ask for anything and everything and expect to get it. If, for instance, we ask for something just to please ourselves. how can we honestly be asking in His Name? But if we can ask in His Name, then we have the promise that we shall be given that for which we ask. Nevertheless God may not grant the reply *immediately*, nor in just the way we expect.

I am afraid that if I were asked about my own praying I should have to say that many prayers of mine have been asked out of selfishness, and I have not sought God's will at all. But if I had time I and others could tell you of some wonderful answers to prayer. God's Word and promises always remain true, never let us forget that.

"JESUS WAS SO REAL TO HER."

QUCH were the words of Elsie's Elsie B—— was only mother. eight years of age, but she could truly sing "How sweet the Name of Jesus sounds in a believer's ear." Jesus was precious

to her, because, young as she was, she "believed from the heart." "Unto you therefore which believe HE is precious" (1 Peter ii. 7). In the margin of a reference Bible you will find the words "an honour" instead of the word "precious" in that verse, so that it reads, "Unto you therefore which believe HE IS AN HONOUR." We seek honours in this world—at school, at work, at play—but here is heaven's greatest honour: and it is for "whosoever believeth in HIM "-JESUS, God's wellbeloved Son. It was in that simple way the Saviour became so real to Elsie; she believed the Word of Truth, the Gospel of our salvation."

Turning to her mother one Sunday afternoon, after hearing the dear old story of a Saviour's love, Elsie was really affected and asked her mother how she could give her heart to Jesus. It scemed to her as though the Lord had said to her, "I gave my life for thee, what hast thou given for Me?"

A gentleman once laughingly offered £100 for little Elsie, but mother would not part with her. Money cannot buy a mother's love, nor a father's care, and so mother could not part with her girlie just then. She has parted with her since to Another, even Jesus Himself, who paid a far, far greater price for her than £100. He gave Himself. sold ALL that He had. He died that with His precious blood He might purchase to Himself little Elsie B——. How dearly He must have loved her! The purchase price how great! and it is sufficient for ALL who have "faith in His blood." It is sufficient for You.

Elsie did not know that the Lord Jesus would claim her for Himself so soon—so early in her little life—but recently she was called home—her heavenly home—to be for ever with the Lord. Great sorrow filled our hearts when we laid her precious little body to

rest at R——, in Yorkshire, but the God of all comfort drew near, and He seemed to give a sweet word of comfort through His servant who spoke so tenderly at that time. He called to mind a picture of a beautiful flower garden, showing the Lord Jesus carrying in His arms a little child, and underneath the picture the words, "The fairest flower in the Master's garden." The Lord gave, and the Lord had taken away, and we believe the dear sorrowing parents were enabled to say with a quiet note of triumph, "Blessed be the Name of the Lord."

We all felt the words of the picture were in keeping with the happy witness Elsie had borne for her Saviour before the Master called her away. She had let her little light so shine that even the Matron at the hospital where Elsie was a patient before she died, said, "She has made us all think." She witnessed first at home. Having believed in the heart that God had raised Jesus from the dead, and that He was a living Saviour, she confessed Him as Lord—with her mouth. How it must have cheered her mother to hear her say, "I do love Jesus."

Not long before her illness, special children's services were held in the village where she lived, and when the preacher asked that those who had decided for Christ should put up their hands, Elsie's hands went up. So she confessed her Lord before others. She was not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ. Her last witness was in Hospital at G——, where she had been taken with diphtheria. After several anxious days she got worse. It was Lord's Day morning and Matron was watching over her bedside.

Elsie looked up into Matron's face, and asked, "Please what day is it?" Matron told her it was Sunday. Elsie, no doubt feeling very ill, said, "Will someone tell me about Jesus?" How precious He must have seemed to her just then. Matron replied, "Shall I

tell you something about Him?" and with Elsie's assent, Matron repeated to her the first verse of that beautiful children's hymn:--

"There's a Friend for little children Above the bright blue sky. A Friend who never changes, Whose love will never die; Our earthly friends may fail us, And change with changing years, This Friend is always worthy Of that dear Name He bears."

As she finished the verse, Elsie smiled, and said, "How lovely—Jesus." Those were her last words on earth. She had gone to be with the Friend for little children—Her Friend—to live with Him in the place He had gone to prepare for HIS OWN. Has He gone to prepare a place for YOU?

Do not let Elsie's threefold witness be in vain. First at home, then before others, then at the end of her short life, JESUS was real to her. What does

He mean to you?

CONFESSION.

PATHEN we think of the subject of confession our minds turn at once to that well-known verse of Scripture in Paul's Epistle to the Romans (chapter x, verse 9), "That if thou shalt confess with the mouth the Lord Jesus for Jesus as Lord, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved."

Confessing and believing go together, and you cannot separate them. A great many people will talk about Jesus and His life here. They will tell you to follow His ways and try to walk as He walked, and probably you will be saved in the end. There is no such idea in God's Word. The great thing in the Scripture which we have quoted is SUBMISSION. It is not sufficient to talk about Jesus—we must confess Him as Lord—to acknowledge His power and authority. Now, you cannot do this unless your heart has been affected by His grace and you have accepted Him as your Saviour.

All down the ages God has had His witnesses—those who have stood for Him in the darkest days. Volumes have been written about the men and women who have boldly testified for the Lord Jesus Christ amidst every

kind of persecution. This is a day of much indifference to the things of God, and the Lord looks for the confession of His name from our lips. He greatly values this, insomuch that He says, "Whosoever therefore shall confess Me before men, him will I confess also before My Father which is in heaven"; and "Whosoever shall confess Me before men, him shall the Son of Man also confess before the angels of God." These are very wonderful promises and are the portion of all who take their stand for the Lord Jesus

Christ.

To confess the name of Christ may be very difficult at times—it may mean a little jeer or scoff, but, on the other hand, it may be a little encouragement to others who are backward. How often we have heard how a boy or girl at school has confessed and thus has given confidence to others to show their colours.

It is the duty of all boys and girls who love the Lord to testify boldly to whom they belong. You will have your reward if you let it be known that you belong to Christ.

There is a day coming when every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord (Philippians ii.), but it will then be too late for salvation. C. S. R.

THE LIFE OF DAVID AND ITS LESSONS.

IV.

I HOPE, boys and girls, by this time you have all read the chapter we are taking, 1 Samuel xvii., and are well aware of its contents, as it is so much easier to understand what is being said

when you read the chapter for yourselves. Now you will remember that last time we got down to about verse 22, where David was with his brethren; so this time start at verse 23.

The first thing we notice is that there is no change with Goliath; he cries as before, but there is a big change amongst the people of Israel. David is now with them and that meant a mighty change of things, as Goliath was soon to find out. For forty days he had cried (verses 8-10), the Israelites always fleeing from him, but now the time of testing is over. day forty-one a man is there, who is more than able to do battle with the champion. God's chosen one had at last appeared to take up the cause of poor, failing Israel, and to save them from the enemy. Need I remind you that here we see another picture of the Lord Think of Him in the wilderness, alone, and Satan tempting Him! Every other man that Satan had tempted had failed before him, but here is a Man that overcomes him, and takes his power from him. Yes, Jesus was the only One who could face the enemy, and to His everlasting praise, He has conquered Satan for ever (Revelation i. 18).

Now, as David listens to the cry of Goliath, the men tell him that a great reward will be given to the man who slays him (verse 25). If you read the verse carefully you will see that the reward is threefold. (1) Great riches. (2) A bride. (3) Freedom for his father's house. In all this we see again the greater than David, our Lord Jesus His great riches are mentioned in Ephesians iii. 8. His Bride, composed of all who in this day of Grace are washed in His precious blood, in Ephesians His Father's house, that is His own earthly people, in Romans xi. 26. Such are the great effects of the mighty victory of the Son of God.

Now as David listened to the reward

that was promised, it became clear that he intended to fight this strong man. We would, of course, expect that all would be glad to know that a man had been found who would face Goliath; but instead of being glad, we read that his eldest brother was angry and treated him with scorn (verse 28). Eliab taunted him with only being able to look after a few sheep. His lowliness was all that Eliab could talk about, and thus judged David was far too weak to meet Goliath. Yet, when David is before Saul he tells him that when minding the few sheep, he had slain both a lion and a bear. Ah! how little Eliab knew of this. his lowliness he had been a mighty victor. So with the Lord Jesus Christ in His lowly pathway, we see Him dealing with the lion of death in Luke viii. 49-56, and the bear of judgment in Luke v. 18-26. Proof that He was able to meet the foe in due time. We shall hope (God willing) to take up the victory of David on the occasion of our next talk.

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IX.

"VERILY. VERILY."

(John xvi. 20).

"YERILY, verily, I say unto you, that ye shall weep and lament, but the world shall rejoice: and ye shall be sorrowful, but your sorrow shall be turned into joy."

Now, although there are many more instances of the Lord using the words "Verily, verily," we are going to finish our talks with this one. You may think this is rather a sad text that we have chosen this month, but it is not really.

Jesus had been speaking to His disciples about His departure, and it made them feel sad, and well it might. I remember once my dear father said he

was going hundreds of miles away for five or six weeks; how sad it made me feel. We can quite understand the thoughts of the disciples as they realized their Lord and Master would soon be leaving them, although the people in general would rejoice at His going. But a change was coming, for Jesus said, "but your sorrow shall be turned into joy." Why? Because He was coming back again.

Now, whenever you read your Bible—and I hope you do read it, though it be only a few verses a day—always notice that small word "but." When you come to it go back and read again what has gone before, then read very carefully what follows, because you will find it

very important.

Are you sad that Jesus is not here so that you could see Him? If so, never mind, for you will see Him one day if you really love Him, and you will rejoice and be happy then. Do not trouble if some laugh and make fun of you because you are looking for Jesus to return.

I cannot tell you how glad I was when my dear father returned home, and I used always to endeavour to be the first to catch a glimpse of him. That is how we should watch for the Saviour, is it not?



A WONDERFUL WORK OF GOD.

EAR children, would you like to hear something of the great revival in the north of Ireland?

It happened long before you were born, in 1859—a year that has never since been forgotten in that country, and is always associated with this wonderful work of God.

The revival was at a time when God worked in awakening and saving souls all over the country in a very unusual way. A great many children were brought to Jesus also, some of whom are still living as men and women to testify of His grace at that time.

It began in answer to the prayers of some young men near Ballymena, who met together to pray and hold cottage meetings, and gradually spread far and wide. People were affected in a way which was called being "stricken." They would fall down and cry for mercy. and were often unconscious of all around them; and this would last until they found peace. Others were not thus unconscious, but in deep unconcealed distress about their souls. In a meeting scores would be in this state at the same time, while any who knew the Lord sought to point them to Jesus as the Saviour, and to His finished work upon the cross. In most cases they arose from this state of sorrow, praising the Lord for having saved them and forgiven their sins. I must tell you that before the revival few in that country thought it possible to know their sins forgiven in this world; but the converts learnt it then through the Holy Spirit's teaching, and numbers of previously doubting souls, who were never stricken down, found peace with God.

While the revival was at its height in Co. Antrim, a Christian went from

another county where it had not yet reached, to see the work for himself, and rejoiced much at all he witnessed of the grace of God. On returning home he announced he would hold an open-air meeting the following Sunday afternoon under the trees at his own gate, which opened into the chief street of the little town, and that he would relate what he had seen of the revival. It was glorious summer weather early in June, and open-air meetings were being generally held, so the people came in good numbers, and another meeting was announced for the following evening at eight o'clock under the beech trees. Two people were stricken at that meeting, and for about three months following there was scarcely one evening that meetings were not held under those old trees.

Great blessing followed the preaching on the third evening, and continued night after night for some time. As it grew dark the stricken people used to be brought into the house close by, followed by others, until the large lower rooms would be so packed that it was with the greatest difficulty anyone could move through them. Before the second night of this happy invasion the carpets were taken up, and the furniture arranged to suit the occasion. People even came upstairs; and great was the surprise of the little daughter of the house to find two children she well knew—a boy and girl—sobbing as if their hearts would break on her mother's bed, while their parents stood by seeking to speak words of peace and salvation. Both children found Christ at that time, and became bright witnesses for Him.

Downstairs the scene was beyond description. The rooms, as has been already said, were crammed. Some were sobbing about their sins, and inconsolable; some crying out aloud; other stricken ones on the floor, knowing nothing of what was going on around

them. But the cries of "My sins, my sins," or "I want Jesus," were often heard. Beside these in distress were others who had just found the Saviour—had rested their souls on Him, and found His precious blood was shed for them—and were rejoicing. One little group would be heard singing the chorus:—

"Glory, honour, praise and power," etc.

over some rejoicing saved one; so you may imagine, if you can, what an indescribable scene it was. The Christians of the neighbourhood mingled in the crowd, seeking to help anxious souls by pointing them to Jesus. The house was often as full as ever at one or two o'clock in the morning, the sun rising on many lingering there, unwilling to go home without finding peace; and one morning it was 7 a.m. before the mistress of the house could induce the last poor anxious soul to leave, and then try to take a few hours' rest Her husband's hands were full beyond measure. He preached every evening in the open air, besides working all night among the stricken people, and visiting others by day.

ARE YOU EVER ASHAMED TO ——?

OMETIMES boys and girls do wrong things when they know better, and when found out they are rightly ashamed of their conduct. That is, perhaps, a good sign, for then they may be more careful not to do the same things again.

But I want to ask you if you are ashamed of something else. I wonder if you can guess what I mean! Are you ashamed to confess the Lord Jesus Christ as your own Saviour because of what others will think? Then do not be afraid of them, for Jesus said, "For whosoever shall be ashamed of Me and of My words, of him shall the Son of man be ashamed, when He shall come in His own glory, and in His Father's, and of the holy angels" (Luke ix. 26).

We should be very careful to see that we are courageous. Joshua, you will remember, was told to "Be strong and of a good courage, fear not, nor be afraid of them" (Deuteronomy xxxi. 6).

Are we afraid of being seen with our Bible? Only this summer I was staying at the seaside, and one Sunday morning I came out of the house with two of my boys, each of us carrying a Bible. There was quite a ripple of laughter from some of the folks opposite, standing in their front garden, but what did it matter? We were not ashamed to be seen with our Bibles.

When I first went to business I remember how difficult it seemed to put my hand up to my face and quietly thank God for my food in the restaurant. In fact, I imagined everyone was watching me, and my face went nearly as red as a beetroot, I expect, but after doing it regularly for a few days I gained courage, and was soon no longer afraid of anyone noticing me.

Never be ashamed of doing what is right. Paul could say, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth" (Romans i. 16). Ask the Lord Jesus to give you strength and courage at school, at home, out of doors, or wherever you are to confess His Name, and never fear the consequences, for you will come out on top in the end.

THE LIFE OF DAVID AND ITS LESSONS.

The Ecome now to the actual battle between David and Goliath, beginning at verse 38. We cannot speak on every verse, but if you are reading the chapter you can fit in the verses we miss.

Now when Saul looks on David he thinks him too weak to meet the giant,

and wants to strengthen him, so fits his own armour on him. Saul thus thought that David would be as well protected as Goliath; but if Goliath is to be defeated it will take someone stronger, and with weapons greater than those possessed by the enemy. David would meet him as a shepherd, not as a warrior; with a staff, not a sword (verse 40); with the name of the Lord of hosts, not a suit of armour (verse 45). How like the One who said, "The Good Shepherd giveth His life for the sheep" (John x. 11). How good to be one of those sheep!

In verse 40 we read that David took five smooth stones with him, but it took two things to end Goliath—a stone (verse 49), then a sword (verse 51). The work was in two parts. Now I think we might look at the stone as picturing our Lord's victory in the wilderness, and the sword to His triumph at the cross. Whilst David took five stones from the brook, one was sufficient to bring Goliath down, thus reminding us of how the Lord Jesus, by referring to only one book from the Word of God (His quotations all being in Deuteronomy), proved sufficient to the defeat of Satan in the wilderness (Matthew iv. 4-11).

Yet that did not finally dispose of the enemy, so David runs and draws Goliath's sword and with it cuts off his head. Likewise Jesus takes the enemy's own power, death, and destroys him with it for ever. Who had the power of death? Satan (Hebrews ii. 14). Then, just as David came up out of the valley with the head of Goliath, so the Lord arose in mighty triumphant victory over Satan, sin and death.

Now when the children of Israel saw Goliath was dead they gave a mighty shout and pursued the enemy, spoiling his tents. David won the victory himself, but all the people shared in the fruits of it.

Likewise you and I can share in all the fruits of the victory of the Lord Jesus Christ. We read in Isaiah liii. 12 that He divides the spoil with the strong. Would you like to share in the glorious victory of the Son of God? Well, you can. The first fruit He offers us is, THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS. Have you got this yet? You can have it simply by asking Him to save you and to wash you in His precious blood that cleanses from all sin (1 John i. 7).

Just one point more. In verse 54 we read that David took the head of Goliath and brought it to Jerusalem. I have sometimes thought he might have buried it at the place called "the place of a skull" (Mark xv. 22). Perhaps the very spot where the Lord, in His death, completely destroyed the power of the Devil.

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ASSURANCE.

The boy was a newcomer, so the master knew very little about him. He sat down by him and, after some conversation, said, "You are very ill."

With an earnest look and calm voice
the boy said, "I know whom I have

believed, and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him against that day." This boy was not afraid to face eternity; rather, he was glad, because he had the assurance that he was secure and that, if he died, he would go to be with his Saviour.

How often in the daily life we like to be sure about things. When going a journey we are earnest to make sure that we are in the right train or on the right road. It is very much more important in regard to eternal things to make sure that we are travelling aright.

There are numbers of people who have put their trust in the Lord Jesus Christ and who believe that His precious blood has cleansed away their sins, but they have not got the assurance that all is well, and they cannot look into the future with certainty. Why is this? The reason is that they keep looking within at their own feelings and shortcomings, or around at their circumstances and difficulties. Instead of looking to the Lord, they are looking to themselves, and in place of assurance and joy they give way to murmuring and unbelief.

Assurance is resting upon God and finding Him to be all that He promises.

The first great thing we need for assurance is TRUST—confidence in God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. When you go a rail journey, you simply get into the carriage, sit still and trust. You commit yourself to the train and you know that you will be all right.

God gives us many great and wonderful promises and, if we trust Him, He will lead us in the way everlasting. When the Lord Jesus Christ was here He declared very plainly that "He that heareth My word, and believeth on Him that sent Me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life." Further,

He said, "I give unto them [My sheep] eternal life; and they shall never perish." Notice the importance of the word HATH. It is those who have the Lord Jesus Christ who have eternal life.

God has laid a strong Foundation for us—a Foundation which is sure, solid and eternal. A Foundation upon which we can rest. Around us is the troubled sea of the world's conflict. Men are perishing, many are in difficulties and doubts, but, if our feet are set upon the Rock, we are safe whatever may happen.

The Lord Jesus Christ leads the way to the glory, and, if our trust is in Him, we can rejoice in the sure and certain hope of an entrance into His presence, to be for ever with Him who said, "I have redeemed thee, thou art Mine."



OR about a week the work was chiefly confined to the meetings under the confined to the meetings under the beech trees, but it soon spread, and many were awakened and saved in their own homes or at their daily work without any human instrumentality. No doubt excitement mingled largely in it, and many were stricken who were not truly converted to God; and many who were really converted did not follow the Lord closely. and thus fell back into the world. We must acknowledge all this; but there remained a large number, whom the Lord saved at that time, and some are alive to this day who praise Him for it, and have walked to His glory.

I must tell you of one memorable day about a week after the work began under the beech trees. It was a fair day, and but little business was being done. The gates were thrown open, and thousands passed in and out, and heard the Gospel as it was preached by various speakers nearly all the day. The lawn was strewn with stricken people, so that the scene resembled the wounded on a battlefield. Some of the converts mounted the iron garden chair—the only platform and preached, telling how they had found Jesus for themselves. One of these was a large, powerful man, who had broken a young holly tree to pieces by falling into it when stricken.

It was very touching to hear the converts testify to the saving power of the name of the Lord Jesus, and it made the older Christians' hearts rejoice.

There was but little singing, and there was no excitement from so-called revival hymns, which only came in later. "Glory, honour," etc., was the chorus by which they chiefly praised their newly-found Saviour.

I am sure, dear children, some of you would like to have been present at these scenes. Two little girls, just previously converted, used to enjoy it all immensely as they went about from room to room, through the crowds that filled them those warm June nights, or passed from group to group out of doors, rejoicing over the blessing they knew was flowing to so many.

They enjoyed the freedom, too, from lessons and many other restraints, as their respective mothers were entirely occupied with all that was going on, and the governess was in anxiety of soul herself, so the children had a great deal of liberty of a happy sort, for they were as much interested in the work as the grown-up people.

Perhaps you think it would have been easier to have found Jesus then than now.

But no; the Lord is seeking you as much to-day as He sought children then; and the time is much shorter now before He comes, so hasten to Him.

One of those little girls I have been speaking of had that year learnt that God, instead of being against her, loved her, and that He, as it were, was beseeching sinners to be reconciled to Him (2 Corinthians v. 20, 21); though He hated her sins, He loved herself. was a great discovery. She learnt one night, during her own father's preaching, that all her sins were washed away by the precious blood of Christ, shed over 1800 years before—that He had borne all her sins upon the cross. Now this is true of all who believe on Christ; but each one learns it for himself. little girl grew up, and has never had a doubt since; for Christ's work can never change, and He is risen and in glory at God's right hand. She came home from the meeting where she found Christ, singing in her heart, "Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood. And hath made us kings and priests unto God and His Father; to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever "(Revelation i. 5, 6).

Can you sing that song? If you can, don't be ashamed to confess the Lord, and what He has done for you; and seek to follow Him closely in His path here, till He comes to take us to His own blessed home, that where He is we may be also.

If you don't know Jesus, the time is very short; so fly to Him at once, whose arms are open to receive you, and who says, "Come unto Me."

YEAR-OLD BABY SWIMS TO SAFETY.

AN this be true? We wonder. It is almost impossible to believe that it can be true.

The news comes from Canton, China, that a year-old baby, that had never been taught to swim, saved its life by swimming to shore after it had fallen into a lake near Canton.

The child was the daughter of a boatman. A small boat was its home. One

day while playing it fell into the lake. To the great surprise of the parents, the infant struck out in a determined way for the shore, swam 20 ft., and was pulled out of the water by people standing on the bank.

There are several things which make us wonder if the story can be true. First, the child was only a year old. Second, it had never been taught to swim. Whoever heard of a child of that tender age being taught to swim? To start with, it could not understand the instructions of a teacher of swimming. A child of a year old does not know how to talk. Third, it was unlikely that

such a young child would know in what

direction the shore lay.

The writer, a swimmer, once fell into water 10 ft. deep from a yacht. He vividly remembers the water closing over his head, and his confusion on reaching the surface. If a grown man felt the difficulty, a child, a year old, would be helpless.

This is the story that is told, that this year-old infant swam 20 ft. to the shore.

However, let us suppose the story is really true. What a remarkable instance of the instinct of self-preservation in an infant of such tender years! Can we not learn a good lesson from the story? Let us see if we can. The readers of Our Children are of all ages. Some of the very young ones, I expect, are thinking they can wait till they are older before they trust the Saviour. If this infant struck out for the shore for safety at a year old, is it not time that the youngest readers of Our Children were thinking of their salvation? The Saviour said when on earth, "Suffer the little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not; for of such is the kingdom of God " (Mark x. 14). The Lord does not say here, "children," but "little children." What an encouragement to the youngest reader of this Magazine.

If this year-old child had thought of waiting till it was older before it struck out for the shore, it would have been drowned. How wise to act at once; and so will you be wise if you act at once in the far more important matter of

your soul's salvation.

We know from Holy writ that Esau afterwards came to regret his choice, for "he found no place of repentance, though he sought it carefully with tears" (Hebrews xii. 17). Now if you were asked which you would choose. present gain (by which is meant gain in mere temporal things which are fleeting and passing away), with eternal loss, or eternal gain, even though it might bring a measure of loss in regard to the

JUSTIFICATION.

A VERY important question was raised long ago by one of Job's friends: "How then can man be justified with God?" This simply means How can man be right with God? It is a fact which we must learn if we would enter into blessing, that by nature

man is *not* right with God. None of us has any advantage in this respect. We are all far from God until the moment we are justified (or made right with Him). Then it is of the greatest importance that we, too, should raise the question, "How can man be right with God?"

Looking into Paul's epistle to the Romans there are three things we read about JUSTIFICATION. The first is that it is

PROVIDED BY GRACE.

This is in Romans iii. 24. I would like you to look up these Scriptures and read them carefully, because it is well to have a good knowledge in our hearts of the simple foundation truths of the Gospel.

The previous verse is a solemn declaration that we have all sinned. We know this to be only too true. If the matter ended there we would be all doomed to destruction for eternity, because no sin can enter into God's presence. But the blessed fact follows that we have justification freely by God's grace. None of us could merit God's favour. There was nothing about us to draw out the goodness of God. It was entirely His own grace which brought salvation.

PROCURED BY BLOOD.

If you read Romans v. 9 you will find this expression, "justified by blood." The last few words of verse 8 of this chapter read, "Christ died for us." Upon this hangs the whole Gospel. The great fact that the Lord Jesus Christ went to Calvary's cross and gave Himself for our sins is the foundation of justification. Because He shed His precious blood, God can justify everyone who trusts Him; and He can do it in a perfectly righteous way.

POSSESSED BY FAITH.

"How can man be right with God?" The answer is in Romans v. 1, "Justified

by faith." You cannot be justified by works. Many people try to do good things to justify themselves, but God declares that "by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in His sight" (Romans iii. 20). Simple faith in the Lord Jesus Christ enters us into this great blessing. Faith just means TRUST and, if we trust the Lord Jesus, we will be justified—cleared of every charge which might be brought against us-and this leads us to "peace with If we are in our sins, we are enemies of God, but faith brings us near to Him and we learn what it is to be at rest and peace in His presence.

THE LIFE OF DAVID AND ITS LESSONS.

of sin is there. The Lord Jesus is pure, holy and good—without sin. He cannot have sinful followers. What can we do? We must turn in our hearts to the Lord Jesus, and tell Him that, although we are sinful, we want to be forgiven and change sides. He will look on us with love, and say, "Thy sins are forgiven" (Luke vii. 48), and we shall then know that we have been born again.

Is not He a Saviour worth having a Master worth serving? Oh, boys and girls, will you not make sure now as W E come now, boys and girls, to the W 18th chapter of 1 Samuel, and begin to look a little at the effects of the work of David in slaying the giant Goliath. In the first four verses of this chapter we have a lovely picture of devotion. Jonathan giving up all to David because of the work David had done. Jonathan had been one of the people who had trembled before Goliath, but now he knows he is delivered because the giant was dead. Now I think what passed through Jonathan's mind was, "David has done everthing for me, so I

am going to put all I value on David." In other words, he gives up all he has to David.

First we read that he loved him (verse 1). That is the spring from which all else flows. Let me ask you, Has the fact that the Lord Jesus died for you won your heart and caused you to return His love? If so, you will be ready to lay all you have at His feet. Time, talents, and health—all for His service. Only real love for Him can produce this. Peter, one day after the resurrection, said, "Lord, Thou knowest all things; Thou knowest that I love Thee" (John xxi. 17). It was this that led him in later years to lay down his life for the Lord.

Please notice that David did not ask for a single thing from Jonathan. No, Jonathan did it all himself because he loved him. Let me take you to another passage where we read of the great Apostle who for love to the Lord Jesus, laid all at His feet. I refer to Paul in the 3rd chapter of Philippians, verses 4 to 7. All that had made Paul a great man in the world, he lays in full surrender at the feet of Jesus. Think over his magnificent words in the rest of the chapter, especially verse 8, where he tells us the thing he valued most was "the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord."

Christian boy, Christian girl, what a grand chance you have to give your whole life in the service of Christ Jesus. You cannot begin too early. Think not you are too young. Turn to Him, and He surely will take you and as you grow older will fit you more and more for His service. A dear, godly lady once wrote the lines:—

"Take myself and I will be ever only all for Thee."

Such then is the lesson which Jonathan's acts would teach us, that the Victor deserves OUR ALL in His service.

Soon, Jonathan was going to risk his life for David, for when Saul would have slain him, Jonathan helped him to escape. In chapter 20 we find David has to flee, and Jonathan takes sides with him against his own father. Here is a strong test, yet Jonathan's love for David was great enough to keep him faithful to the one who is rejected.

So it is to-day. Our Lord, in spite of His love to men and His wonderful work for their salvation, is still rejected. On whose side are you? Are you taking sides with this world, or are you on the Lord's side? This is the great question. One of old could say, "choose you this day whom ye will serve" (Joshua xxiv. 15). May the Lord give each reader grace to trust and serve Him. G. D.

For Young Christians

UR subject this month is more particularly for Christians. Sanctification looks a hard word and we are apt to pass the matter over as being difficult. This subject, however, has a large place in Scripture and is very important.

The first time we read of sanctification is in Genesis ii. 3—"God blessed the seventh day, and sanctified it." This means that the seventh day was to be separated from the other six days. People might work on six days, but on the seventh day no work was to be done, as it was holy, and quite separate from the other days. Now if you trace this subject through Scripture you will find this to be always true, that "Sanctification" means, "To set apart." Sometimes it speaks of things, and then a

thing, such as the tabernacle, or the altar, or something else which had to be separated from other things. In the Old Testament we read of certain persons, like Aaron the priest, who were set apart from other people. In the first question of your scripture searching test you will read of the nation of Israel being set apart for a particular purpose.

When we come to the New Testament we find that believers—those who are justified—are spoken of as being "sanctified." God marks them off as distinct from the world and the ungodly. This is true of every believer—young as well as old. We are sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ. His death, if we are believers, separates us in God's sight from this wicked, ungodly world around us, and we are going on to that inheritance which is prepared for us among all them which are sanctified.

God has done all this for us, but we, as Christians, are responsible to walk apart from the evil world. Read the last question in your paper and refer to 2 Timothy ii. These were evil days when this was written, and believers were shown the way of blessing—the way of separation from the evil. If a man separates himself from the evil, he shall be a vessel unto honour, sanctified and meet for the Master's use, and prepared unto every good work.

If you know the Lord Jesus as your Saviour, I am sure that you would like to be a vessel meet for the Master's use! To this end we are to be very careful of our walk through the world. We are not to allow bad practices or evil associations. To maintain a good walk, we are exhorted to "Flee also youthful lusts: but follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, with them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart."
